especially in the era of term limits.

And speaking of term limits, I believe that the role reversal of majority and minority parties in the last two elections has taught both Republicans and Democrats some good lessons about walking in the other person's shoes. It's made us all better legislators. We are all in this together.

So today's change of party control does not change the respect that all 35 of us hold for one another. It does not change the obligation that all of us must fulfill under our constitutional oath of office. It certainly does not change the issues that face our state.

I count seven big issues that will challenge us this year:

- * We've got to balance the budget.
- * We've got to energize the economy and create jobs.
- * We've got to ensure ample water for Colorado's future.
- * We've got to put the brakes on the rising cost of auto insurance.
- * We've got to cool off the fever of overheated health care premiums.
- * We've got to guarantee educational excellence for every Colorado child.
- * We've got to get Colorado's highway system out of the 1970s and into the 21st century.

Budget, jobs, water – auto insurance and health insurance – education and transportation. Seven issues. Some people believe seven means luck. Others would say the lucky legislators are the ones that retired and left us with a deficit and a drought and a mountain of work to do.

Well, I say we can make our own luck. Our attitude will determine our accomplishment. Teamwork – toughness – flexibility – patience – listening – imagination – heart – I look around this chamber and I see men and women who possess those qualities in abundance – not just our senators but our staff – and it makes me confident that this can be an extremely productive session.

We are going to do good things in a good way – we're going to have a good time – and we are going to be good friends when it's over.

On the days when it doesn't seem that way – and there will be those – the best way to keep going is to put a human face on the trust we hold. That means remembering two groups of people – the people who are depending on us across the state – and the people who came before us here in this building.

Four million Coloradans look to us to represent them, care about them, and do right by them. That doesn't mean we should offer government paternalism. Far from it. Individual freedom and individual responsibility, limited government and a flourishing civil society, should be our goal.

But there are real live human beings who are going to be helped or hurt by every bill we consider, every dollar we spend. To illustrate, I want you to meet three special guests.

Watch Care Academy is a small, struggling, but remarkably effective independent school that educates low-income children in northeast Denver. It's located not far from Stedman Elementary, a Denver public school which is also fighting tough odds to help inner city kids.

Janie Perry is the director of Watch Care Academy, and she is here today with some of her students. Mrs. Perry, please stand up and let us greet you.

I wanted to showcase Watch Care Academy because I believe parental choice of schools is the civil rights issue of this new century. Because I also believe we need a better approach to Medicaid, a compassionate conservative approach, I want to showcase Salud Family Health Center in Fort Lupton.

Salud would be a frontline foxhole if health care for minorities and the poor were a war zone, which in some ways it is. There are too few staff, too few hours, and too little money to meet all the needs that walk in the door every day.

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Dr. Virgilio Licona is the associate medical director of that center, and he too is with us this morning. Dr. Licona, welcome to the Senate.

Government's number one responsibility is public safety. It's all the more urgent now because of the war against global terrorism, a war that began 16 months ago in New York and that may continue a month from now in Baghdad.

In law enforcement these days, one call may relate to a deadly methamphetamine lab and the very next one to a suspected Al Qaeda cell. Someone who knows that all too well, after being shot in the face on a routine traffic stop last fall but now about to return to active duty, is Denver policeman Kurt Peterson.

Officer Peterson is here with his fiancé, Patrolman Jan Wight. The Senate gratefully salutes both of you.

Another way of putting a human face on the trust we hold is to just look around us at the windows in this room. Before Ruth Stockton and John Love and these other leaders were commemorated in stained glass, they held some of the same responsibilities we do. Our predecessors kept their trust. Now it's our turn. Will we keep ours?

Every time I walk up the rotunda stairway, I feel a sense of awe at the pioneer generation and the statehood generation and the wartime generations that went before us. The men and women who built this beautiful State Capitol built for the ages. How about us?

History will judge. But I hope that the Senate of the 64th General Assembly will be remembered as one that lived up to the majesty of this grand building.

Let's hammer out decisions that are as solid as the granite in these walls. Let's build landmark legislation that stands as tall as the dome. Above all, let's be a Senate of character – character that shines like the gold on the dome.

Members, I thank you again for honoring me with the responsibilities of this gavel. I pledge to you in return the very best that I have to give. Together we can build for the ages. Colorado expects and deserves no less from us. Let's deliver.

In conclusion, I believe the simple prayer that Charles Dickens made famous for December 25 is equally appropriate for January 8, and for each day of this session: "God bless us, every one."

Senator Andrews recognized Minority Leader Senator Joan Fitz-Gerald to address the Senate.

Senator Fitz-Gerald's remarks:

Mister President, members of the Senate, families, friends and guests. Let me extend a special welcome to our new members on both sides of the aisle and to their families who undoubtedly sacrificed much to help them achieve this moment.

Colorado has a strong history of openness and tolerance, but in many ways our capitol has had its own glass ceiling and places of power where some members had not gone before.

