14 INTERIOR DESIGNER SHALL BE SUBJECT TO ANY OF THE RESTRICTIONS SET
15 FORTH IN PARAGRAPHS (b) AND (d) OF SUBSECTION (1) OF THIS SECTION.

18 A PERSON WHO:

27 (B) PREPARING AND FILING INTERIOR DESIGN DOCUMENTS FOR THE
28 PURPOSE OF OBTAINING A BUILDING PERMIT AS PROVIDED BY LAW FOR
29 NONSTRUCTURAL OR NONSEISMIC INTERIOR CONSTRUCTION, MATERIALS,
30 FINISHES, SPACE PLANNING, FURNISHINGS, FIXTURES, EQUIPMENT,
31 LIGHTING, AND REFLECTED CEILING PLANS;

33 (C) DESIGNING FOR FABRICATION NONSTRUCTURAL ELEMENTS
34 WITHIN AND SURROUNDING INTERIOR SPACES OF BUILDINGS; OR

35
36 (D) THE ADMINISTRATION OF DESIGN CONSTRUCTION AND
37 CONTRACT DOCUMENTS, AS THE CLIENTS' AGENT, RELATING TO THE
38 FUNCTIONS DESCRIBED IN SUB-SUBPARAGRAPHS (A) TO (C) OF THIS
39 SUBPARAGRAPH (I), AND COLLABORATION WITH SPECIALTY CONSULTANTS
40 AND LICENSED PRACTITIONERS IN OTHER AREAS OF TECHNICAL EXPERTISE;

43 (II) POSSESSES WRITTEN DOCUMENTATION THAT HE OR SHE:

45 (A) HAS GRADUATED WITH A DEGREE IN INTERIOR DESIGN FROM A
46 COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY OFFERING SUCH PROGRAM CONSISTING OF FOUR
47 OR MORE YEARS OF STUDY AND HAS COMPLETED TWO YEARS OF INTERIOR
48 DESIGN EXPERIENCE; OR

50 (B) HAS GRADUATED WITH A DEGREE IN INTERIOR DESIGN FROM A
51 COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY OFFERING SUCH PROGRAM CONSISTING OF TWO
52 OR MORE YEARS OF STUDY AND HAS COMPLETED FOUR YEARS OF INTERIOR
53 DESIGN EXPERIENCE; AND

55 (C) HAS MET THE EDUCATION AND EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENTS OF,
56 AND HAS SUBSEQUENTLY PASSED, THE QUALIFICATION EXAMINATION

1 PROMULGATED BY THE NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR INTERIOR DESIGN
2 QUALIFICATION OR ITS SUCCESSOR ORGANIZATION.

4 (c) (I) AS USED IN THIS SUBSECTION (6), "NONSTRUCTURAL OR
5 NONSEISMIC" INCLUDES INTERIOR ELEMENTS OR COMPONENTS THAT ARE
6 NOT LOAD BEARING OR THAT DO NOT ASSIST IN THE SEISMIC DESIGN AND

18 AND ENGINEERING WORK EXCEPT FOR THE SPECIFICATION OF FIXTURES
19 AND THEIR LOCATION WITHIN INTERIOR SPACES; OR

21 (C) THE CONSTRUCTION OF STRUCTURAL, MECHANICAL,
22 PLUMBING, HEATING, AIR CONDITIONING, VENTILATION, ELECTRICAL OR
23 VERTICAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS, FIRE RATED VERTICAL SHAFTS IN
24 ANY MULTI-STORY STRUCTURE, FIRE-RELATED PROTECTION OF
25 STRUCTURAL ELEMENTS, SMOKE EVACUATION AND
26 COMPARTMENTALIZATION, EMERGENCY SPRINKLER SYSTEMS, OR
27 EMERGENCY ALARM SYSTEMS.

29 **SECTION 2. Effective date - applicability.** (1) This act shall
30 take effect January 1, 2002, unless a referendum petition is filed during
31 the ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly that
32 is allowed for submitting a referendum petition pursuant to article V,
33 section 1 (3) of the state constitution. If such a referendum petition is
34 filed against this act or an item, section, or part of this act within such
35 period, then the act, item, section, or part, if approved by the people, shall
36 take effect on the date of the official declaration of the vote thereon by
37 proclamation of the governor.

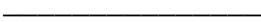
