The written text of Governor Owens' address to the joint session of the House and Senate is printed in the House Journal September 20, 2001, pages 15-21. The following are the extemporaneous remarks by Governor Owens that were not included in that written text:

20 Let me talk for a moment about the topics that I've chosen for this session and what's called "the Governor's call". I know that there has been some concern about, I believe, the 14 topics that have been outlined. Some have wanted a more expansive call some have wanted additional items added to the call.

Let me walk you through some things that I remember from the 12 years that I spent in this chamber as well as in the Senate. Section 9 of Article 4 of the Colorado Constitution reads as follows. The Governor may on extraordinary occasions convene the General Assembly by proclamation, stating therein the purposes for which to assemble but at such special session no business shall be transacted other than that specifically named in the proclamation. As you can imagine this has been the subject of lawsuits, lots of lawsuits over the years. Let me read you what the Supreme Court says about Section 9. The Governor -- this was the subject of a lawsuit a number of years ago and the Supreme Court decided as follows: The Governor is required to state in his proclamation the purpose for which the Legislature is to assemble in special session. And it provided that in such session no business shall be transacted other than that specifically named in the proclamation. The Governor is thus invested, said the Supreme Court, with extraordinary powers. He alone is to determine when there is an extraordinary occasion for convening the Legislature; and he alone is to designate the business which the Legislature is to transact when thus convened.

Also, in 1980 there was another lawsuit. The Supreme Court, in a case involving Governor Lamm, decided as follows: In the 1980 case the Colorado Supreme Court upheld an extremely narrow call of Governor Lamm's. The Governor's call read as follows: Solely for the business of changing the effective date of House Bill 1589, Chapter 216 Session Laws of 1977, by amending Section 79 thereof. The Governor's call was upheld because the Legislature could either choose to postpone the effective date or leave it the same. In the years that I served in this Legislature I was involved in a number of special sessions.

55 In 1991 Governor Romer called a special session with this as one of the 56 call items: Concerning the reinactment of Section 16-11-103, C.R.S., as it existed prior to the approval of Senate Bill 88-78, and concerning its applicability to crimes committed on or after July 1, 1998 -- very, very specific.

In 1993 I was in the Senate chamber when we had a call which read as follows: Concerning an additional district court judge for the 18<sup>th</sup> Judicial District. It would not have been constitutional to put that judge in the 19<sup>th</sup> or the 17<sup>th</sup> or to add two or three judges. It said "an additional judge for the 18<sup>th</sup> District", decide 'yes' or 'no' in that case.

Some of you, many of you were here in 1997 when a special session decided how to deal with the Tabor refund. And if some of you are wondering why the refund is designed as it has been, let me read you what Governor Romer's call in 1997 dealt with in terms of the Tabor refund: Concerning the refund of state revenues in excess of the limits established by Section 20, Article 10 of the Colorado Constitution to Colorado resident individuals in a flat dollar amount per eligible individual and making an appropriation in connection thereof. It wasn't allowed to give a rebate to businesses. It wasn't allowed to give anything other than a flat dollar amount, not proportionate, but flat, to Colorado individuals. That's where the Tabor refund came from and it was based on the Governor's limited call to the legislature in 1997. Governor Romer also added to that call later, and this is his call item: Concerning continuation statements filed with filing officers under the uniform commercial code, secured transactions, the central filing of effective financing statements act, in connection therewith validating such statements filed in forms not containing certain language previously required but deleted or intending to be deleted by Senate Bill 97-155 and deleting remaining statutory language reflecting this requirement mistakenly not deleted by Senate Bill 97-155.

Ladies and Gentlemen, the constitution is very clear. A special session is different than a regular session. Just like my predecessors, I have the power to set the call for a special session and I would urge the members to accept the difference between a regular session and a special session.
