Meade, President Ulysses S. Grant, General John J. Pershing, General Douglas MacArthur, General George 33 Patton, General Omar N. Bradley, President Dwight D. Eisenhower, 34 National Security Advisory Brent Scowcroft, and General H. Norman 35 36 Schwarzkopf, as well as astronauts Frank Borman, Edwin E. "Buzz" 37 Aldrin, Edward White II, and Michael Collins; and 38 39 WHEREAS, Graduates of the United States Military Academy 40 have made great contributions to society in a variety of areas, including 41 engineering, education, science, and the arts; and 42 43 WHEREAS, Throughout the history of the United States Military 44 Academy, the nation has called upon its graduates to serve and protect the 45 country both at home and abroad; and 46 47 WHEREAS, The nation continues to call upon the graduates of the 48 United States Military Academy to serve and protect the country in the 49 continuing war against terrorism; and 50 51 WHEREAS, Now, more than ever, it is fitting to pay tribute to the 52 many graduates of the United States Military Academy who have served 53 their country bravely and faithfully, and to the institution that has 54 produced such commendable graduates; now, therefore, 55

12 That there is hereby created a legislative committee, (1)hereinafter referred to as the "committee", to investigate and act as a 13 fact-finder concerning the attack that occurred at Columbine High School 14 on April 20, 1999, and the events surrounding that attack, and to 15 recommend any legislative changes found necessary as a result of its 16 17 investigation. The committee shall meet during the 2002 regular session 18 of the Sixty-third General Assembly and in the interim after such session. 19

20 (2) (a) That the committee shall consist of six members as 21 follows: 22

(I) Three members of the House of Representatives appointed by
 the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and

(II) Three members of the Senate, two of whom shall be appointed
by the President of the Senate and one of whom shall be appointed by the
Minority Leader of the Senate.

30 (b) No more than three members of the committee shall be from 31 the same political party.

33 (3) That the committee shall have, at a minimum, the following
34 duties:
35

(a) To select legal counsel to conduct an investigation into the
attack occurring at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999, and the
events leading up to that attack, and to direct the investigation by such
legal counsel;

(b) With the assistance of the legal counsel selected, to collect
documents and testimony concerning the events surrounding the attack at
Columbine High School on April 20, 1999;

(c) To authorize the issuance of subpoenas or subpoenas duces
 tecum pursuant to subsection (6) of this Resolution; and

(d) To issue a report of its findings, which may include
 recommended legislation, to the General Assembly and the public on or
 before December 1, 2002.

(4) That, pursuant to section 2-3-1001, Colorado Revised Statutes,
the Committee on Legal Services is directed to retain and pay the
compensation of the legal counsel selected pursuant to subsection (3) (a)
of this Resolution from moneys allocated to the Committee on Legal
Services for legal fees from appropriations made by the General

1 Assembly.

2 3 (5) That, pursuant to section 2-2-313, Colorado Revised Statutes, 4 all testimony of witnesses shall be taken as depositions by legal counsel 5 retained on behalf of the committee pursuant to subsection (4) of this Resolution. Written transcripts of all such depositions shall be prepared 6 7 and shall be made available to the public once the final report of the 8 committee is submitted. 9

10 (6) That, pursuant to Rule 33 of the Joint Rules of the Senate and 11 the House of Representatives, the General Assembly hereby vests in the 12 committee the power to subpoena witnesses, to take testimony under oath, and to assemble records, documents, and other evidence by 13 14 subpoena duces tecum. The issuance of any subpoena shall be approved 15 by a majority of the members of the committee. No person who was a student enrolled at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999, shall be 16 17 compelled to testify.

18 19 (7) That the members of the committee shall be compensated as provided in section 2-2-307, Colorado Revised Statutes, for attendance 20 21 at meetings of the committee. 22

23 (8) That the Legislative Council staff and the Office of Legislative 24 Legal Services staff shall be available to assist the committee in carrying 25 out its duties. 26

27 (9) That all expenditures, except for the compensation and 28 expenses of the legal counsel retained pursuant to subsection (4) of this 29 Resolution, incurred while conducting this study shall be approved by the 30 chair of the Legislative Council and paid by vouchers and warrants drawn 31 as provided by law from moneys allocated to the Legislative Council for 32 legislative studies from appropriations made by the General Assembly. 33

34 (10) That the committee shall make a report to the General 35 Assembly no later than December 1, 2002. 36

37 (11) That the committee shall not be considered an interim 38 committee pursuant to Rule 24A of the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives; however, any bill recommended by the 39 40 committee shall be exempt from the five-bill limit established in Rule 24 41 (b) (1) (A) of the Joint Rules of the Senate and House of Representatives. 42
