SHORT TITLE: "Quick & Safe Rebuilding Flood-Damaged Communities"

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 101 CONCERNING THE REBUILDING OF FLOOD-DAMAGED COMMUNITIES. WHEREAS, The extent of the damage caused by the historic and 1 2 often-termed "biblical" flood of September 2013 was devastating; and WHEREAS, The flood affected 17 Colorado counties, 14 for 3 which the governor declared a disaster emergency; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Nearly 1,500 homes were destroyed and 19,000 more were damaged, hundreds of miles of freight and passenger rail lines were 6 damaged or submerged, and at least 50 state highway bridges were 7 destroyed or seriously damaged; and 8 9 WHEREAS, It is anticipated that repairs to the roads and bridges alone will cost several hundreds of millions of dollars; and 10

1 2 3	WHEREAS, The full extent of the damages will have extensive and long-term effects on Colorado's economy and infrastructure and on thousands of families across the state; and
4 5 6	WHEREAS, At least 8 people died, 2 people went missing, and more than 11,000 persons were evacuated as a result of the flood, while at least 1,750 persons and 300 pets were rescued by air and ground; and
7 8 9 10	WHEREAS, The flood caused significant damage to agricultural lands in the northeast region of the state, including crop damage, and also caused damage to hundreds of oil and gas wells throughout numerous river basins and municipalities; and
12 13 14	WHEREAS, Remaining standing water resulting from the flood will continue to cause residual problems requiring a substantial amount of time and resources to rectify; and
15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23	WHEREAS, A number of federal and state initiatives have been implemented to ease the burden for those affected by the flood, including the federal Internal Revenue Service extending tax filing and payment deadlines for flood victims; the contribution of federal resources including the deployment of search and rescue teams; the distribution of supplies such as food, water, cots, and generators; the implementation of emergency flood control measures; and the provision of federal recovery assistance such as temporary housing, home repairs, and low-cost loans; and
24 25 26 27 28	WHEREAS, Despite the enormous strides taken to rebuild Colorado's flood-damaged communities, many more recovery efforts are required, especially given a number of setbacks encountered along the way, including the October 2013 federal government shutdown that threatened relief aid and recovery efforts; and
29 30 31 32 33	WHEREAS, A setback to a speedy and full recovery from the devastating flood damage is a directive from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to prioritize the Preble's meadow jumping mouse, a threatened species whose natural habitat is in areas affected by the September 2013 flood, over Colorado's flood recovery needs; and
34 35	WHEREAS, Local officials who proceed with flood recovery projects without adhering to environmental laws risk being fined or losing

federal funding for their projects; and

WHEREAS, FEMA's directive to preserve the mouse's habitat will								
require lengthy environmental and legal reviews of proposed recovery								
projects for compliance with the Endangered Species Act that could								
significantly delay the rebuilding of Colorado's infrastructure,								
communities, and economy and unnecessarily restrict displaced families'								
ability to return promptly to their homes; now, therefore,								

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Sixty-ninth General Assembly of the State of Colorado, the Senate concurring herein:

- (1) That we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, believe that FEMA's new directive placing the threat against the Preble's meadow jumping mouse over the needs of our most vulnerable and hard-hit communities is irresponsible and out of touch with the real devastation caused by the September 2013 flood.
- (2) That, in light of the devastation caused by the September 2013 flood and the extensive work remaining to rebuild Colorado, we, the members of the Colorado General Assembly, believe that FEMA's focus should be redirected to the advancement of the health, safety, and prosperity of Colorado's families, communities, and infrastructure.
- (3) That we urge the members of Colorado's Congressional Delegation to seek a waiver from the Endangered Species Act for flood-affected areas.

Be It Further Resolved, That copies of this Joint Resolution be sent to the Honorable Governor John Hickenlooper; W. Craig Fugate, the Administrator of FEMA; Daniel Ashe, the Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; and the members of the Colorado Congressional Delegation.
