EXECUTIVE ORDER PROCLAMATION CALL FOR THE SECOND EXTRAORDINARY SESSION OF THE SIXTY-THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Office of the Governor of the State of Colorado, and 55 in particular vested in the Governor pursuant to Article IV, Section 9 of the Colorado 56 Constitution, and as provided for in Article V, Section 7, I, Bill Owens, Governor of the State 57 of Colorado, hereby issue this Executive Order convening the Sixty-Third General Assembly 58 to meet in extraordinary session.

1. Background and Need

The results of the 2000 United States Census increase Colorado's representation to the United 63 States House of Representatives to seven seats from six. The Colorado Constitution requires 64 the General Assembly to divide the state into seven congressional districts to reflect 65 Colorado's new and higher population figures. New congressional districts need to be drawn 66 in time for the 2002 election cycle and must embody the principle of one person, one vote 67 from Article 1, Section 2 of the United States Constitution. The General Assembly should 68 draw these districts to fairly reflect Colorado's growth, diversity, existing political 69 subdivisions and communities of interest. 70 The unprecedented population growth that occurred in Colorado and was documented by the Census has dramatically impacted land use across the state. Colorado citizens have consistently stated that the rapid population growth threatens our unique quality of life. Colorado's voters and its legislature have struggled for several years with the question of how to manage the benefits associated with the population increase and how to mitigate certain negative impacts of the development that have resulted.

Unfortunately, despite attempts in three successive legislative sessions, a citizen's initiative, 8 and a previous special session this year to address this difficult issue, Colorado still has not 9 updated its land use laws to better manage growth. If the State of Colorado fails to act now 10 to reform land use laws we risk losing a lifestyle found in no other place in the country. 11

The increased population in Colorado is clearly evidenced by the strain on the state's 13 transportation system. For too long Colorado's transportation funding failed to keep pace with 14 its population growth. Since 1998, we have more than doubled state spending on 15 transportation and accelerated projects through programs like the transportation bonding 16 referendum approved by the voters in 1999. Yet despite these measures, Colorado's state 17 transportation system still suffers from twenty-five years of balancing the state budget on the 18 back of transportation funding. The state must immediately reprioritize its budget to increase 19 transportation funding.

Finally, two important issues call for immediate action during this extraordinary legislative 22 session. First, due to drafting mistakes in Senate Bill 01-168 that were beyond the scope of 23 the bill's title, certain drunk driving offenders may receive lesser sentences than are 24 appropriate. The General Assembly, therefore, should rectify this oversight to ensure the 25 safety of Colorado's roads and highways.

Second, many low-income women in Colorado and the nation are unable to afford the 28 necessary treatment recommended as a result of free breast and cervical cancer screenings. 29 In response, Congress late last year passed the Breast and Cervical Cancer Act of 2000. This 30 authorizes states to adopt legislation providing Medicaid coverage to women who have been 31 screened by a National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program health care 32 provider and found to have cancer or precancerous lesions. The Act offers a significant 33 federal match for states that pass enabling legislation to offer Medicaid eligibility to women 34 with breast and cervical cancer.

Earlier this year, the Colorado General Assembly failed to enact enabling legislation because 37 it could not find a funding source for Colorado's portion. However, there are unspent funds 38 from Colorado's share of the national tobacco settlement. As there is a direct connection 39 between tobacco use and breast and cervical cancer, it makes sense to fund treatment for these 40 diseases from unspent settlement dollars. Further delays offering treatment will increase 41 eventual treatment costs and may result in needless deaths, thus the state should provide 42 funding for this program now.

