WHEREAS, On October 13, 1999, President Clinton directed the U.S. Forest Service to develop and propose for public comment regulations that would place long-term restrictions on currently inventoried Roadless Areas, which resulted in an additional 4.433 million acres of Colorado Roadless Areas receiving protected status; and

WHEREAS, The final rule, issued January 12, 2001, prohibits road construction and reconstruction activities (including temporary road construction) and timber harvests except for stewardship purposes in designated Roadless Areas; and

WHEREAS, The state of Colorado is home to some of the best quality coal in the United States; and

WHEREAS, This bituminous coal has very high heat content, very low sulfur, produces less nitrogen oxides than other coals, and is a desirable resource for the nation's utility companies; and

WHEREAS, This coal serves to meet our nation's stringent environmental requirements to protect air quality and human health; and

WHEREAS, Certain rural areas of Colorado are reliant upon the coal industry for high-paying direct jobs and to support secondary businesses and industries; and

WHEREAS, The preamble to the "Roadless Area" final rule states that "Between 308 and 1,371 million tons of coal resources on the Grand Mesa, Uncompahgre and Gunnison [Colorado] and Manti-LaSal [Utah] National Forests could be unavailable for development as a result of this rule"; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

That we urge the Colorado Congressional delegation, the President of the United States, the Governor's Office, and relevant state agencies to oppose the designation of 4.433 million acres in Colorado as Roadless Areas and use all means within their power, including litigation, to either overturn the rule or to allow for discretionary mineral leasing.

5 **23-31-122. Permanent fund of college.** The state treasurer is
6 hereby authorized to have transferred upon his OR HER books ten percent

9 amount so transferred to be computed upon the total amount of receipts
10 received by the state of Colorado and passed to the permanent fund
11 belonging to the said university and, when so transferred upon the books
12 of said office, the same to be available for disbursement by the ~~state~~
13 ~~board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE
14 UNIVERSITY SYSTEM under certificates of indebtedness to be issued by the

19 **23-31-123. Purposes of fund.** The ~~state board of agriculture~~
20 BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM is
21 authorized to purchase such lands for sites and for experimental farms as
22 it may deem necessary for the better conduct of the work in connection
23 with the Colorado state university and experiment station in connection
24 therewith. The sum transferred as set forth in section 23-31-122 is
25 hereby appropriated for said purposes.

27 **23-31-124. Exclusive use.** The funds appropriated by section
28 23-31-123 shall be used exclusively for the purposes therein stated.

30 **23-31-125. Warrants.** The controller is hereby authorized to
31 draw warrants on the fund created by sections 23-31-123 and 23-31-124
32 upon presentation of certificates of indebtedness issued by the ~~state board~~
33 ~~of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE
34 UNIVERSITY SYSTEM and signed by the president and countersigned by the
35 secretary.

37 **23-31-126. Revolving fund. (Repealed)**
38

39 **23-31-127. Pledge of income from facilities or equipment.**
40 (1) The ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
41 COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM, designated in this section as the
42 "board", is authorized to enter into a contract for the advancement of
43 moneys for the acquisition of facilities or equipment, or both, for the
44 Colorado state university auditorium-gymnasium, and in connection with
45 or as a part of such contract to pledge the net income, or any part of such
46 net income, to be derived from such facilities or equipment, or both, so
47 acquired, and to pledge special student fees assessed for the purpose of
48 financing such facilities or equipment, or both, as security for the
49 repayment of the moneys advanced therefor, together with interest
50 thereon. For the same purpose, the board is also authorized to pledge the
51 net income derived from any similar facility or equipment, or portion
52 thereof, which was not acquired with moneys appropriated to Colorado
53 state university, if such net income derived from such similar facility or
54 equipment, or portion thereof, is unpledged or, if pledged, is currently in
55 excess of the amount required to amortize the advancements and interest
56 thereon for which such net income has been obligated.

