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## Colorado Self-Identified Registered Voters Age 18+ Are Strong Proponents of State Health Care Reform

According to the 2006 United States Current Population Survey (CPS), 21 percent of Colorado residents age 19-64 are without health care insurance, slightly higher than the 20 percent national prevalence. According to the Colorado Blue Ribbon Commission for Health Care Reform, both the uninsured rate in the state, as well as the overall cost of health insurance, has steadily increased over the past five years, raising concern among both policymakers and registered voters.<sup>1</sup>

AARP's Colorado State Office, as part of its continued effort to understand the needs and concerns of state residents, commissioned this survey to explore the views of self-identified registered voters age 18+ on the current state of health care in Colorado. The survey also gauges specific concerns about health care-related matters, as well as voter opinions on state health care reform and specific funding proposals.


- According to the survey, six in ten self-identified registered voters age 18+ in Colorado believe that health care in Colorado is in a state of crisis or has major problems.
- The majority of Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed are concerned primarily with matters of health care costs.
- Nine in ten Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled disagree with health insurance companies being allowed to deny health care coverage to an older person.
- Eighty-five percent of Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed agree that all state residents should have access to affordable, quality health care. Three in five claim that they would be more likely to vote for a candidate for state office who supports the development of a health care system that would provide such access to all residents.
- Nearly four in five Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled agree that employers should contribute to a system so that everyone in the state can have access to quality, affordable health care coverage.
- Nearly seven in ten Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed strongly or somewhat support increases in sales taxes on cigarettes and alcohol, if the money generated from such proposals is used to help ensure that all state residents have access to quality, affordable health care coverage.
- Nearly three in four Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled are extremely, very, or somewhat likely to vote for an extension of the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) temporary suspension beyond 2010, which allows Colorado to keep an estimated \$3.7B that would otherwise be returned to taxpayers and use these funds for statewide programs including health care.

Colorado policymakers should carefully consider the findings in this study, as there appears to be overwhelming support for statewide health care reform, specifically in the area of cost controls. About one in five Colorado registered voters age 18+ in this survey is uninsured. Government officials need to closely examine the feasibility of any proposed systems and funding mechanisms that will not only help provide each state resident, regardless of income level, with access to basic health coverage, but ensure the affordability of such plans for all Coloradoans in need.

#### **Detailed Findings**

Six in ten Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed believe that health care in Colorado is in a state of crisis or, at the least, has major problems.




The less income respondents earn, the more they believe that health care in Colorado is in a state of crisis. Specifically, 21 percent of survey respondents who earn between \$20K and \$50K per year believe that the state is facing a health care crisis, versus only 10 percent of those earning between \$75K and \$100K per year and eight percent of those earning greater than \$100K annually.

#### **HEALTH CARE CONCERNS**

The majority of Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled are extremely or very concerned with matters of health care costs. Nearly three in five survey respondents are extremely or very concerned about having to personally pay more for their current care. More than half of those surveyed are extremely or very concerned about having adequate, affordable health care coverage and being able to pay for the costs associated with a major illness or injury.

#### Voters' Primary Health Care Concerns (N = 809)\*\*





Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled disagree with the notion that health insurance companies should be allowed to deny coverage or charge higher premiums to older persons and persons with pre-existing conditions. Four in five or more survey respondents disagree with health insurance companies being allowed to deny health care coverage to an older person or a person with a pre-existing medical condition.

Four in five respondents also disagree with health insurance companies being allowed to charge higher premiums to older persons. Fewer respondents, although still a majority, disagree with health insurance companies charging higher premiums to those with pre-existing medical conditions.

#### Levels of Agreement With Health Insurance Companies' Ability to Take Certain Actions (N = 809)\*





Not surprisingly, nine in ten (88%) respondents age 65+ disagree with companies being allowed to charge higher premiums to older persons, versus less than 80 percent of those under the age of 50 (18-34: 79%; 35-49: 76%, respectively).

#### **OPINIONS ON STATE HEALTH CARE REFORM**

Nearly seven in ten Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed strongly agree that all Coloradans should have access to quality, affordable health care coverage.


All Coloradans Should Have Access to Quality, Affordable Health

- Younger respondents are more likely than older respondents to strongly agree that all Coloradans should have access to quality, affordable health care coverage (18-64: 70% versus 65+: 53%).
- Survey respondents with relatively lower annual incomes are more likely than their higher-income counterparts to strongly or somewhat agree that all Coloradans should have access to quality, affordable health care coverage (<\$20K annually: 95%; >\$100K annually: 84%).
- Nearly three in four respondents say it is extremely (36%) or very important (37%) for Colorado to reduce the number of uninsured residents in the state. Another one in six (16%) say it is somewhat important. Those with more conservative political views tend to place less importance on such potential reform (conservative: 59%; liberal: 88%).


