The state board shall 3 PROMULGATE RULES ESTABLISHING THE METHOD OF CALCULATING THE 4 COMPOSITE OF THE STUDENTS' ACADEMIC GROWTH AMOUNTS AND 5 ESTABLISHING THE SCALE REFLECTING "EXCELLENT", "HIGH", "AVERAGE", "LOW", AND "UNSATISFACTORY" ACADEMIC GROWTH ON THE SCHOOL 6 7 LEVEL. EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT THAT PARTICIPATES IN THE PILOT 8 PROGRAM SHALL DETERMINE WHETHER TO PROVIDE NOTICE OF A SCHOOL'S 9 ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING TO THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS ENROLLED IN 10 THE SCHOOL BY INCLUDING, AT THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S EXPENSE, AN 11 ADDENDUM TO THE SCHOOL'S ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT, AS ALLOWED 12 PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-605 (11).

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14 (b) For the 2005-06 school year, and for school years 15 THEREAFTER, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ANNUALLY ASSIGN A RATING FOR ACADEMIC GROWTH TO EACH PUBLIC SCHOOL OF "EXCELLENT", "HIGH", 16 17 "AVERAGE", "LOW", OR "UNSATISFACTORY". THE SCHOOL ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING SHALL BE BASED ON A COMPOSITE OF THE AMOUNT OF 18 19 ACADEMIC GROWTH, AS DETERMINED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4) OF 20 THIS SECTION, ACHIEVED BY STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOL, 21 ON THE CSAP ASSESSMENTS IN THE AREAS OF READING, WRITING, AND 22 MATHEMATICS. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL APPLY THE RULES ESTABLISHED 23 BY THE STATE BOARD PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (a) OF THIS SUBSECTION 24 (11) IN CALCULATING THE COMPOSITE OF THE STUDENTS' ACADEMIC 25 GROWTH AMOUNTS AND ASSIGNING THE RATING FOR ACADEMIC GROWTH. 26 EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT SHALL DETERMINE WHETHER TO PROVIDE NOTICE 27 OF A SCHOOL'S ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING TO THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS 28 ENROLLED IN THE SCHOOL BY INCLUDING, AT THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S 29 EXPENSE, AN ADDENDUM TO THE SCHOOL'S ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT, AS 30 ALLOWED PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-605(11).

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1 BETWEEN THE 2002-03 SCHOOL YEAR AND THE 2004-05 SCHOOL YEAR AND 2 WHETHER THE GROWTH RATES FOR STUDENTS AT EACH ACHIEVEMENT 3 LEVEL WERE COMPARABLE; 4 5 (V) WHETHER THE QUESTIONS INCLUDED IN THE CSAP 6 ASSESSMENTS ARE SUFFICIENT TO MEASURE GROWTH AT EACH 7 ACHIEVEMENT LEVEL FOR READING, WRITING, AND MATHEMATICS AND, IF 8 NOT, WHETHER ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS ARE NEEDED AND THE AREAS IN 9 WHICH THEY ARE NEEDED; 10 11 (VI) WHETHER THE ACADEMIC GROWTH RATINGS COMPUTED 12 PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION ARE SUFFICIENTLY CREDIBLE TO PROVIDE 13 SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS AND WHETHER THEY SHOULD BE 14 INCLUDED ON THE ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTS PREPARED PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-605; 15 16 17 (VII) WHETHER THE LEVELS OF INCREASE ESTABLISHED BY THE 18 DEPARTMENT PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (a) OF SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS 19 SECTION AND THE CATEGORIES OF ACADEMIC GROWTH ESTABLISHED BY 20 RULE PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (b) OF SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION 21 ADEQUATELY MEASURE EACH YEAR OF ACADEMIC GROWTH; 22 23 (VIII) WHAT ARE THE APPROPRIATE STANDARDS FOR DETERMINING 24 THE CATEGORIES OF ACADEMIC GROWTH; 25 26 (IX) WHETHER THE ACADEMIC GROWTH INFORMATION REPORTS 27 AND THE ACADEMIC GROWTH PROFILES CONTAIN THE APPROPRIATE AND 28 NECESSARY INFORMATION FOR MEASURING AND IMPROVING ACADEMIC 29 GROWTH, AND, IF NOT, WHAT INFORMATION WOULD BE APPROPRIATE; 30 31 (X) THE MANNER IN WHICH THE STANDARDS FOR ACCOUNTABILITY 32 AND ACCREDITATION MAY BE MORE EFFECTIVELY HARMONIZED AND 33 IMPLEMENTED. 34 35 (b) FOLLOWING RECEIPT OF THE REPORT PREPARED PURSUANT TO 36 PARAGRAPH(a) OF THIS SUBSECTION (12), THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL 37 CONSIDER WHETHER TO CONTINUE THE ACADEMIC GROWTH PROGRAM AS 38 AN INDEPENDENT PROGRAM OR TO CONSOLIDATE THE ACADEMIC GROWTH 39 RATINGS WITH THE ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTS PREPARED PURSUANT TO 40 SECTION 22-7-605 OR WITH FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS SPECIFIED IN THE "NO 41 CHILD LEFT BEHIND ACT OF 2001", PUBLIC LAW 107-110. 42 43 SECTION 2. 22-7-604 (2) and (6) (a), Colorado Revised 44 Statutes, are amended to read: 45 46 22-7-604. Academic performance - academic improvement -47 rating - designation and methodology. (2) EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE 48 PROVIDED IN PARAGRAPH (a) OF SUBSECTION (6) OF THIS SECTION, ratings assigned to public schools pursuant to this section shall be determined by 49 50 the levels of student achievement and improvement on all CSAP 51 assessments and curriculum-based, achievement college entrance exams administered by the public school in each school year pursuant to section 52 53 22-7-409. Each new CSAP assessment area and grade level shall enter 54 the calculations of ratings pursuant to this section at a weight equivalent 55 to that assigned to existing assessment areas and grade levels.

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1 (6) **School improvement measurement.** (a) Beginning with the 2 2001-02 school year, the department shall annually assign a rating for 3 academic improvement to each public school of "significant improvement", "improvement", "stable", "decline", or "significant 4 5 decline".