1 (2) The board shall not pledge the general income of the
2 university or create any mortgage upon property belonging to such
3 institution or obligate the state of Colorado for the purpose of repaying
4 or receiving any funds raised or advanced under the provisions of this
5 section.

7 (3) Any advancement of moneys may be evidenced by revenue
8 bonds or warrants to be executed by and on behalf of Colorado state
9 university and containing such terms and provisions, including provisions
10 for redemption prior to maturity and a maximum net effective interest
11 rate, as may be determined by the board of such institution. Such revenue
12 bonds or warrants shall bear interest at a rate such that the net effective
13 interest rate of the issue of bonds does not exceed the maximum net
14 effective interest rate fixed, which interest shall be payable semiannually
15 or annually. Such revenue bonds or warrants may be sold at less than
16 par, but they may not be sold at a price such that the net effective interest
17 rate of the issue of bonds or warrants exceeds the maximum net effective

34 **23-31-128. Rents or charges for buildings and facilities for**
35 **research.** ~~The state board of agriculture of Colorado state university~~
36 BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM is
37 authorized to contract for or impose and collect rents or charges for the
38 use of university buildings and facilities for research, including research
39 conducted by or under the auspices of Colorado state university. Such
40 rents or charges shall be at a level reasonably calculated to return or
41 amortize the cost of such buildings and facilities within a reasonable
42 period not exceeding the life of such buildings and facilities; but such
43 user charges or rents may not be imposed and collected in such a manner

47 **23-31-129. Research building revolving fund - appropriation**

25 **23-31-131. Purchase of anticipation warrants.** It is lawful for

28 warrants satisfy the investment requirements established in part 6 of
29 article 75 of title 24, C.R.S.; but not to exceed twenty percent of the total
30 of any specific fund of such public entity shall be invested in such

33 **23-31-132. Warrants as security - when.** Anticipation warrants
34 issued in pursuance of sections 23-31-128 to 23-31-134 may be used as
35 security for any depository bond or obligation where any kind of bonds
36 or other securities must or may, by law, be deposited as security.

38 **23-31-133. Tax exemption.** Any anticipation warrants issued
39 pursuant to the provisions of section 23-31-130 by the ~~state board of~~
40 ~~agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY
41 SYSTEM shall be exempt from taxation for state, county, school district,
42 special district, municipal, or any other purpose in the state of Colorado.

44 **23-31-134. Borrowing funds.** (1) For the purposes described in
45 section 23-31-129, the ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS
46 OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM is authorized to:

48 (a) Enter into contracts with any person, corporation, or state or
49 federal government agency for the advancement of money for such
50 purposes and providing for the repayment of such advances with interest

53 (b) Issue bonds as provided in this section.

55 (2) (a) Any bonds issued pursuant to this section shall mature at
56 such time or times, shall bear or accrue interest at such rate or rates, and

1 shall otherwise be sold and issued in such manner and on such terms as
2 provided by the ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
3 COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM.

5 (b) Such bonds shall be payable exclusively from, and shall be
6 secured by a pledge of, the Colorado state university research building
7 revolving fund created in section 23-31-129.

9 (c) The authority contained in this section to issue bonds shall be
10 in addition to the authority granted to the ~~state board of agriculture~~
11 BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM to
12 issue anticipation warrants pursuant to section 23-31-130; except that
13 nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the issuance of

18 (d) Any bonds issued pursuant to this section shall be exempt

41 (1) The ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
42 COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM, designated in this section as the
43 "board", is authorized to enter into contracts for the advancement of
44 moneys for the construction and acquisition of facilities or equipment, or
45 both, for the Colorado state university veterinary medicine hospital, or
46 any part thereof, and, in connection with or as a part of such contracts, to
47 pledge revenues from a special hospital fee that the board shall collect
48 pursuant to agreements entered into with or with respect to each
49 accountable student as security for the repayment of the moneys
50 advanced therefor, together with interest thereon. The maximum number
51 of accountable students at any given time shall not exceed three hundred
52 eight; except that, should the total enrollment in the professional
53 veterinary medicine program exceed five hundred forty-eight head-count

