REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE**EDUCATION**

After consideration on the merits, the Committee recommends the following:

HB02-1122 be amended as follows, and as so amended, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations with favorable recommendation:

Amend printed bill, page 3, line 19, strike "THE" and substitute "A".

Page 4, strike lines 2 through 4 and substitute the following:

"(e) THE GOAL FOR MOST STUDENTS, NO MATTER WHERE A STUDENT STARTS, IS TO ACHIEVE ACADEMIC GROWTH EQUIVALENT TO AT LEAST ONE ACADEMIC GRADE DURING A SCHOOL YEAR, AND, FOR STUDENTS WHOSE LEVEL OF ACHIEVEMENT IS BELOW PROFICIENT, THE GOAL IS TO ACHIEVE ACADEMIC GROWTH EQUIVALENT TO MORE THAN AN ACADEMIC GRADE DURING A SCHOOL YEAR;"

Page 6, strike lines 3 through 5 and substitute the following:

"SHALL RECEIVE AN ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING. EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT IS STRONGLY ENCOURAGED TO INCLUDE THE ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING FOR EACH PUBLIC SCHOOL IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICT ON THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S WEB SITE AND TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE ACADEMIC GROWTH RATINGS ACHIEVED BY EACH PUBLIC SCHOOL IN THE SCHOOL DISTRICT."

Page 9, line 10, strike "AND";

after line 10, insert the following:

"(IV) CONSISTENT SUCCESS IN COMPLYING WITH DEADLINES AND TIME FRAMES FOR THE DELIVERY OF INFORMATION AND PRODUCTS; AND";

line 11, strike "(IV)" and substitute "(V)";

line 16, strike "SECTION;" and substitute "SECTION WITHIN THE DEADLINES SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (5) OF THIS SECTION;"

strike lines 22 and 23 and substitute the following:
"PUBLIC SCHOOL."

Page 13, strike lines 25 through 27 and substitute the following:

"(11) **School academic growth rating.** (a) FOR THE 2002-03, 2003-04, AND 2004-05 SCHOOL YEARS, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ANNUALLY ASSIGN A RATING FOR ACADEMIC GROWTH TO EACH PUBLIC SCHOOL THAT PARTICIPATES IN THE PILOT PROGRAM. SUCH RATING SHALL BE "EXCELLENT", "HIGH", "AVERAGE", "LOW", OR "UNSATISFACTORY", BASED ON A COMPOSITE OF THE AMOUNT OF ACADEMIC GROWTH, AS DETERMINED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION, ACHIEVED BY STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOL, ON THE CSAP ASSESSMENTS IN THE AREA OF READING, FOR THE 2002-03 SCHOOL YEAR,

1 AND IN THE AREAS OF READING, WRITING, AND MATHEMATICS FOR THE
2 2003-04 AND 2004-05 SCHOOL YEARS. THE STATE BOARD SHALL
3 PROMULGATE RULES ESTABLISHING THE METHOD OF CALCULATING THE
4 COMPOSITE OF THE STUDENTS' ACADEMIC GROWTH AMOUNTS AND
5 ESTABLISHING THE SCALE REFLECTING "EXCELLENT", "HIGH", "AVERAGE",
6 "LOW", AND "UNSATISFACTORY" ACADEMIC GROWTH ON THE SCHOOL
7 LEVEL. EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT THAT PARTICIPATES IN THE PILOT
8 PROGRAM SHALL DETERMINE WHETHER TO PROVIDE NOTICE OF A SCHOOL'S
9 ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING TO THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS ENROLLED IN
10 THE SCHOOL BY INCLUDING, AT THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S EXPENSE, AN
11 ADDENDUM TO THE SCHOOL'S ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT, AS ALLOWED
12 PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-605 (11).

