Ski areas in national forests contribute substantially to state and local economies. In Colorado, it is estimated that downhill skiers and snowboarders contribute approximately \$1.5 billion dollars to the state economy. The importance of this industry on tourism cannot be overstated and must be protected and maintained.

CAST recognizes that all parties - the Forest Service and the ski areas - are in favor of water rights obtained for recreational uses on the National Forest System remain dedicated to the recreational use for the long term, but currently cannot come to an agreement on who should have domain over these water rights. -

As the Forest Service seeks to rewrite the water rights clause with public input, it is CAST's position that: "As water is crucial to ski area operations, the normal day-to-day functions and operations of the ski areas - i.e. snowmaking, lodging facilities, restrooms, culinary purposes, irrigation, etc. — should be the number one priority to both the Forest Service and the ski areas and in no way should be adversely affected in the new clause."