I am proud to stand here today as 2003 signals female leadership for the first time in this state's history in the offices of Speaker of the House, Majority Leader of the Senate, as well as Minority leader of the Senate. I congratulate you.

On this very day, January 8th, 213 years ago President George Washington delivered the first State of the Union address. The original colonies had weathered a brutal war for independence from England and had formed a new nation. We in this Chamber, and indeed all over this nation, are the recipients of the untold sacrifices of previous generations.

All people are created equal and are entitled to govern themselves.

Each one of us in this chamber has an equal voice and an equal responsibility to the people of the districts that we represent. Whether man or woman, Republican or Democrat we have a responsibility to conduct our business in the best interest of the state.

We find ourselves in this 64th General Assembly not in the best of times. The first task at hand will be to balance our budget. We will have to make painful decisions by cutting dollars previously approved for valuable programs. Democrats have worked to balance the

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budget before and we will do it again this year.

To that end, I extend the hand of cooperation to our Republican colleagues. I have met with the Governor--and while we may have philosophical differences, we have shared our priorities and hope to find common ground.

Those differences should not prevent us from having a frank and honest discussion with the consumers of this state. And that includes everyone. Whether we drink water, drive on roads, purchase health insurance or attend a public school, we are all consumers of the state's goods and services. More than ever before, this year the legislature should focus on the Colorado Consumer.

Just four short years ago while the economy was booming and tax cuts were the top priority of this body, another Minority Leader, Senator Mike Feeley, spoke here on opening day and uttered these prophetic words.

"We are living in the best of times, but there are always business cycles and always will be business cycles. While we all hope the positive economic climate continues unabated it is unrealistic to assume that to be the case." How right he was.

It has been reported that Colorado is not alone because 31 other states face budget deficits. Colorado is the third worst in the country behind Alaska and Nevada for a budget gap as a percentage of the state's total budget. I don't believe that our citizens fully understand yet the devastating impacts this budget will have upon our daily lives.

Our responsibility is to see to it that despite our enormous economic downturn we maintain seamless running of this state's vital services.

Perhaps our biggest challenge is to provide a real economic package and jumpstart the economy. I would like to believe Governor Owens when he says that tax cuts provide economic stimulus, but with over 1.2 billion dollars in tax cuts over three years, unemployment is at an all time high with over 123,000 people in Colorado looking for work today.

We must search elsewhere for ways to increase tourism, attract new industry and support our small businesses.

We must provide quality education for our children and the economic advancement that our higher education system allows. We are looking forward to participating in the debate about how we fund higher education.

Franklin Roosevelt remarked during the years of the Great Depression "We cannot always build the future for our youth, but we can build our youth for the future."

We must ensure public health and provide health insurance relief to small businesses. It is our responsibility to address their issues of access to health care and relief from the rising cost of prescription drugs. With everyone pointing fingers, there has been no accountability to the insurance consumer.

We would like to join Rep. Dianne Hoppe as co-sponsors to her legislation to make it rain or snow. But lacking more snow and rain, we need to figure out ways to increase and improve existing storage capacity and encourage more conservation.

There are many Republicans and Democrats who have serious concerns about the "Big Straw" project. We simply cannot build massive new developments without long-term water plans with which to support them nor pit the Front Range water consumer against the Western Slope consumer.

Our Republican colleagues have talked about revisiting the transportation compromise we worked so hard to create last year. That compromise provides landmark funding for roads and transit. We negotiated that agreement in good faith and we hope that Governor Owens will stand by that deal.

We have a commitment to the justice system. We need the judicial branch to function efficiently and quickly so that all Coloradans who desire their day in court are afforded that opportunity with deliberate speed. Adequately staffing our courts is critical in criminal cases for victims of crime and for the innocent so that "liberty and justice for all" may ring true. In these tough economic times we must give courts the ability to charge fees to cover costs.

Colorado will participate in keeping our Nation safe, but we cannot sit by and passively

accept unfunded security mandates from Washington. The very survival of our communities is now more than ever in the hands of our firefighters, police and medical personnel, our first responders. We need a full partner in Washington to fund these critical endeavors.

We live in a dangerous world. Our great Nation must strive to increase our strength by decreasing our dependence on foreign sources of energy. In Colorado we are blessed with the wind, the sun and agricultural products that form the foundation of a renewable energy industry.

In rural Colorado, economic development tied to tapping renewable energy sources can form the new lifeblood for the plains. We propose to embrace a minimum renewable energy portfolio standard and start down the road to energy independence and job creation.

These are our priorities: addressing the budget crisis, jumpstarting the economy, affordable healthcare, water, education, transportation and energy. Our decisions should not be penny wise and pound-foolish. I hope we will put aside unneeded social legislation and focus on the priorities of the Colorado Consumer.

And so my fellow Senators, the challenge is ours. Let us make good use of the next 120 days. There is no time to waste. The eyes of the state are upon us. Many have placed their trust in us, both Republican and Democrat to leave this state in a better place when we adjourn in May. I know we have the talent, whether we have the will is ours to prove.