Because there has been no resolution concerning how to address these important issues for 45 Colorado, an extraordinary occasion has arisen that necessitates that I convene a special 46 session of the General Assembly to answer the needs of the people of Colorado. 47

2. Proclamation

I, Bill Owens, Governor of the State of Colorado, with this proclamation convene the 51 Sixty-Third General Assembly of this state and summon the members of the Sixty-Third 52 General Assembly to meet in Special Session at the State Capitol, in the City and County of 53 Denver, on September 20, 2001, at 10:00 a.m. and designate the following subjects for your 54 consideration and appropriate legislative action: 55

A. Concerning the division of the State of Colorado into seven districts for representation in 57 the United States Congress, according to constitutional standards. 58

B. Concerning making the master plans in C.R.S. 30-28-106 and 31-23-206 legally 60 enforceable.

C. Concerning making the master plans in C.R.S. 30-28-106 and 31-23-206 mandatory for 63 certain municipalities and counties. 64

D. Concerning an appropriation for the Colorado Heritage Communities program in the 66 Office of Smart Growth in the Department of Local Affairs. 67

E. Concerning the creation of an alternative dispute resolution system in C.R.S. 24-32-3209 69 for the resolution of disputes between and among municipalities and counties regarding 70 conflicts concerning the plans or planning process in C.R.S. 30-28-106 and 31-23-206.

F. Concerning allowing property owners adjacent to a proposed annexation in which the contiguity requirements in C.R.S. 31-12-104(1)(a) are achieved by annexing a platted street or alley, a public or private right of way, a public or private transportation right of way or

area, or a lake, reservoir, stream or other natural or artificial waterway, the opportunity to be included in the proposed annexation.

G. Concerning the creation of a regional planning agreement between the municipalities and counties that are members of the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for the Denver metropolitan area that upholds local decision-making authority.

H. Concerning establishing uniform authority among all home rule and statutory 12 municipalities and counties for land development charges that have a direct nexus and are 13 proportionate to the costs of public infrastructure and capital facilities provided by 14 municipalities and counties.

I. Concerning the elimination of the restriction in C.R.S. 39-26-123 that limits sales and use 17 tax transfers to the Highway Users Tax Fund when revenues are not sufficient to make 18 expenditures up to the six percent appropriations limit.

J. Concerning increasing the percentage of sales and use taxes currently allocated to the 2 Highway Users Tax Fund in Section C.R.S. 39-26-123.

K. Concerning delaying the timetable of repayment of the controlled maintenance trust fund 24 as specified in C.R.S. 24-75-302.5.

L. Concerning an annual transfer in future years from the General Fund excess reserve to the capital construction fund for highway funding.

M. Concerning certain technical corrections to Senate Bill 01-168 to clarify the appropriate sentence for driving under the influence offenses.

N. Concerning implementing the Breast and Cervical Cancer Act of 2000 with funding from 33 monies allocated to the Tobacco program fund created in C.R.S. 25-3.5-807. 34

Senators Hagedorn Chairman, Linkhart and Epps announced that the House had been informed that the Senate was organized and ready for business.

On motion of Senator Thiebaut and with the unanimous consent of those elected to the Senate. 39 the Senate stood in recess to hear the opening day remarks of President Matsunaka and 40 Minority Leader Andrews. The text of their remarks are as follows. 41 42

Senator Matsunaka's remarks:

Fellow Senators, and guests, it is with heavy hearts, we come to the Senate today with a 45 broad agenda in front of us, yet understanding that there is a national crisis that overshadows 46 our every moment. All of the eyes of Colorado are watching the work that we begin today. 47 My grandmother used to tell me, with leadership comes responsibility. As leaders in this state 48 let's show everyone we care more than others think is wise, dream more than others think is 49 practical and expect more than others think is possible. 50

We have 15 days to accomplish many tasks and I am confident that we will do our best to 51 set aside the partisan issues and make short work of the governor's agenda: redistricting, 52 growth, transportation, and funding for breast and cervical cancer treatment. It's an ambitious 53 agenda that requires providing for both the rich and poor, rural and urban, west slope and 54 front range residents of Colorado. I know that we are up to the challenge. 55

The people of this state who sent us here represent the diversity that IS our state. There are 56 many people who are praying for us and our country. Let us remember that those prayers 57 come in many languages, from many cultures, from Christians, Buddhists, Muslims and Jews 58 alike. Let us as leaders in this state pledge that we will give substance to everything we do 59 in the next few days. 60

Robert Kennedy said, "The future does not belong to those who are content with today, 61 apathetic toward common problems, timid and fearful in the face of new ideas and bold 62 projects. Rather it belongs to those who can blend vision, reason and courage in a personal 63 commitment to the ideals and great enterprises of American Society." 64