44 including provisions for adequate reserves and for redemption prior to
45 maturity and a maximum net effective interest rate, as may be determined
46 by the board of such institution. Such revenue bonds or anticipation
47 warrants shall bear interest at a rate such that the net effective interest
48 rate of the issue of bonds or anticipation warrants does not exceed the
49 maximum net effective interest rate fixed, which interest shall be payable
50 semiannually or annually. Such revenue bonds or warrants may be sold
51 at less than par, but they may not be sold at a price such that the net
52 effective interest rate of the issue of bonds or warrants exceeds the
53 maximum net effective interest rate fixed. Any such revenue bonds or
54 warrants may be refunded pursuant to article 54 of title 11, C.R.S., if in
55 the judgment of the board such refunding is to the best interests of the
56 university.

1 (5) If the sources of pledged revenues described in subsection (1)
2 of this section exceed the amount required for the amortization of any
3 advancement made pursuant to this section, and the payment of interest
4 thereof, together with reserve requirements, the board may apply such
5 surplus to the redemption of such securities prior to maturity of such
6 securities according to redemption provisions thereof, or such surplus
7 may be used by the board for the purposes of maintaining, repairing,
8 altering, or adding to any existing equipment or facilities acquired
9 pursuant to the provisions of this section for any lawful purpose.

11 (6) All obligations issued pursuant to this section and the income
12 therefrom shall be exempt from taxation, except inheritance, estate, and
13 transfer taxes.

15 (7) No action shall be brought questioning the legality of any
16 contract, proceedings, revenue bonds, or anticipation warrants issued or
17 to be issued by the board in connection with the provision of all or any
18 part of the Colorado state university veterinary medicine hospital
19 pursuant to this section after the expiration of thirty days from the
20 effective date of any resolution or other official action authorizing such
21 contract, adopting such proceedings, or authorizing the issuance of such
22 warrants or bonds.

23
24 **23-31-136. Board of governors of the Colorado state university**
25 **system - powers relating to real property.** The ~~state board of~~
26 ~~agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY
27 SYSTEM shall have the powers specified in section 23-30-102 regarding
28 the sale, lease, or exchange of real property, or any interest therein, the

48 of the United States entitled "An Act to apply a portion of the proceeds
49 of the public lands to the more complete endowment and support of the
50 colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts." established
51 under the provisions of an act of congress, approved July 2, 1862.

52
53 **23-32-102. Board of governors of the Colorado state university**
54 **system to control fund.** The ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF
55 GOVERNORS OF THE COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM has the control
56 of the fund appropriated by the said act of congress and shall disburse the

1 same for the use and benefit of the Colorado state university and in
2 accordance with the terms and provisions of said act of congress.

3
4 **23-32-103. Acceptance of congressional act of 1883.** Full and
5 complete acceptance, ratification, and assent is made and given by the
6 state of Colorado to all the provisions, terms, grants, and conditions and
7 the purposes of the grants made and prescribed by the act of congress of
8 the United States entitled "An Act donating public lands to the several
9 states and territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of
10 agriculture and mechanic arts.", approved July 2, 1862, as well as the
11 amendments thereto, as made by the act of congress passed and adopted
12 March 3, 1883, entitled "An Act to amend an act donating public lands
13 to the several states and territories which may provide colleges for the
14 benefit of agriculture and mechanic arts.", and all acts amendatory or
15 supplementary to said acts.

17 **23-32-104. Control, investment, and expending of funds.**
18 (1) The ~~state board of agriculture~~ BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE
19 COLORADO STATE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM has control of the funds derived
20 from the sale of lands donated by the said act of congress of 1862, and
21 shall invest the same in securities which yield a fair and reasonable rate
