health care employment sector in which there is a direct correlation between numbers of staff and quality of care; now, therefore,

WHEREAS, Aging and Adult Services in the state Department of Human Services has oversight of adult protection in Colorado; and

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WHEREAS, Within the state, the Office of the Attorney General, Developmental Disabilities Services within the Department of Human Services, and the Health Facilities Division within the Department of Public Health and Environment also have responsibilities that affect adults who need protective services; and

WHEREAS, Multiple jurisdictions, in addition to those state agencies specified in this Joint Resolution, have responsibilities for sub-sets of groups who are aging, disabled, and vulnerable, including counties and Community Centered Board catchment areas; and

WHEREAS, Many elderly adults in Colorado are in vulnerable situations and do not know who to contact for protection; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

(1) That there shall be a committee to meet in the interim after the conclusion of the 2002 Regular Session of the Sixty-third General Assembly to study reporting, oversight, and services for at-risk adults. Such interim committee shall consist of six members of the General Assembly. Three members of the committee shall be from the Senate, two appointed by the President of the Senate and one appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate and no more than two of the three members shall be from the same political party. Three members of the committee shall be from the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives after consultation with the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, and no more than two

(2) That the interim committee may study, but shall not be limited to, the following:

of the three members shall be from the same political party.

- (a) Requiring certain professions and occupations to report mistreatment of at-risk and vulnerable adults;
- (b) The process for filing, investigating, and responding to reports of abuse and neglect of at-risk and vulnerable adults;
- (c) Reviewing the agencies, both state and private, that have responsibility and authority to investigate and provide protection to at-risk and vulnerable adults;
- (d) Methods to ensure collaboration among the agencies of state government that have the authority to provide adult protective services;
- Assessing any possible cost-savings or efficiencies by combining adult protective services into one state agency.
- (3) That the interim committee shall meet four times during the 2002 interim.

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(4) That the interim committee shall report its findings and recommendations, including any recommended legislation, to the Legislative Council no later than October 15, 2002. The Legislative

Council shall report its findings and recommendations, including any recommended legislation, to the members of the First Regular Session of the Sixty-fourth General Assembly.

- (5) That expenditures incurred in the conduct of the study enumerated in this Joint Resolution shall be approved by the chairperson of the Legislative Council and paid by vouchers and warrants drawn as provided by law from funds allocated to the Legislative Council from appropriations made by the General Assembly.
- (6) That the legislative members of the committee shall be compensated as provided in section 2-2-307, Colorado Revised Statutes, for attendance at meetings of the committee.
- (7) That the Legislative Council staff and the Office of Legislative Legal Services staff shall be available to assist the committee in carrying out its duties.

HJR02-1070 by Representative(s) Cloer, Garcia--Concerning the recognition of firefighters who have given their lives in the line of duty.

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of the state of Colorado wishes to recognize and honor the many sacrifices of firefighters in the state of Colorado and across the country; and

WHEREAS, Colorado is honored to be the home of the International Fallen Firefighters Memorial, which since 1976 has honored over 1,000 men and women who gave their lives to protect the lives and property of their neighbors; and

WHEREAS, This year, over 400 names will be added to the Wall of Honor, due in large part to the brave men and women of the New York City Fire Department, who, without any thought of their own safety, rushed to help those caught in the World Trade Center towers on September 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Families from around the United States and Canada will travel to the International Fallen Firefighters Memorial as a way to honor and remember fallen family, friends, and comrades; and

WHEREAS, The state of Colorado opens its heart and homes to embrace our nation's firefighters and their families during this time of healing and remembrance; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

That we, the members of the General Assembly of the state of Colorado, hereby recognize the courage and dedication of the brave men

and women who make firefighting their profession or avocation, and applaud them for their untiring dedication to protecting the lives of others.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent to the Colorado State Fire Fighters' Association, Colorado Professional Fire Fighters Association, Colorado Springs Professional Fire Fighters Association I.A.F.F. (International Association of Firefighters) Local 5, and Richard Haugen, Executive Director of I.A.F.F. Fallen Fire Fighter Memorial.

HJR02-1071 by Representative(s) Cloer, Snook, Mace, Coleman, Garcia, Lawrence, Sanchez, Vigil; also Senator(s) Hernandez--Concerning the recognition of Colorado's Hispanic population and designating a month to acknowledge their contributions to the state.

