18 WHEREAS, Forty years after the passage of the "Equal Pay Act
19 of 1963" and Title VII of the federal "Civil Rights Act of 1964", women
20 and people of color continue to suffer the consequences of inequitable
21 pay differentials; and
22

23 WHEREAS, According to statistics released in September 2002 by
24 the U.S. Census Bureau, year-round, full-time working women earned
25 only 76% of the earnings of year-round, full-time working men,
26 indicating little change or progress in pay equity since 1999; and
27

28 WHEREAS, Women of color fare even worse with African
29 American women earning 67% of the earnings of the highest earners and
30 Latinas earning only 54%; and
31

32 WHEREAS, Men of color also experience wage disparities with
33 African American men earning 79% of the earnings of the highest earners
34 and Latinos earning 63%; and
35

36 WHEREAS, According to an analysis of data in over 300
37 classifications provided by the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics in
38 2001, women earn less in every occupational classification for which
39 enough data is available, including occupations dominated by women
40 such as cashiers, retail sales, registered nurses, and teachers; and
41

42 WHEREAS, Here in Colorado, year-round, full-time working
43 women earn only 75 cents for every dollar earned by year-round,
44 full-time working men, and Colorado women's economic security is even
45 more at risk in the current economic downturn; and
46

47 WHEREAS, Over a working lifetime, this wage disparity costs the
48 average American woman and her family an estimated \$250,000 in lost
49 wages, impacting social security benefits and pensions; and
50

51 WHEREAS, Fair pay equity policies can be implemented simply
52 and without undue costs or hardship in both the public and private
53 sectors; and
54

55 WHEREAS, Fair pay strengthens the security of families today
56 and eases future retirement costs while enhancing the American

1 economy; and

2

3 WHEREAS, Tuesday, April 15th, symbolizes the day on which
4 the wages paid to American women catch up to the wages paid to men
5 from the previous year; now, therefore,

7 *Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-fourth*
8 *General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

10 (1) That Tuesday, April 15, 2003, be proclaimed Equal Pay Day
11 in Colorado; and

13 (2) That the House of Representatives urges Colorado citizens to
14 recognize the full value of women's skills and significant contributions to
15 the labor force and further encourages employers to conduct an internal
16 pay evaluation to ensure women are being paid fairly.
