On motion of Senator Thiebaut, and with the unanimous consent of those elected to the Senate, the Senate stood in recess to hear the opening day remarks of Senate President Matsunaka and Minority Leader Andrews. The text of their remarks follows.

President Matsunaka's Remarks:

Reverend Tolzmann, Senator Andrews, colleagues, friends.

This is the eighth, and last time, I will stand for the opening of a legislative session, and I still get the same feelings as my first year: apprehension at the responsibilities we as legislators bear for the people of Colorado, and a sense of wonder at the opportunities our democracy provides us.

As I thought about the challenges of this session, a quote by author and philosopher Barbara J. Winter stuck in my mind --

"When you come to the edge of all the light you know, and are about to step off into the darkness of the unknown, faith is knowing one of two things will happen. There will be something to stand on, or you will be taught how to fly.

We are poised for flight in this session. After serving the people of Colorado for the last eight years, I know this. That we in Colorado have a great gift -- one solid and enduring unlike in any other state. It's called Colorado values.

These values -- sharing responsibilities, giving back to our communities and acting with courage – are at the core of our experience. If we follow these values, there is no limit to how high we can fly, or how much we can do. As the 2002 legislative session opens, our resolve to draw on Colorado's values, and to strengthen our families, has only deepened.

Don't let the cynics tell you that because this is an election year, nothing positive will happen under this dome. Colorado has a proud heritage of political strength and courage. I personally draw inspiration from Republican Governor, Ralph Carr, who demonstrated great political courage by condemning the internment of Japanese Americans. Governor Carr may have lost his political career through his actions, but he maintained his conviction and gained a well-deserved position in our history.

I've had the privilege of going on a unique journey across Colorado this past year, traveling thousands of miles – in nearly every county – accompanied by friends from the House and Senate. We listened to the people of Colorado. They told us one thing – that the Colorado dream is in danger.

Our quality of life suffers from traffic and congestion. Our educational system is still

shaken from years of neglect. Our open spaces and mountain vistas lack the protection they deserve. And most seriously, too many of our families face the anxiety of economic recession, and the uncertainty of a health care system in crisis.

Today, Colorado again needs political courage.

Our success this session will not be about which party is right or wrong, but what's best for Colorado. That means ensuring a quality of life for people who live in Colorado today....and ensuring a better life for our children tomorrow. This is a Colorado first agenda, NOT a special interests agenda.

As a fourth generation Coloradan, I know we can learn from the lessons of those who have 12 gone before us. Let's resolve to draw on our Colorado's values to strengthen our families, 13 provide health care to all those who need it, give educators the tools they need to teach our children, ensure that our communities are safe and that our economy is healthy all across this great state.

Over the last 40 years the state legislature has given away over 100 special interest tax cuts and exemptions, including hundreds of millions dollars worth in 1999. But just three years later the folly of permanent tax cuts is clear. The Colorado investment fund – our budget surplus – is gone, and with it much of our prosperity.

And though we face difficult decisions about cutting budgets and balancing priorities, we will hold to the principals that fiscal responsibility does not mean buying voters' affection, that the state budget isn't just your money or my money but OUR money, and that we will not and cannot stabilize our budget on the backs of the poor, the distressed, our schools or our families.

Examples abound of how we can rededicate our legislative agenda toward our communities and our families. One fifth grade class at Bill Metz Elementary School in Monte Vista made public service announcements in support of their community. Another elementary school class visits nursing homes to comfort its residents. This is the spirit of courage and community that will revitalize our families and restore the promise of Colorado.

We can work together to revitalize our economy. Let's support modifying our energy portfolio to include renewable energies as it will help towns like Peetz, which just opened a wind farm that created four new jobs. Multiply that in rural towns across Colorado and the number of families sustained with new jobs starts to add up.

This year let's make substantive repairs to the CSAP tests and report cards because you know, as I do, that a good doctor does more than just tell us we are sick. A good doctor diagnoses the illness and prescribes a specific treatment. I challenge us to be good education doctors and make our CSAP tests truly diagnostic so that we can work to improve education, not just label schools and children.

Last year, through bi-partisan compromise we made strides toward a solution on growth. But, the job is far from complete. We can again reach bi-partisan agreement on easing the impacts of growth on our schools and strengthening the tools that allow communities to plan for growth.

Rising health insurance rates hurt every community, every business, and every family. Small businesses cannot absorb the higher costs of health care and shifting costs to business will not restore jobs and prosperity to Colorado. Instead, we must be open to new ideas to deliver health care in the rural areas, new ways to pay for health care, and to do more on prevention of chronic diseases and illnesses. Aside from innovation, we need more consumer protection. We must look at new ideas to hold down costs, and to make insurance companies accountable by supporting a bill to have an office of consumer counsel to review every rate filing.

