In the days and weeks that followed April 20, 1999, Columbine High School received many gifts and letters. The members of Columbine High School's faculty, staff, student body and alumni know that they cannot give back to everyone. With this thought in mind, The Heart of Columbine was created to encourage community involvement with youth. The Heart of Columbine is inviting other schools across the country to develop The Heart of Columbine program in their communities. The members of The Heart of Columbine will never forget

who lost their lives, and the group would like to forever dedicate April 20 as a day of unity and sharing. The Heart of Columbine Day has been set-aside for the people of the state of 52 Colorado to remember, but also to focus on the positive contributions that youth are making 53 in their communities.

So far this semester, The Heart of Columbine has been very successful. On February 14, The 56 National Honor Society finished a canned food drive and collected over 7200 items which 57 were given to The Food Bank of the Rockies. The Art Club is making ceramic bowls to be 58 sold. The boy's basketball team collected money at their last game of the season. The Bible 59 Club is traveling to The Denver Rescue Mission one day a month. Peer counseling has put 60 our money jars throughout the community. United in Action (the diversity club) promoted 61 The Heart of Columbine at the Peace Jam Conference that was held in Denver in February 62 and they are donating portions of their wages from their employers. FCCLA has worked in 63 the soup kitchen at The Denver Rescue Mission. The choir department will be sponsoring a 64 talent show on April 25 in which all proceeds will go to The Heart of Columbine. The CHS 65 Debate team is working through Children International to sponsor a child in the Philippines. 66 The Debate team is also teaming up with Normandy Elementary and together will sponsor two 67 children next year. The football team is going out in the community and volunteering to do 68 yard work. The upper level math class is selling graphing calculator covers and the proceeds 69 will go to Compa Food Ministries.

This past Saturday The Heart of Columbine sponsored its First Annual The Heart of 72

Columbine Community Day. During the community day, nearly \$4800 was raised through carnival games, yard and plant sales. All the proceeds will go to metro area charities that help eliminate hunger. None of the money that was collected will go to Columbine High School.

The Heart of Columbine is spreading across the country. There are groups in Moline, Illinois and Prescott, Arizona that are also involved.

The Heart of Columbine is working to change the image of Columbine back to a beautiful mountain flower and not a name associated with tragedy.

The Heart of Columbine wishes to thank everyone for his or her support, love, prayers and 11 donations.