Six in ten Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed say they are more likely to vote for a candidate for state office who supports the development of a health care system that would provide access to affordable, quality health care for all Colorado residents. On the other hand, it would not make a difference to 24 percent of those voting.

Those with more conservative political views are less likely than their counterparts to say they would vote for a candidate who supports access to affordable, quality health care for all Colorado residents (conservative: 39%; moderate: 64%; liberal: 84%)

Nearly four in five Coloradoans age 18+ agree that employers should contribute to a system so that everyone in the state can have access to quality, affordable health care coverage. Approximately seven in ten agree that state and federal governments and individuals should also contribute to such a system.






Two-thirds (66%) of those surveyed are also in favor of requiring employers to provide all or most of their employees with health care coverage by either paying for it directly or paying taxes to a government program which would supply employees with such coverage. One in ten (10%) somewhat agree and about one in five strongly (11%) or somewhat disagree (11%) with this idea.

#### REACTIONS TO SPECIFIC HEALTH CARE FUNDING PROPOSALS

Approximately two-thirds of Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed support increases in sales taxes on cigarettes and alcohol, if the money generated from such proposals is used to help ensure health care access to all state residents. On the other hand nearly half oppose taxing services that are not currently taxed for this purpose.







- It is interesting to note that females are significantly more likely than males to support tax increases on cigarettes and alcohol (cigarettes: 73% vs. 63%, respectively; alcohol: 73% vs. 60%, respectively).
- Additionally, those voters who characterize their health status as being excellent or very good are far more likely than their counterparts (in fair or poor health) to support tax increases on cigarettes, specifically (70% vs. 53%, respectively).

Colorado registered voters age 18+ polled are split as to whether they would vote for an extension of the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) temporary suspension beyond 2010. This suspension, or time-out, allows Colorado to keep an estimated \$3.7B that would be used for K-12 and higher education, health care, highways, and other services. Seventy-two percent say they would be extremely, very, or somewhat likely to vote for an extension of TABOR.<sup>2</sup>


- Not surprisingly, only 24 percent of those respondents who disagree with the concept of access to health care coverage for all state residents are extremely or very likely to vote for an extension of the TABOR time-out.
- By the same token, survey respondents who characterize themselves as liberal are much more likely to vote for the time-out extension than their conservative counterparts (69% vs. 33%, respectively).
- Seventy-two percent of survey respondents are extremely (26%), very (18%), or somewhat likely (28%) to vote for <u>permanently</u> repealing or removing TABOR in the state in order to allow funding for state services that were cut during recessionary periods, such as health care. Only a quarter are not very (12%) or not at all likely (12%) to vote for the permanent repeal of TABOR.

#### Health Care Coverage and Voting Profile of Registered Voters Age 18+ in Colorado


Only half of Colorado registered voters age 18+ surveyed with health care coverage are very satisfied with their current plans.

Satisfaction With Level of Coverage Received Through Current Health Care Plan (N = 684 respondents with health care coverage)\*




- After all, nearly eight in ten (77%) respondents claim out-of-pocket medical expenses, including insurance premiums, prescription drug costs, and co-pays, have increased over the past five years.
- ★ Three in five (60%) participate in a health care plan sponsored by a current employer.
- Lt is important to note that 15 percent of Colorado registered voters surveyed *do not* have any kind of health care coverage, including health insurance or government plans such as Medicare or Medicaid.

More than one-third of Colorado registered voters surveyed consider themselves Independents, and about three in ten each claim to be Democrats or Republicans.



- Nearly nine in ten survey respondents vote always (59%) or most of the time (27%) in state elections for Governor and Legislators. Eight percent vote about half the time and only five percent claim to seldom or never vote.
- Three in ten (31%) consider their political views conservative, more than four in ten (44%) characterize their views as moderate, and approximately two in ten (19%) are liberal.

#### Methodology

AARP commissioned FGI Research, Inc. to conduct a telephone survey of Colorado residents age 18 and older who identified themselves as registered voters. The survey was conducted between December 19, 2007 through January 18, 2008, and a total of 809 interviews were completed.<sup>3</sup> A sample of this size has a sampling error of plus or minus 3.5 percent.<sup>4</sup>

Survey responses were weighted to reflect the actual distribution of age and gender for the population of registered voters age 18 and older in Colorado as found in the 2004 Current Population Survey Voter Supplement. Weighted responses to all survey questions are in the attached annotated questionnaire.

Throughout the report, statistics representing responses are reported in percentages. Percentages may not add up to 100 due to rounding effects.
