The State of Mentoring in Colorado 2014

The data presented in this document synthesizes information gathered from a survey conducted with 60 mentoring programs facilitated by 32 agencies across Colorado, representing the majority of formalized mentoring programs in the state. The Colorado Mentoring Partnership defines formalized mentoring as a relationship facilitated by a mentoring program matching one to five youth with a mentor in an ongoing relationship to promote positive youth development and outcomes.

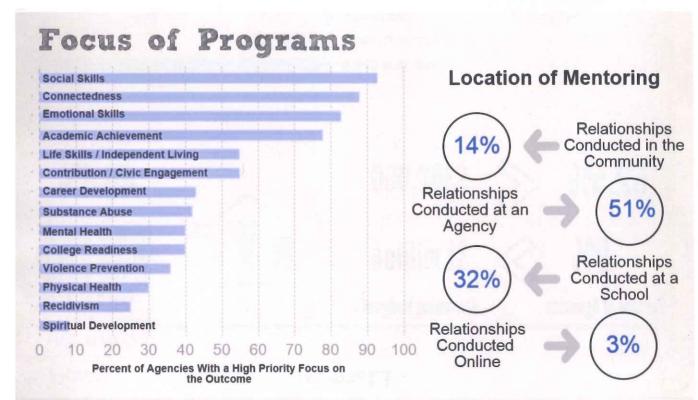

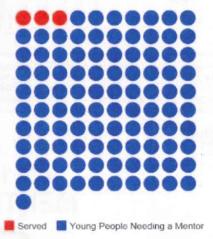

A recent survey from the National Mentoring Partnership showed that 1 in 3 young people do not have a formal or informal mentor growing up. This translates into almost 300,000 young people between the ages of 5 and 17 in Colorado growing up without an engaged adult.