WHEREAS, The presence of Hispanics in the state of Colorado predates the declaration of statehood, and, as among the first to settle in the state, Hispanics and their descendants have had a profound and lasting influence on the state's history, values, and culture; and

WHEREAS, The name Colorado is of Hispanic origin meaning reddish in color due to the reddish color of the soil that pervades the state; and

WHEREAS, Outside of the numerous Native American cultures who inhabited the region, Hispanics such as Francisco Vasquez de Coronado, Juan de Onate, and Padre Silvestre Velez de Escalante were the first to explore and later settle Colorado; and

WHEREAS, While there were attempts to create settlements in the late 1700s, the first successful settlement came when the town of San Luis was founded in 1851 as the first permanent Hispanic settlement in the state, followed quickly by Trinidad; and

WHEREAS, Since the times of settlement, the Hispanic population of Colorado has shown a deep commitment to family, community, and religion; and

WHEREAS, Hispanics have played a prominent role in the agricultural development of Colorado, through their backbreaking work on numerous farms throughout the state and the sugar beet fields of eastern and northern Colorado, fueled by their incredibly strong work ethic; and

 WHEREAS, Throughout Colorado it is clearly visible that Hispanics have played and continue to play an integral role in literature, art, architecture, cuisine, music, television, dance, athletics, politics, the military, and business, and in the overall development of the state; and

WHEREAS, Businesses and community organizations such as the Colorado Hispanic League, the Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, LARASA (Latin American Research and Service Agency), and others are committed to actively promoting the economic growth and development

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of Hispanic businesses, improving the health, education, and self-sufficiency of the Hispanic community, and overall improving the lives of Hispanics who call Colorado home; and

WHEREAS, According to the Denver Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the number of businesses owned and operated by Hispanics in Colorado has increased by leaps and bounds in the last 30 years and makes up the largest composition of minority-owned businesses by an overwhelming margin in the state; and

WHEREAS, According to the 2000 census, Hispanics make up 17.1% of Colorado's population of 4.3 million, with the percentage increasing yearly, and are a thriving force in our society and a vital part of Colorado's economy and culture; and

WHEREAS, It is appropriate to celebrate Colorado's rich Hispanic heritage by designating the period between September 15th and October 15th as Colorado Hispanic Heritage Month; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

That we, the members of the General Assembly of the state of Colorado, hereby recognize the Hispanic population of Colorado and the important role they have played in shaping Colorado as it exists today and the important and ever expanding role that Hispanics will play in Colorado's future development, and hereby proclaim that Colorado shall designate the period between September 15th and October 15th as Colorado Hispanic Heritage Month.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent to Governor Bill Owens, the Colorado Springs Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the Denver Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, and LARASA.

HJR02-1072 by Representative(s) Alexander--Concerning designation of the month of May as Foster Care Month in Colorado.

WHEREAS, The family, serving as the primary source of love, identity, self-esteem, and support, is the very foundation of our communities and our State; and

WHEREAS, In Colorado, there are 4,300 foster parents providing children with safe, secure, and stable homes along with compassion and nurturing; and

WHEREAS, Families, who open their homes and hearts to children whose families are in crisis, play a vital role helping children and families heal and reconnect and launching children into successful adulthood; and

WHEREAS, Foster parents are part of a treatment team working toward permanency for all children; and

HJR02-1073 by Representative(s) Lawrence--Concerning awareness of Autism, and, in connection therewith, designating April 2002 as Autism Awareness Month and April 27, 2002, as Autism Awareness Day.

WHEREAS, Autism is a complex developmental disability that typically appears during the first 3 years of life, estimated to occur in one in 500 individuals and 4 times more prevalent in boys than in girls, but knowing no racial, ethnic, or social boundaries; and

WHEREAS, Autism affects the normal development of the brain in the areas of social interaction and communication skills; and

WHEREAS, Children and adults with Autism typically have difficulties with verbal and nonverbal communication, social interactions, and leisure or play activities; and

WHEREAS, Autistic children typically have a host of biomedical and neurological problems as well because their intestines are so damaged that they cannot absorb nutrients essential for optimal brain function; and

WHEREAS, Persons with Autism have impaired liver and kidney functions, causing their bodies to store up high levels of toxins found in the environment such as lead, mercury, arsenic, and other heavy metals, and their immune systems are compromised to the extent that they cannot fight off even the simplest of fungal, parasitic, and bacterial infections; and

WHEREAS, Children do not outgrow Autism, there is no cure, it is a lifelong disability, persons with Autism have normal life expectancies, and Autism affects over one-half million individuals in the United States, making it more prevalent than Down Syndrome, childhood

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 WHEREAS One out of every 250 children born in the Unite

diabetes, and childhood cancer combined; and

WHEREAS, One out of every 250 children born in the United States each year is diagnosed with Autism; and

WHEREAS, Autism has wide-ranging implications, not only for the diagnosed individual but also for his or her entire family; and

WHEREAS, Early diagnosis, research, training, education, and therapies are vital to reducing the effects of Autism; and

WHEREAS, Significant progress has been made in the last 30 years in the areas of research, medicine, diagnostic issues, and therapies for Autism, resulting in an improved quality of life for individuals with Autism and for their families; and

WHEREAS, During the month of April, Autism awareness groups and nonprofit organizations will educate the public about Autism to dispel myths and misconceptions about the disorder and inform parents and professionals about available services; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

That we, the members of the Sixty-third General Assembly, in an effort to heighten the awareness of people to the prevalence of Autism, declare April 2002 as Autism Awareness Month and April 27, 2002, as Autism Awareness Day in Colorado.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent to the Colorado Chapter of the Autism Society of America.

