101	CONCERNING THE ESSENTIAL RESTORATION OF THE CAST IRON			
102	STRUCTURE OF THE COLORADO STATE CAPITOL DOME, AND, IN			
103	CONNECTION THEREWITH, ENDORSING A PARTNERSHIP			
104	BETWEEN THE STATE OF COLORADO AND COLORADO			
105	PRESERVATION, INC., TO IMPLEMENT A FUND-RAISING			
106	CAMPAIGN FOR RESTORING THE CAPITOL DOME THAT WILL			
107	INCLUDE CAUSE-RELATED MARKETING AND SPONSORSHIPS.			
1 2 3	WHEREAS, Colorado's gold-plated state Capitol dome is at the center of Colorado state government and an iconic symbol of unparalleled historical significance in the state; and			
4 5	WHEREAS, The Colorado State Capitol dome, which is more than 100 years old, has fallen into serious disrepair in recent years; and			
6 7	WHEREAS, The cast iron architectural detail attached to the superstructure is rusting to the point that an architectural inspection team			

2	declared "the potential loss of strength as a result of deterioration is a significant hazard to the building and its occupants"; and
3 4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, The public observation deck, which has been a destination for generations of Colorado school children, citizens, and visitors, has been closed since a nearly ten-pound chunk of cast iron fell from the dome, prompting work crews to install netting in order to catch falling debris; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, The state's budget constraints have significantly impeded the ability of the state to fund the needed repairs, which are estimated at between \$11 million and \$30 million; and
11 12 13	WHEREAS, The Colorado State Capitol dome was recognized in 2010 as one of Colorado's Most Endangered Places by Colorado Preservation, Inc.; and
14 15 16 17 18	WHEREAS, Colorado Preservation, Inc., is a nonprofit, statewide historic preservation organization that provides assistance in historic preservation to Colorado communities through a statewide network of information, education, training, expertise, and advocacy and has indicated a willingness to partner with the state of Colorado in a campaign to raise the funds necessary to repair the Capitol dome; and
20 21 22	WHEREAS, The vision of Colorado Preservation, Inc. is to create a broad-based, grassroots, privately funded initiative that does not rely on the use of government or public funds; and
23 24 25	WHEREAS, The proposed effort is likely to include cause-related marketing sponsorships, outreach to Colorado school children, a grassroots public campaign, and grants and gifts; and
26 27 28	WHEREAS, It is essential that this effort be launched as soon as possible in order to ensure the safety of those who work in and visit the state Capitol; now, therefore,
29 30	Be It Resolved by the Senate of the Sixty-seventh General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the House of Representatives concurring herein:
31 32 33	(1) That we, the members of the Sixty-seventh General Assembly, acknowledge the importance and urgency of the restoration of the state Capitol dome;
34 35 36	(2) That we appreciate the efforts of Colorado Preservation, Inc., in bringing attention to the necessary restoration of the state Capitol dome;
37 38	(3) That we hereby endorse a fund-raising effort that will include cause-related marketing and sponsorships;
39 40 41 42	(4) That we hereby support the use of any protective covering over the state Capitol dome and related superstructure during construction for the purpose of displaying artistic renderings of the project and imagery that celebrates the history, people, and natural beauty of the state

so as to promote public support for the project and to honor major sponsors of the project in a tasteful manner, subject to review by the Capitol Building Advisory Committee and approval by the Capital Development Committee; and

(5) That Colorado Preservation, Inc., will submit proposals for the fund-raising effort and any associated agreements to the Capitol Building Advisory Committee and that the Capitol Building Advisory Committee will forward the proposals and agreements with its recommendations to the Capital Development Committee for approval.

10 Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent 11 to Governor Bill Ritter, Jr.; Mayor John Hickenlooper and the City 12 Council of Denver; the membership of Colorado Preservation, Inc.; the board of Historic Denver, Inc.; the board of Historic Boulder, Inc.; the 13 board of Historic Pueblo, Inc.; the board of Historic Georgetown, Inc.; the 14 board of Historic Douglas County, Inc.; the board of Historic Routt 15 County!, Inc.; the Mountains/Plains Office of the National Trust for 16 Historic Preservation; the Colorado Historical Society; Larry Friedberg, 17 Colorado State Architect; Lance Shepperd, Manager, Design and 18 Construction Programs, Office of the State Architect; the Civic Center 19 20 Park Conservancy; and members of Colorado's congressional delegation.
