On motion of Senator Gordon, and with a majority of those elected to the Senate having voted in the affirmative, the remarks of Senator Groff, Senator Mitchell, Senator Gordon, Senator McElhany, Senator Bacon and Senator Sandoval in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., were ordered spread upon the pages of the journal. 65

Senator Groff's remarks:

Each year I come to this sacred spot in this august chamber and talk about a true American hero. Who he was, what he was about and what he said.

I challenge the 35 of us to live up to the dream that he had for America; to live out his words and deeds and create a better Colorado and a better America.

And I was poised to do so today – and since April 4th of this year is the 40th anniversary of Dr. King’s speech against the Vietnam War at the Riverside Baptist Church in Harlem, New York I was poised to come here today to say that Dr. King wouldn’t be a supporter of the war in Iraq, which he wouldn’t, he wouldn’t be in favor of the surge that the President announced on Wednesday for \$100 billion being spent to make sure that that surge goes ahead or the \$1 billion being spent for a full Iraqi employment plan, without a full American employment plan.

He was asked at that time by civil rights leaders other than himself and those in his circle not to go forward with that historic speech, he was condemned for being so outspoken on the issue of the Vietnam War and many of the supporters of the movement deserted him – because they said what he was doing was anti-American and thoroughly irresponsible.

But Dr. King said when asked why he didn’t cancel the speech he replied his conscience wouldn’t let him do so. He said “I have moved to break the betrayal of my own silences and speak from the burnings of my own heart...I knew that I could never again raise my voice against the violence of the oppressed in the ghettos without having first spoken clearly to the greatest purveyor of violence in the world today – my own government.”

It is that quote, my own conscience, my dreams for Malachi and Moriah and my pastor’s – Regina Groff – sermon yesterday that has given me the strength to take a different tact today.

Because members, as hard as this is going to be – I have to echo the words of Dr. King – because I could not raise my voice from this well again and speak against legislation that is not crafted in the legacy of Dr. King’s dream for a complete America – legislation that undervalues our people and preys on their fears, legislation that continues the divisions in our state, in our society, and legislation that closes the paths to opportunity and access – or even to speak up for legislation that is crafted in the progressive dreams of Dr. King – if I didn’t speak up today from this spot to the some of the actions of my community that are breaking my heart and turning the dream into a nightmare.

As the highest-ranking African American elected official in Colorado and a child of the movement engineered by Dr. King, I would be skirting my historical electoral and historical responsibility if I didn’t speak on this occasion directly to my community and to my young people.

To the community I love and work for, I say that when the shot rang out, and the body fell, and the blood flowed and the spirit raised to the heavens, at that moment a new generational responsibility was created that moment on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, TN – a responsibility that falls on all of our shoulders equally.

A responsibility to create a culture of hope and hard work that would result in our ultimate entrance into the promise land; a culture of excellence – that would require us to expect the best and demand the best from our children and for our children, a culture that would respect our seniors, our women and our history and hold them in the esteemed that they should be held.

That culture has been built to a degree in my community- we have the Secretary of State, we have a United States Senator, the Governor of Massachusetts, Lieutenant Governors in Maryland and New York, forty-two members of Congress, a President of the State Senate in Illinois, President Pro Tems in Oregon, Washington, Alaska, Louisiana, Texas and the Centennial state-pastors and teachers, writers, attorneys, doctors, astronauts, business owners and CEOs and everyday people who do the right thing and uplift the legacy.

However, we’ve also created cultures that run counter to the legacy of Dr. King – cultures of death, disrespect, division and materialism – cultures resulting in a self-imposed genocide – where we are killing each other at an alarming rate. Where you receive more street credit for being shot and no credit for graduating from the finest universities in this country.

A culture that embraces and glorifies mediocrity and anti-intellectualism.

Now members, make no mistake, I understand Colorado and America are incomplete because of the racism and discrimination that still exist in America and Colorado, but it doesn't rise to the level of what our ancestors faced – and it is now time to shake the shackles of victimization and embrace the dream of Dr. King and the promise of America.

Because I love my community and I love my young people and I believe in our God's given greatness, I implore and challenge my community, my people to stop the violence, to put down the violence and pick up the legacy; of nonviolence.

To put down the guns and pick up the legacy; of peace.

To put down the mediocrity and pick up the legacy; of greatness.

To put down the disrespect and anti-intellectualism and pick up the legacy of love for each other and education.

The key to unlock the door of the promise land is melded only in part in this domed building over the next 114 days; but it is also melded in part by our ancestors and in part our actions over the course of our lives on a path with soiled with the blood which is still on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel, the cotton fields of Mississippi, the tobacco plants of the Carolina's and the passages of the underground railroad.

Let me paraphrase a song we sang yesterday in church...It is time that we tell the violence, and the disrespect, and the mediocrity and the anti-intellectualism to get thee behind us because victory today is ours.

I believe in my people in my community – and I believe that the dream still exist in us and with us; and it continues to be a beacon that guides us to a better Colorado and a better America – a better Colorado and a better America with my community again as the moral compass that directs our state and our country to live out the true meaning of its creed.

