#### ADDRESS BY THE HONORABLE Bill Owens

President Matsunaka, Speaker Dean, Honorable Senators and Representatives, thank you for being here today. I realize that this isn't exactly how you had originally planned to spend today, but I am happy to see you.

We are here today because we have some unfinished business that the people of Colorado expect us to finish. Simply put, we are here to pass legislation that will allow Colorado to better manage its growth and its future.

But before talking about growth, let me review some of the positive accomplishments we achieved by working together this session. During the last few days of partisan wrangling on growth, that disagreement overshadowed the good work of this Legislature and all that was accomplished.

There is an old Jesuit motto that says, "A great deal of good can be done if one is not too concerned about who gets the credit."

This saying well describes what we were able to accomplish in the areas of education, public safety, rural health care and open space. We came together on these issues – Republicans and Democrats, the House and the Senate, the legislative and the executive branches.

Look at what we accomplished working together:

#### In Education:

- We met the budget challenges presented by Amendment 23 without harming transportation funding;
- We added \$51 million over four years for teacher pay incentives in low-performing schools;
- We invested \$40 million in up-to-date textbook funding;
- We funded full-day kindergarten in low-performing schools for the first time in Colorado history;
- We provided student loan forgiveness for new teachers to encourage more people to enter the teaching profession.

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In the area of Public Safety:

- We provided funding for Ft. Lyon to provide facilities for mentally ill
- We approved lease-purchase agreements to add 384 maximum security beds at the Arkansas Valley and San Carlos facilities.

To better care for the health of Colorado's citizens:

- We reformed the structure of the Children's Health Plan to make it more effective, thus allowing more low-income children to receive health insurance;
- We allowed dental hygienists to improve dental care for low-income children by billing Medicaid directly;
- We provided greater access to health insurance for rural Coloradans by reforming the rules under which health plans operate.

Open Space/Environment:

- We provided for water banking;
- We put GOCO bonding on the ballot this November;
- We expanded tax credits for conservation easements again to increase open space.

Friends, we took a number of significant steps toward protecting Colorado's natural landscapes this year. But we didn't finish our job. We can, we must do more. To do so, we have to go into this special session remembering why we are here. We are here because the people of Colorado elected us. And they elected us because they trust us to do what is in their best 30 interest.

And to do so, we have to go into this special session with the right spirit. And that spirit is one of bi-partisan cooperation. The same cooperation that accomplished all that I've just discussed.

When it comes to growth management, there is much common ground. There is much we agree on. We agree that fast growing communities should have comprehensive plans that are enforceable. We agree that new mechanisms to resolve disputes between these plans are needed, and that the Denver area needs enhanced regionally planning capabilities. And we agree that it is time to reign in sprawl by reforming flagpole annexations.

If we could accomplish these four items, it would be the most significant reform of Colorado land use laws in more than 25 years. For example, I first tried to reform flagpole annexations in 1984. Former State Senator Bill Schroeder tried unsuccessfully for years after that – and Rep. Matt Smith after that. Accomplishing flagpole annexation reform would indeed be a huge

We agree that giving the comprehensive plans of local governments the force of law would help our communities better plan - a change that would indeed be significant.

We agree that fast growing communities should have comprehensive plans that are enforceable, and that we should provide additional funds, through the 56 Office of Smart Growth, to help defray the cost of planning for some of those

communities.

 We agree on these things – agreement that did not exist even one or two years ago. I know of several legislators sitting in this chamber today who would never have voted for binding comprehensive plans two or three sessions ago but who are prepared to do so today.

 Coloradans and their elected officials are ready to change land use laws so we can better manage growth. Let us make these changes now, in this special session.

I know there are legislators who also want to pass growth boundaries, affectionately known as urban service areas. And there are other legislators who want to make it easier for developers to build within our urban areas, known as the "presumption of buildability." But "urban service areas" and "buildability" mean different things to different people.

I am not opposed to either concept so long as they protect private property rights, ensure our economic prosperity is secure, promote affordable housing, and assist our struggling farmers, ranchers and rural communities.

Friends, if you are able to figure out how urban service areas and buildability can be implemented in a way that protects those values, more power to you. I'd sign it into law.

But I am also a realist. Over the past three years in Colorado, four different attempts to accomplish just this failed. The people's elected representatives rejected urban service areas and buildability in 1999, 2000, and 2001. And then last November, 70% of Colorado voters rejected these concepts. At some point we have to see the writing on the wall.

At some point we have to realize that Coloradans may just not want urban service areas and buildability. But they *do* want binding comprehensive planning, alternative dispute resolution, flagpole annexation reform and better regional planning in the Denver metropolitan area.

So I look forward to a productive special session. If you want to try one more time regarding urban service areas and buildabilty, go for it. Just make sure that affordable housing, private property rights and rural Colorado are protected.

But if you are not able to reach agreement, then I believe we owe it to the citizens of this state to pass something upon which we agree. It is wrong to say that it is "all or nothing." Life doesn't work that way. Democracies don't work that way. Legislatures don't work that way.

Senator Matsunaka, when we had an honest difference of opinion on Amendment 23 funding and smaller classrooms, I could have kept those funds in escrow simply through the power of my veto. But instead, I called you, we talked, and I gave a lot in that compromise.

Friends, just like then, we don't need to worry about who gets the credit. We need to set aside partisan jockeying. We need to pull together – Republicans and Democrats, the House and the Senate, the legislative and the executive – and reach our destination, together.

There is an old saying about how difficult it is to know if you've arrived, if you don't know where you are going. I believe we share a common vision for Colorado's future. A future that is prosperous. A future that protects our most precious open space and scenic vistas. A future where our communities plan wisely for growth. A future that protects Colorado's quality of life for our children and our grandchildren. 8 There are many ways to accomplish this future. There is no silver bullet 9 nor one easy answer. We may not accomplish it all this special session. But we can start down the path. We can begin protecting what is best about 10 11 Colorado. Working together, we can pass sensible growth management 12 legislation.
