52 ASSOCIATED WITH THE BILLS THEY PAY FOR ENERGY AND HOW MUCH EACH
53 ENERGY SOURCE IS AFFECTING THEIR TOTAL BILL.

55 (2) BEGINNING ON OR BEFORE THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS
56 SECTION, EACH UTILITY PROVIDING RETAIL ELECTRIC SERVICE IN
57 COLORADO SHALL DISCLOSE TO EACH OF ITS CUSTOMERS AT LEAST FOUR

1 TIMES PER YEAR, IN PRINTED BILLS OR BILLING INSERTS, THE MOST RECENT
 2 AVAILABLE INFORMATION CONCERNING THE TYPES OF FUEL USED BY THE
 3 UTILITY TO GENERATE ELECTRICITY, THE PERCENTAGE OF THE UTILITY'S
 4 ELECTRICITY GENERATION THAT IS ATTRIBUTABLE TO EACH FUEL TYPE,
 5 THE LOAD PROFILE FOR EACH FUEL TYPE, AND THE UTILITY'S TOTAL
 6 GENERATION COST PER KILOWATT-HOUR FOR NATURAL GAS, METHANE,
 7 COAL, WIND, AND SOLAR. THE COST CALCULATION SHALL INCLUDE ALL
 8 ANCILLARY COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH EACH FUEL TYPE, INCLUDING THE
 9 COSTS OF UNDERGROUND NATURAL GAS STORAGE, NATURAL GAS PIPELINE
 10 EXPANSIONS, AND NEW ELECTRIC TRANSMISSION INFRASTRUCTURE.

11 (3) A UTILITY'S COSTS OF REVISING THE FORMAT OF ITS BILLS TO
 12 INCLUDE THE INFORMATION REQUIRED BY THIS SECTION MAY BE
 13 RECOVERED THROUGH RATES."