The following resolution was read by title and referred to the committee indicated:

HR02-1015 by Representative(s) Sanchez--Concerning the restoration of funding for state family planning services.

Committee on Health, Environment, Welfare, & Institutions

WHEREAS, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains has provided state family planning services in full compliance with the Colorado constitution for many years through a contract with the state Department of Public Health and Environment; and

WHEREAS, Approximately thirteen thousand low-income women rely on government-funded family planning services provided by Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains consisting of family planning, gynecological examinations, basic lab tests and screening tests for high blood pressure, anemia, breast and cervical cancer, sexually transmitted diseases and HIV, pregnancy testing, and sterilization services; and

 WHEREAS, Colorado ranks 20th in the nation in the provision of contraceptive services to women in need, serving only 47% of those needing care; and

WHEREAS, Nearly half of all pregnancies in Colorado are unintended and almost 40% of women who gave birth in our state said their pregnancies were either mis-timed or unwanted; and

WHEREAS, Contraceptive services in Colorado help avert thirty-two thousand unintended pregnancies each year; and

WHEREAS, In some rural and mountainous areas of the state, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains is the only provider of such services in that community or is the closest provider for miles; and

WHEREAS, Article V, Section 50 of the Colorado Constitution provides that public funds shall not be used by the state to pay or otherwise reimburse, directly or indirectly, any person or agency for the performance of any induced abortion; and

WHEREAS, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains has provided family planning services for many years following a segregation policy established by the Department of Public Health and Environment that required a facility performing induced abortions to segregate public funds; and

WHEREAS, In a 1998 audit, the State Auditor's Office found that the segregation policy followed by Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains complied with the state constitutional prohibition and that none of the clinics used state or federal funds to perform terminations of pregnancies or were located in the same facilities; and

WHEREAS, In 1999, the Department of Public Health and Environment issued a new interpretation of the constitutional requirement by providing that any facility that is affiliated with a facility that performs induced abortions must show certain indicators of independence from the facility that performs induced abortions, including separate incorporation, separate facilities, and separate financial records; and

WHEREAS, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains took great steps to follow this new affiliation requirement by forming a separate corporation, Planned Parenthood Services Corporation, to which it gave sole responsibility for performing induced abortions; and

WHEREAS, After separately incorporating, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains was awarded a contract to provide valuable family planning services in this state; and

WHEREAS, In the summer of 2001, the Department of Public Health and Environment contracted with an outside accounting firm to conduct a review of Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains; and

WHEREAS, Based upon such review and an unusually strict interpretation of the affiliation requirement, the Department of Public Health and Environment has now arbitrarily refused to contract with Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains for state family planning

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54 55 56 services, thus jeopardizing the health of low-income women and causing them to have to drive long distances to receive family planning services, pay fees for such services, or go without such services; and

WHEREAS, The review questioned the amount of rent charged to Planned Parenthood Services Corporation; and

WHEREAS, Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains leased space in conformity with the requirements of a nonprofit organization to maintain its property tax exemption; and

WHEREAS, The Office of the State Auditor reviewed the issues associated with the Department of Public Health and Environment's decision to not contract for state-funded family planning services with Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains and presented four recommendations to the Legislative Audit Committee on April 10, 2002; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

- (1) That the House of Representatives requests the Department of Public Health and Environment to support Recommendation Number 1 from the Office of the State Auditor that legislation should be proposed to clarify the constitutional provision which prohibits the public funding of abortions by defining what it means to indirectly reimburse or subsidize abortion activities and by establishing the criteria that would demonstrate sufficient independence to ensure state dollars are not used to indirectly fund abortions;
- (2) That, in response to Recommendation Number 2 of the Office of the State Auditor, the House of Representatives requests the State Board of Health to adopt rules establishing eligibility criteria for state family planning funds once legislation is enacted to give the State Board of Health the statutory authority to adopt rules;
- (3) That, in response to Recommendation Number 3 of the Office of the State Auditor, the House of Representatives recommends the Department of Public Health and Environment evaluate the rent charged by a nonprofit organization bidding to provide state family planning services based upon cost rather than fair market value;
- (4) That, in response to Recommendation Number 4 of the Office of the State Auditor, the House of Representatives requests the Department of Public Health and Environment to make efforts to ensure that the compliance reviews coincide with the annual independent audit as required by the family planning contract; and
- (5) That once the steps outlined in this resolution are completed, the Department of Public Health and Environment restore the eligibility of Planned Parenthood of the Rocky Mountains as a provider of state-funded family planning services without unnecessary regulations and with adequate funding.
