1 WHEREAS, The State of Colorado is facing one of the worst 2 3 drought conditions in recent times, and Colorado's farmers and ranchers throughout the state are suffering the effects of this drought; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Extraordinary measures are necessary to protect 6 public health, ensure public safety, and render relief for those most 7 severely impacted; and 8 9 WHEREAS, In times of great need, it is the hard work and 10 dedication of volunteers in the community that unselfishly contribute to 11 the success of overcoming dire situations; and 12 13 WHEREAS, Unique collaborations between private enterprise and 14 state, local, and federal governments have been created to solve critical 15 water supply problems caused by one of the worst droughts in Colorado's 16 history; and 17 18 WHEREAS, ExxonMobil Corporation has agreed to provide 5,500 19 acre-feet of water it owns at Ruedi Reservoir at no cost for one year to 20 the Colorado River Water Conservation District to benefit Green 21 Mountain Reservoir contract holders left without water by the drought 22 conditions; and 23 WHEREAS, Local public and private entities such as the City of 24 25 New Castle, the City of Rifle, the Town of Carbondale, the Bureau of 26 Reclamation, the Redlands Water and Power Authority, the Middle Park 27 Water Conservancy District, the Ruedi Water and Power Authority, the 28 Basalt Water Conservancy District, Xcel Energy, the Orchard Mesa 29 Irrigation District, the Grand Valley Water Users Association, Grand 30 Valley Irrigation Company, and the Colorado River Water Conservation 31 District have collaborated as well to donate hundreds of acre-feet of water 32 to assist in relieving the drought conditions; and 33 34 WHEREAS, The volunteer efforts by these public and private 35 entities will provide enormous, immediate benefit to the ranchers, 36 farmers, firefighters, households, communities, and businesses suffering 37 from the drought; now, therefore, 38 39 Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third 40 General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring 41 herein: 42 43 That the General Assembly commends the collaborative 1. 44 volunteer efforts undertaken by private industry and federal, state, and 45 local governments to assist in relieving our drought-stricken Western 46 Slope. 47 48 2. 1 critical assignments. 2 3 *Be It Further Resolved*, That copies of this Resolution be sent to 4 each member of the state's congressional delegation, to the President of the United States, to the Governor, to the Executive Director of the Department of Corrections, and to any statewide organizations 5 6 7 representing counties and municipalities. 8 9 10 **INTRODUCTION OF MEMORIAL** 11 12 13 The following memorial was read by title and laid over until later in the 14 day: 15 16 **HM02S-1001** by Representative(s) Coleman--Memorializing Congress 17 to provide additional crop and livestock assistance due to 18 drought. 19 20 WHEREAS, Snowpack levels and precipitation from rainfall have 21 been far below normal for many western states, including Colorado; and 22 23 WHEREAS, Facing one of the most severe droughts in the state's 24 history, all Colorado counties have been designated disaster areas, as dry 25 conditions have greatly reduced the ability of farmers and ranchers to 26 produce their commodities and to provide related services; and 27 28 WHEREAS, The lack of moisture will drastically decrease the 29 harvest of many Colorado crops, such as wheat which is expected to yield 30 a crop that is 25-40% of a normal yield; and 31 32 WHEREAS, Irrigated farms on average have received only 15% 33 of the water they normally use for crop production; and 34 35 WHEREAS, In addition to making it more difficult to raise crops, 36 the extreme dryness also carries with it several secondary concerns, such 37 as the loss of top soil, soil erosion, and an increased possibility of insect 38 infestation; and 39 40 WHEREAS. Farmers who are unable to produce any crop at all 41 become ineligible for federal farm programs that would otherwise provide 42 financial assistance to equalize the market price and the county target 43 price; and 44 45 WHEREAS, The suffering state of agriculture directly impacts the prospects of raising livestock, by way of low-yielding feeder crops, 46 47 limited harvest foliage and forage, and the increasing price of hay and 48 other feed; and 49 50 WHEREAS, Livestock auction barns in the west are extending 51 their sale hours to accommodate the large numbers of livestock being sold 52 because ranchers cannot afford to feed their herds; and 53 54 WHEREAS, There is no insurance available for suffering livestock 55 producers; and

1 WHEREAS, Livestock and crop prices alike have been low since 2 3 1997, giving producers very little financial cushion for hard times; and 4 WHEREAS, The financial impact caused by the drought could be 5 6 devastating to Colorado's agricultural community, but will also have an overall effect on the economy of the entire state; and 7 8 WHEREAS, An allocation of nearly \$2.5 billion for disaster 9 assistance was originally included in the federal Farm Security and Rural 10 Investment Act of 2002, commonly known as the "2002 Farm Bill", but 11 this allocation was removed during conference committee deliberations 12 on the bill: and 13 14 WHEREAS, Members of Congress subsequently tried to make 15 disaster assistance moneys available by including an allocation in another 16 bill, but unfortunately, this attempt failed as well; now, therefore, 17 18 Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-third 19 General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 20 21 That we, the members of the House of Representatives, strongly 22 urge the United States Congress: 23 24 (1) To examine and adopt measures to allow producers of 25 agricultural commodities to receive short-term assistance in coping with 26 and responding to the drought conditions, such as the following: 27 28 (a) Directing the United States Department of Agriculture to 29 coordinate the availability of hay and other types of livestock feed for 30 those ranchers in drought areas from areas that are still producing 31 adequate amounts of such feed; 32 33 (b) Implementing tax code modifications that enable producers 34 who are forced to sell livestock during periods of drought to receive 35 additional time to reinvest the sale proceeds before having to pay capital 36 gains tax on the earnings, thus allowing the producer to wait until the 37 drought conditions have subsided before reinvesting; 38 39 (c) Allocating funds in the \$4-5 billion range to provide crop and 40 livestock producers with direct emergency assistance to be delivered 41 through existing Farm Service Agency channels; 42 (2) To develop comprehensive and integrated public policy that 43 44 identifies and implements long-term plans for combating the impact of 45 droughts, including components such as: 46 47 (a) Reexamining how drought relief assistance is provided and 48 elevating the manner in which it is provided to place drought assistance 49 on the same level of assistance that is provided to other natural disasters 50 such as wildfires, hurricanes, and floods; 51 52 (b) Researching farming methods and seed varieties that are 53 resistant to drought and long periods of low moisture; 54 55 (c) Examining the feasibility of prioritizing water allocations; 56

1 (d) Establishing a National Drought Council within the Federal Emergency Management Agency to provide an integrated and 2 3 coordinated approach toward minimizing the effects of drought and to educate and inform American citizens on how to prepare for and respond 4 5 to drought emergencies; 6

7 (e) More closely considering water availability when creating 8 public policy to manage growth, not only for consumption purposes, but 9 also being mindful of future drought potential as well.

10 11 *Be It Further Resolved*, That copies of this Memorial be sent to the 12 President of the United States, the Majority Leader of the United States 13 Senate, the Minority Leader of the United States Senate, the Majority 14 Leader of the United States House of Representatives, the Minority 15 Leader of the United States House of Representatives, and to each 16 member of the Colorado Congressional Delegation. 17