But the area where we most lack political courage and where every Coloradan knows we need immediate solutions, is transportation. We have the countdown to gridlock on the front range and the countdown to failure of our roads in the rural areas. It's time to end the delay and get real transportation solutions on the table today.

We will push to give RTD the authority it needs so the people can decide whether to complete the light rail system that the Front Range so desperately needs.

We will work to foster creation of New Colorado prosperity corridors to help bring economic development to those that need it most.

As we speak, groups like the Denver Metro Chamber of Commerce are evaluating a range

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of ideas to raise the revenue needed to close our \$30 billion investment gap. Working with them, perhaps we can move past the name-calling and toward responsible solutions for meeting our future transportation needs.

We will work to restore a measure of local control over how we invest our rural transportation dollars.

And, perhaps most importantly, we will strive to impose more accountability and responsibility on those in control of our transportation dollars. We have CSAP – the accountability program for schools. Let's also institute TSAP – the Colorado Transportation Accountability Program. We will scrutinize how our transportation dollars are managed and work to ensure we get the most out of our transportation resources.

We are a select group of 35 senators, and I am proud to call all of you my colleagues and my friends. For those of us who are term-limited or have said this is their last year — Senator Perlmutter, Senator Thiebaut, Senator Pascoe, Senator Hernandez, Senator Epps – we have one last opportunity to finish the work we started.

So let's not shrink from disagreeing in this session, it's the public debate that makes the legislative process a healthy one. Let's do our best to avoid the temptation in an election year to attach partisan labels. Rather, let's do the truly hard work needed to come up with bipartisan solutions. Let's dedicate ourselves, like the fifth grade classes in Monte Vista,

Three hundred sixty-six days in the minority, and this is already my fourth speech on opening day. I am ripping through these things twice as fast as Sen. Feeley ever did -starting to run out of material.

So there's just one word I hope you would remember from my comments today – just the one word – PERSPECTIVE. A good way to keep perspective is to take the long view, so let me call three witnesses from the pages of history – KOA radio's legendary Pete Smythe 45 America's second president, John Adams – and ancient Israel's King David.

Pete Smythe, of course, was the self-proclaimed Mayor of East Tincup, Colorado, and in that capacity he commanded more cracker-barrel cowboy wisdom than Sen. Chlouber and Sen. Isgar put together.

If you asked Pete about a political deal that seemed too good to be true, he might say, "Never put down your gun to hug a grizzly."

If you asked him about the interest groups at budget time, he'd say, "Never ask a barber if he thinks you need a haircut."

If you asked him about talking a bill to death at this microphone, he'd say, "Never miss a good chance to shut up.'

My point is that perspective means always being able to laugh at ourselves. Let's remember that for the next 120 days.

John Adams held the thankless job of Vice President under George Washington, then became President and led our young nation through its first undeclared war. In a letter to his wife Abigail, he wrote this:

"I must study politics and war, that my sons may have liberty to study mathematics and philosophy. My sons ought to study mathematics and philosophy, geography [and] natural history... commerce and agriculture -- in order to give their children a right to study paintings [and] poetry, music [and] architecture....

Let's keep the Adams perspective and remember that what we do here is done for the long future, for generations unborn. We 35 senators are trustees of something precious. The easy times of peace and prosperity are only a memory right now, but if we keep our trust, we can help bring them round again.

We should make a virtue of necessity in this tight budget year by finding ways for government to operate leaner and still deliver good service.

We should keep Colorado's highway expansion program high on the list of essential spending priorities.

We should do our duty and agree on a new congressional map this month, instead of copping out to the courts.

We should revise the legislative reapportionment process so that next time, this branch is not subordinated to the judicial and executive branches.

We should make sure our state is doing everything possible to support Operation Enduring Freedom, the counterattack against global terrorism.

Several weeks ago, Sens. Gordon, Hanna, Lamborn, and I were together in Jerusalem, where we felt surprisingly at home. There too, contentious democracy and courage in the face of terror are facts of daily life.

I thought of King David, a great ruler in that city and a great servant of God, author of the Book of Psalms. One of the psalms gives a vision of ideal government when it says: "Mercy and truth are met together; righteousness and peace have kissed each other."

Just imagine, as we legislate during this session, if both the work we do and the way we do it could be always truthful and at the same time always merciful. Imagine if we could argue our positions righteously and yet treat each other peaceably.

Imagine if we never, ever kidded ourselves that the end justifies the means, or that winning is more important than honor, or that anything is more important than people – individual human beings in God's image.

That would be real perspective. That would be real public service. Why not make it our standard for this year?