No one of us individually can change history, but each one of us can work to make a small 65 change and when they are all added up together, we can write history for Colorado. Every 66 time we stand up for an ideal, act to improve the life of another, speak out against an injustice, 67 we create a tiny ripple of hope. With each tiny ripple of hope rather than despair, the ripples 68 build into a giant burst of energy that allows us to do the impossible. 69

So let's set a new standard for this senate by paraphrasing George Bernard Shaw, "past 70 senators saw things as they were and asked why, but our senators saw things that never were 71

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and said why not." Let's not sit back and just ask why, but let's dream and then expect the impossible.

Î also believe that we should not downplay our differences. Over the last few days we have seen the consequences of people who loathe disagreement with their views. There may be moments when we reach an impasse. We should not shrink from agreeing to disagree on issues...it's the very bedrock upon which our democracy was built.

We are a select group of 35 individuals in this state. I am proud to serve with all of you as 7 you understand what duty, honor and sacrifice mean. Together we can tackle the tough 8 problems. During our darkest hours when our backs are against the wall, this is when I am 9 most proud to be an American. The last 4 letters in the word American say it all for us, "I 10 can." We can and we will.

Someone once told me, "when you combine boldness with imagination, you create magic." 12 Let's not be timid anymore, let's not be content with today. Together we can lead this new 13 era with vision, courage and commitment and make this state better than when it was passed 14 to us. Together, we can carry the torch of leadership with boldness and imagination and 15 create magic for the next generation. The Colorado Senate is ready to go to work. Let's roll 16 up our sleeves and do the best we possibly can. 17 Thank you. 18

Senator Andrew's remarks:

Good morning, friends. Here we go again. 2001 seems to be the legislative year that never ends. Like the movie "Groundhog Day," we're going to keep trying until we get it right.

At a time of sorrow and crisis for the nation, our work in the special session takes on a 25 different perspective than it had before Sept. 11. As we go about our duties here at the 26 Capitol day by day, many of us would probably rather be helping out in New York at the 27 scene of the tragedy, or somehow lending a hand to the war effort in distant countries. 28

Our hearts are with those who have suffered. Our spirit wishes Godspeed to those who are beginning to rebuild, and those preparing to strike back.

But we as senators can do our part by demonstrating that the free and orderly process of 33 American self-government continues unharmed and unafraid. The best way to honor the flag 34 is to sustain the republic for which it stands, and that is what we are here to do. 35

We are here to draw seven new Congressional districts for Colorado's voice in Washington 37 over the next ten years. Those districts should place public communities of interest ahead of 38 partisan self-interest. They should be drawn by the people's elected representatives, not 39 imposed by court order. Judges already make too many decisions. This decision is our 40 responsibility. Let's not fail.

We are here to try again on the issue of growth. Our constituents are tired of excuses about 43 this. They want results. Governor Owens has offered a good set of tools to help local 44 governments manage growth more effectively. In the last special session, after the House 45 passed his proposals with bipartisan majorities, the Senate embarrassed itself with 46 partisanship. This time, Mr. President, we must do better. Grand solutions are now 47 inappropriate anyway. The agenda may soon shift from controlling growth to creating jobs. 48

And we also are here to take the next step on providing a 21st century transportation system 50 for Colorado. After decades of defunding roads and highways, we began turning things 51 around in 1999 when voters approved the TRANS bond proposal. Now the Governor has 52 challenged us to free up even more money for transportation by setting new budget priorities. 53 His plan is better on the bottom line, and far more fair to the taxpayer, than Senator 54 Matsunaka's tax increase. Lets accept the Governor's challenge. 55

Cancer treatment, drunk driving, and other matters are also before us. The call is crowded, 57 the issues are contentious, and the horror of last Tuesday still haunts us. But I know we can 58 rise to the occasion, Democrats and Republicans alike. 59

On September 11, a great drama began. We're already into the second act. First it was 61 America attacked. Now it is America unbowed. Still ahead is act three, America victorious -- 62 and then the final act, America renewed. Even mundane legislative chores, if we do them 63 honorably, can help our beloved country toward that goal. 64