14 (b) FOR THE 2005-06 SCHOOL YEAR, AND FOR SCHOOL YEARS
15 THEREAFTER, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL ANNUALLY ASSIGN A RATING FOR
16 ACADEMIC GROWTH TO EACH PUBLIC SCHOOL OF "EXCELLENT", "HIGH",
17 "AVERAGE", "LOW", OR "UNSATISFACTORY". THE SCHOOL ACADEMIC
18 GROWTH RATING SHALL BE BASED ON A COMPOSITE OF THE AMOUNT OF
19 ACADEMIC GROWTH, AS DETERMINED PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (4) OF
20 THIS SECTION, ACHIEVED BY STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOL,
21 ON THE CSAP ASSESSMENTS IN THE AREAS OF READING, WRITING, AND
22 MATHEMATICS. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL APPLY THE RULES ESTABLISHED
23 BY THE STATE BOARD PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (a) OF THIS SUBSECTION
24 (11) IN CALCULATING THE COMPOSITE OF THE STUDENTS' ACADEMIC
25 GROWTH AMOUNTS AND ASSIGNING THE RATING FOR ACADEMIC GROWTH.
26 EACH SCHOOL DISTRICT SHALL DETERMINE WHETHER TO PROVIDE NOTICE
27 OF A SCHOOL'S ACADEMIC GROWTH RATING TO THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS
28 ENROLLED IN THE SCHOOL BY INCLUDING, AT THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S
29 EXPENSE, AN ADDENDUM TO THE SCHOOL'S ACCOUNTABILITY REPORT, AS
30 ALLOWED PURSUANT TO SECTION 22-7-605 (11).

32 (12) **Pilot program report.** (a) ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 15,
33 2005, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL SUBMIT TO THE GOVERNOR'S OFFICE AND
34 TO THE EDUCATION COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF
35 REPRESENTATIVES A REPORT ADDRESSING IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PILOT
36 PROGRAM AND THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PILOT PROGRAM IN MEASURING
37 STUDENTS' ACADEMIC GROWTH. AT A MINIMUM, THE REPORT SHALL

45 (II) WHETHER THE DEADLINES AND TIME FRAMES SPECIFIED IN THIS
46 SECTION ARE APPROPRIATE AND SUFFICIENT TO ALLOW THE DEPARTMENT
47 AND SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO PREPARE THE ACADEMIC GROWTH
48 INFORMATION REPORTS AND THE STUDENT GROWTH PROFILES FOR USE IN
49 THE UPCOMING SCHOOL YEAR;

50
51 (III) THE MANNER IN WHICH SCHOOL DISTRICTS USE THE
52 INFORMATION RECEIVED FROM THE ACADEMIC GROWTH INFORMATION
53 REPORTS, THE TYPES OF STRATEGIES SCHOOL DISTRICTS APPLY TO ADDRESS
54 STUDENTS' LEARNING NEEDS, AND THE SUCCESS OF THESE STRATEGIES;

56 (IV) WHETHER THE OVERALL GROWTH RATES INCREASED

1 BETWEEN THE 2002-03 SCHOOL YEAR AND THE 2004-05 SCHOOL YEAR AND
2 WHETHER THE GROWTH RATES FOR STUDENTS AT EACH ACHIEVEMENT
3 LEVEL WERE COMPARABLE;

5 (V) WHETHER THE QUESTIONS INCLUDED IN THE CSAP
6 ASSESSMENTS ARE SUFFICIENT TO MEASURE GROWTH AT EACH

8 NOT, WHETHER ADDITIONAL QUESTIONS ARE NEEDED AND THE AREAS IN
9 WHICH THEY ARE NEEDED;

11 (VI) WHETHER THE ACADEMIC GROWTH RATINGS COMPUTED
12 PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION ARE SUFFICIENTLY CREDIBLE TO PROVIDE

14 INCLUDED ON THE ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTS PREPARED PURSUANT TO
15 SECTION 22-7-605;

17 (VII) WHETHER THE LEVELS OF INCREASE ESTABLISHED BY THE
18 DEPARTMENT PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (a) OF SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS
19 SECTION AND THE CATEGORIES OF ACADEMIC GROWTH ESTABLISHED BY
20 RULE PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH (b) OF SUBSECTION (4) OF THIS SECTION
