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WHEREAS, Weapons of mass destruction and related materials and technologies are becoming available from an increasing number of sources worldwide, and hostile nations and extremist and terrorist groups are attempting to acquire and use those materials and technologies to develop and deploy nuclear, radiological, biological, and chemical weapons; and

WHEREAS, Terrorist groups have already conducted chemical and biological attacks against civilian targets in the United States and other parts of the world as well as the terrible terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, in the United States, and have demonstrated to the government of the United States the need to provide adequate planning, training, and countermeasures to address these threats against America and Americans in the future; and

WHEREAS, As part of its response, the United States government 56 has begun to provide for and fund, through the United States Departments

of Defense, Justice, Energy, and other agencies, training and exercises in order to improve the preparedness of state and local emergency response personnel to allow such response personnel to be able to properly respond to radiological, biological, and chemical materials; and

WHEREAS, The Transportation Technology Center, Inc. (TTCI), a subsidiary of the Association of American Railroads, established in 1985, currently operates the Emergency Response Training Center (ERTC) at the Transportation Technology Center located in Pueblo County, Colorado, to train chemical industry, government, and public sector emergency response agencies, emergency response contractors, and transportation service industry emergency response personnel to safely handle chemical, biological, and explosive hazardous materials accidents and spills, and has trained over 20,000 students from all over the world; and

WHEREAS, As part of its curriculum, the ERTC has developed, offers, and currently trains students in courses in Terrorism Response for the First Responder and Terrorism in Transportation; and

WHEREAS, TTCI is now attempting to apply for funding agreements and assistance from the United States Departments of Defense, Justice, Energy, and other agencies in order to expand its training offerings for responders to incidents involving the use of weapons of mass destruction and related materials; and

WHEREAS, It is in the best interest of the citizens and residents of Pueblo County and the State of Colorado to assist TTCI in that effort to obtain those funding agreements and assistance in order to allow for greater utilization of the ERTC, allow the ERTC to train a greater number of emergency responders to weapons of mass destruction and related materials incidents, and to assist in the provision of greater security and protection for our citizens and residents, as well as all of the citizens and residents of the United States; and

WHEREAS, In order to best assist TTCI in this effort, it is also in the best interest of the citizens and residents of the State of Colorado to designate TTCI's ERTC as Colorado's State Training Center for Domestic Preparedness; and

WHEREAS, It is also in the best interest of the citizens and residents of the State of Colorado to assist TTCI in its efforts to obtain a similar designation from the United States government; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

That the Transportation Technology Center, Inc., Emergency Response Training Center is hereby designated as the State of Colorado's State Training Center for Domestic Preparedness.

Be It Further Resolved, That the emergency responders employed by the various agencies of the State of Colorado, as well as those emergency responders employed by the several local government and political subdivisions of the State of Colorado, are encouraged to utilize

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TTCI's Emergency Response Training Center for all of their emergency response training needs regarding transportation-related incidents involving weapons of mass destruction and related materials.