A compass that will direct us to build new cultures and new pathways;

A compass that will direct us to build a better future for our children;

A compass that will direct us – the Colorado State Senate – to strive over the next 114 days to create a Colorado to fulfill the promise that lies within us that will open opportunities and access for everyone;

A compass that will direct us to the promise land of King's imagination.

I believe in the dream, I believe in the legacy and I believe in the responsibility that falls on all of our shoulders, because my conscience won't let me believe otherwise.

May God bless the memory and the work of Dr. King, the Colorado State Senate and the great state of Colorado.

Senator Mitchell's remarks:

Members, I rise in participation of this commemoration also in support of the resolution. And also to express my appreciation to Senator Groff. If we received even a little bit of what was distilled upon him from his pastor's sermon on Sunday, I wish we had been there to hear the whole thing. I appreciate your words of leadership.

I rise also to make one particular observation about Rev. Martin Luther King. And that is as we consider his legacy, its fingerprints on society today, the benefits and richness and the steps in the right direction that our society has taken.

Sometimes, we are inclined to talk about the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, as a political organizer, or as a political scientist, or as a secular philosopher. When, in fact, the well-spring of his thinking, the source of his appreciation of truth, and his courage in delivering that truth, came from his belief in divine truth. He said of himself, "I am first and last a minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ". In fact, the doctor in Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, is not a PHD in political science but in theology. He was an ordained minister. His father was an ordained minister. His grandfather was an ordained minister. And he drew heavily upon the lessons of scripture and upon the teachings of Jesus.

Now why do I remind us of that well-known but sometimes overlooked truth. For 2 reasons: To appreciate the source of much of Martin Luther King's vision but also to remind us how richer we are today and how blessed we are that his voice was not deemed unfit for public discourse. Because he spoke as a man of faith. Because he lead a

congregation. Because he declared his beliefs from scripture. How lucky we are that the voices of his day did not say: "Keep it in the chapel. That is not fit for public dissemination."

Members, I rise in appreciation for the resolution, for the day of commemoration and in honor of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King.

Senator Gordon's remarks:

I offer remarks by Martin Luther King as they relate to Peace and War.

"Man must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love."

"Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter."

"In the end, we will remember not the words of our enemies, but the silence of our friends."

Senator McElhany's remarks:

Just a couple of thoughts. I always think about three sort of general things on Martin Luther King day. First of all, I think of the great symbol that Dr. King has left us with, as far as our challenge, to put behind us the great stains upon the history of this nation, of slavery and racial discrimination. That is the biggest part of his legacy to us. But I also like to look, much like a mountain climber, that looks not about far he has to go but how far he's come. And one thing I think we can be proud of in our country is that it has put behind it slavery. And it has started climbing out of the morass of racial discrimination, even though certainly it still exists today. And that we have done so, albeit with violence, we've avoided great civil war in modern America. We continue to make progress in that regard. Thirdly, I think about what our challenges are. As we heard and we keep hearing, and as we heard in the State of the State speech last week, dropout rates and graduation rates among minorities simply cannot be tolerated to continue. And I think it's a challenge to this body, as we go forward to try to find something that will improve those statistics. I don't know what that avenue is. I think there are a variety of things that we should certainly work on, and we cannot continue to do the same things that we've done in the past and think that they'll be a difference in the future.

Senator Bacon's remarks:

Too often we think in terms of Martin Luther King as being that influence that freed the African-Americans from centuries of whatever did hold the African-Americans back. I'm probably one of the few members of this body to have been molded during that time in which Dr. King spoke to us as a nation. And many of us who are Wasps and grew up in a white community, had a prejudice that was deep within our community and our families that was just accepted. And it was Dr. Martin Luther King who made me and made many like me say, "Take stock of yourself. Find a new way."

And so it isn't just that Martin Luther King freed the African Americans and changed the way in which African-Americans lived. He changed me. He changed a lot of us. We examined ourselves. We examined those well springs, what it is to be human, and to bring that forward and to try to practice that. And it doesn't always succeed, but as a white Anglo-Saxon protestant that grew up with prejudices, I have to thank the movement for helping free me from those prejudices which I accepted as a matter of course. And I hope that I am better for it. And so I celebrate Dr. Martin Luther King as a liberator of a Wasp rather than just African-Americans.

Senator Sandoval's remarks:

I, too, am often reluctant to come down on Martin Luther King day and make remarks, because I, too, believe that Senator Groff does such a wonderful and eloquent job of commemorating this day. You know, we are at war in Iraq, but we are also facing a war on the streets. And we've been facing that war for some time. When we look at the enemy, we look in their eyes, and we actually see ourselves. We see the failings of society, the failure to possibly educate our children, the failure to provide hope and opportunity. And that's why we see so much of the devastation, and I'm reminded of some of the shootings that have occurred recently, we see the devastation in our streets. Every time this time of year comes around and we commemorate Martin Luther King, it reminds me that we have a long way to go and we have much more work to do. So thank you, Senator Groff, every year for helping us to remember that.
