24 ON THE RIGHTS-OF-WAY OF THE INTERSTATE SYSTEM.

25 (II) A PUBLIC ENTITY MAY PERMIT THE PLACEMENT OF VENDING
26 MACHINES IN REST AND RECREATION AREAS, AND IN SAFETY REST AREAS,
27 CONSTRUCTED OR LOCATED ON RIGHTS-OF-WAY OF THE INTERSTATE
28 SYSTEM IN THE STATE. SUCH VENDING MACHINES MAY ONLY DISPENSE
29 FOOD, DRINK, AND OTHER ARTICLES AS THE PUBLIC ENTITY DETERMINES
30 ARE APPROPRIATE AND DESIRABLE. THE VENDING MACHINES MAY ONLY
31 BE OPERATED BY THE STATE. PRIORITY SHALL BE GIVEN TO VENDING
32 MACHINES THAT ARE LICENSED, MANAGED, OR OPERATED PURSUANT TO
33 SECTION 26-8.5-102, C.R.S., OR THE "RANDOLPH-SHEPPARD ACT", 20
34 U.S.C. SEC. 107.

35
36 (2) (a) NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF LAW, A
37 PUBLIC ENTITY SHALL NOT OPERATE, OR CONTRACT WITH A PRIVATE
38 ENTITY TO OPERATE, FOR PUBLIC USE ANY TRUCK STOP, FUELING STATION,
39 CONVENIENCE STORE, OR OTHER AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE STATION FOR THE
40 PURPOSE OF RETAILING MOTOR FUEL.

41
42 (b) THE PROHIBITION SET FORTH IN THIS SUBSECTION (2) DOES NOT
43 APPLY TO ANY TRUCK STOP, FUELING STATION, CONVENIENCE STORE, OR
44 OTHER AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE STATION THAT RETAILS MOTOR FUEL PRIOR
45 TO THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS SUBSECTION (2)."

REPORT(S) OF COMMITTEE(S) OF REFERENCE**AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK, & NATURAL RESOURCES**

After consideration on the merits, the Committee recommends the following:

HB12-1278 be amended as follows, and as so amended, be referred to the Committee on Appropriations with favorable recommendation:

Amend printed bill, strike everything below the enacting clause and substitute:

"SECTION 1. Legislative declaration. (1) The general assembly hereby declares that:

(a) In 1966, the general assembly commissioned a study of the interaction between the South Platte alluvial aquifer and the surface flows in the South Platte river. The general assembly considered this study in passing the "Water Right Determination and Administration Act of 1969", article 92 of title 37, Colorado Revised Statutes, and augmentation plans authorized by the 1969 act are operating on a large scale in the South Platte river basin. Many scientific and technological advances have occurred since the study was completed in 1968, yet no comprehensive study has been conducted since then regarding the impact of alluvial groundwater usage on the South Platte river or the relative success of augmentation plans authorized by the 1969 act in protecting senior surface water diverters and maximizing the use of both groundwater and surface waters of the state. The general assembly finds that the South Platte alluvial aquifer plays a critical role in the state's economy, that development of this aquifer is and will continue to be an important water supply source, and that it is appropriate at this time to engage in an additional study on these matters.

(b) Groundwater levels in some areas of the South Platte river alluvium have risen since 2005 to unprecedented high levels and have caused damaging conditions, including crop damage, decreased soil productivity, salt accumulation in soils, deterioration of water quality, failures of wastewater systems and infrastructure, damage to residential and commercial property, increased nonbeneficial consumptive use by phreatophytes, water waste, and significant outflow to Nebraska; and

(c) Because of the critical roles that the South Platte river and its alluvial aquifer play in supporting the state's economy, the Colorado water conservation board, beginning in 2012 and in consultation with the state engineer and the Colorado water institute, must conduct comprehensive studies of the available historical hydrologic data through water year 2011 to evaluate the effectiveness of the "Water Right Determination and Administration Act of 1969" in achieving the dual goals of protecting senior water rights and maximizing the beneficial use of both surface waters and groundwaters of the state.

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 37-60-115, **add** (7) as follows:

37-60-115. Water studies - rules - repeal. (7) South Platte river alluvial aquifer study - study authorized. (a) THE BOARD SHALL, IN CONSULTATION WITH THE STATE ENGINEER AND THE COLORADO WATER INSTITUTE, ESTABLISHED IN SECTION 23-31-801, C.R.S., AND ALSO REFERRED TO IN THIS SECTION AS THE "INSTITUTE", CONDUCT A COMPREHENSIVE STUDY TO COMPILE AND EVALUATE AVAILABLE HISTORICAL HYDROLOGIC DATA THROUGH WATER YEAR 2011. THE

1 STUDY'S OBJECTIVES ARE:

2 (I) TO EVALUATE WHETHER CURRENT LAWS AND RULES THAT
3 GUIDE WATER ADMINISTRATION IN THE SOUTH PLATTE RIVER BASIN
4 ACHIEVE THE DUAL GOALS OF PROTECTING SENIOR WATER RIGHTS AND
5 MAXIMIZING THE BENEFICIAL USE OF BOTH SURFACE WATER AND
