
SB13-273: This bill is about healthy forests, wildfire mitigation and rural economic development:

The bill is written to encourage the initial development of a biomass industry to allow for clean energy, rural economic development and private industry support for wildfire mitigation.


- SB13-273 is stated as an Act: Concerning Incentives
 for the Beneficial Use of Forest Biomass the bill
 requires coordination with existing owners of forested
 acres in Colorado "to remove potentially hazardous
 fuels, including diseased timber, that represent an
 imminent threat to our communities, public utility
 infrastructure, and watersheds due to the risk of
 catastrophic wildfires"
- Over 66% of Colorado's Forested Acres are owned and managed by the Federal Government and are therefore subject to federal policies and limited federal budgets for removal of hazardous fuels. An additional 29% of Colorado Forested Acres are owned by Private Land Owners with equally constrained forest mitigation budgets.
- SB-12-273 is designed to encourage local energy production and local forest products uses for the limited forest mitigation available in Colorado. The bill makes no specific reference to "bark beetle" devastation, because the limited development of a biomass energy industry in Colorado is dependent not on forest devastation, but on managed policies and public-private partnerships that encourage and help finance wildfire mitigation in the Wildland-Urban Interface and in other hazardous areas.
- SB-12-273 is a limited and moderate legislative effort. Colorado ranks 37th among states in total installed biomass energy capacity. With over
