
# A Snapshot of CDA


- FY13-14 appropriation of \$42.6 million.

#### **Flood Recovery**

- Groundwater testing is being performed by CSU's Extension Service
- Damage assessments of crops, farm land, equipment and structures is being handled by USDA's Farm Service Agency.
- Damage reported to date:
  - √ 1,200 farms have been impacted
  - √ 112 farm implements damaged
  - √ 150 structures damaged
  - √ Crops
    - 6,365 acres of alfalfa
    - 15,055 acres of corn
    - 150 acres of dry beans
    - 900 acres of sugar beets



#### Farm & Ranch Income

- ✓ Colorado net farm income for 2013 is estimated to be \$1.59 billion – down from the 2012 record-high of \$1.75 billion.
- ✓ Net income for 2014 will further decline to about \$1.48 billion.
- ✓ Projected gains from higher livestock prices and the continued growth in Colorado's dairy sector will be more than offset by weaker crop prices.
- ✓ Farm and ranch balance sheets are strong after record net incomes in 2011 and 2012.


#### Colorado Total Net Farm Income






# **Exports are Increasingly Important**

- Buyers from 126 countries imported \$1.7 billion of food and ag products from Colorado in 2012 – a 63% increase in value over 2009.
- Export values are estimated at \$1.9 billion for 2013.
- Total beef complex exports are on a pace to top \$1 billion for 2013.
- Expanded access for beef from cattle under 30 moa will further boost exports to Japan into 2014 and beyond.

- Reviewed the recommendations shared with us last year by the House and Senate Agriculture committees.
- Identified Strategic Policy Initiatives for FY14 and FY16.
- Developed specific strategies with performance measures capturing the key processes for each of the Department's Major Program Areas.

### **Strategic Policy Initiatives for 2014**

- Completing Phase 1 of the Department's office consolidation.
- 2) Creating broader awareness and understanding of CO's food and agriculture industry among CO consumers.
- 3) Enhancing the cash flow and financial position of the State Fair.
- 4) Expanding exports of CO food and agricultural products.
- 5) Improving direct and local marketing opportunities for CO's food and agriculture industry.
- 6) Launching Phase 1 of the Department's E-License project.

# FY 2014-15 Budget Request

- \$700K Capital Request for eLicense
  - ✓ Result of an October 2012 LEAN process
  - √ Same system in use by DORA
  - ✓ Automates the application, renewal, payment, and some enforcement functions
  - ✓ Real-time reporting
  - √ Needed efficiency for greater customer service
  - ✓ Eliminates wasteful use of tens of thousands of paper applications, postage, staff and customer time



# FY 2014-15 Budget Request Cont.

- \$250K General Fund request for 4H and FFA programs at the State Fair.
  - ✓ Funding will be in a new Long Bill line item specifically dedicated for this purpose.
  - ✓ Very little revenue generated from these programs.
  - Colorado State Fair Foundation to raise funds for facility improvements; State Fair operating budget is responsible for operating costs.
- Budget request includes a base reduction of \$321,558, of which \$188,817 is General Fund, for the elimination of leased space due to office consolidation.
  - ✓ Office consolidation is saving the General Fund approximately \$340K annually.
  - ✓ Office Consolidation is saving the CDA operating budget approximately \$185K annually.

#### Regulation of Sodium Hypochlorite

- The proposed legislation concerns the inspection of pesticides stored at public water systems and domestic wastewater treatment works facilities.
- Statute currently provides that the Department is responsible for regulating the bulk storage of all pesticides in Colorado.
  - The statute's broad definition for a pesticide requires the Department to regulate not only agricultural, but non-agricultural facilities as well.
  - Legislative intent was more so for the Department to regulate pesticide storage in agronomic environments.

#### Legislation

- The legislation would eliminate the requirement for the Department to regulate pesticide storage at water treatment facilities, allowing the Department of focus its resources on agricultural facilities.
- Inspections at water treatment facilities would shift to CDPHE which already inspects water treatment facilities and can, through cooperation with the Department, incorporate pesticide storage into their existing inspection protocols.
- Eliminates the need for two separate State of Colorado agencies to visit the same facilities.

# **2013 Rulemaking Activities**

- In 2013 the Department conducted 17 rulemaking hearings.
- 2 new rules were adopted.
- 6 of the rules were amended as part of the regulatory efficiency review process.
- 2 rules were repealed.





# Variations from the 2013 Regulatory Agenda

- · Added 2 new hearings for revisions not planned.
- · Added 1 new rule and 1 emergency rule.
- Action on 3 rules was started and suspended.
  - ✓ Complexity of rules and the need for additional time, further review.
  - ✓ Program was undergoing a Sunset Review and the advisory committee recommended the rule revision process be postponed.
- 2 rules were pulled from the Regulatory Agenda

# 2014 Regulatory Agenda

- Plan is to conduct 16 rulemaking hearings to revise existing rules.
- 10 regulatory efficiency review processes.
- Permanently adopt emergency rule from 2013.
- No new rules are anticipated.
- · No rules are scheduled for repeal.


# **Colorado's Agriculture Industry**
