 52 REGISTRATION SYSTEM IN ACCORDANCE WITH SUBSECTIONS (2), (3), AND  
 53 (4) OF THIS SECTION.

54 (2) IF, UPON COMPARING THE SIGNATURE OF AN ELIGIBLE ELECTOR  
 55 ON THE SELF-AFFIRMATION ON THE RETURN ENVELOPE WITH THE  
 56 SIGNATURE OF THE ELIGIBLE ELECTOR OBTAINED FROM THE STATEWIDE

1 VOTER REGISTRATION SYSTEM, THE ELECTION JUDGES DETERMINE THAT  
2 THE SIGNATURES DO NOT MATCH, TWO OTHER ELECTION JUDGES OF SHALL  
3 SIMULTANEOUSLY COMPARE THE SIGNATURES. IF BOTH OTHER ELECTION  
4 JUDGES AGREE THAT THE SIGNATURES DO NOT MATCH, THE COUNTY CLERK  
5 AND RECORDER SHALL, WITHIN THREE DAYS AFTER THE SIGNATURE  
6 DEFICIENCY HAS BEEN CONFIRMED, SEND TO THE ELIGIBLE ELECTOR AT  
7 THE ADDRESS INDICATED IN THE REGISTRATION RECORDS A LETTER  
8 EXPLAINING THE DISCREPANCY IN SIGNATURES AND A FORM FOR THE  
9 ELIGIBLE ELECTOR TO CONFIRM THAT THE ELECTOR RETURNED A BALLOT  
10 TO THE DESIGNATED ELECTION OFFICIAL. IF THE DESIGNATED ELECTION  
11 OFFICIAL RECEIVES THE FORM WITHIN EIGHT DAYS AFTER ELECTION DAY  
12 WITH A SIGNATURE MATCHING THAT IN THE VOTER REGISTRATION SYSTEM,  
13 CONFIRMING THAT THE ELECTOR RETURNED HIS OR HER BALLOT TO THE  
14 DESIGNATED ELECTION OFFICIAL AND ENCLOSING A COPY OF THE  
15 ELECTOR'S IDENTIFICATION AS DEFINED IN SECTION 1-1-104 (19.5), AND  
16 THE BALLOT IS OTHERWISE VALID, THE BALLOT SHALL BE COUNTED. IF THE  
17 ELIGIBLE ELECTOR RETURNS THE FORM INDICATING THAT THE ELECTOR DID
