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HOUSE COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE AMENDMENT Committee on Education.

HB15-1088 be amended as follows:

Amend printed bill, strike everything below the enacting clause and substitute:

"SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-82.6-102, add (3) as follows:

22-82.6-102. Legislative declaration. (3) THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY FURTHER FINDS AND DECLARES THAT THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAMESTABLISHED IN HOUSE BILL 15-1088, ENACTED IN 2015, PROVIDES SUPPORT FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS, INCENTIVIZES FARMERS AND RANCHERS TO SELL TO SCHOOLS BY HELPING WITH THE COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH MEETING ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY REQUIREMENTS THAT ARE NECESSARY TO SELL TO SCHOOLS, AND HELPS FARMERS AND RANCHERS WITH COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH SALES TO SCHOOLS.

SECTION 2. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-82.6-103, **amend** (7) (d), (7) (f), (7) (g), (7) (j), (7) (l), and (8); and **add** (9), (10), (11), (12), and (13) as follows:

- 22-82.6-103. **Definitions.** As used in this article, unless the context otherwise requires:
- (7) "Farm-to-school program" means a program that encourages or incentivizes the acquisition and use of locally grown, produced, and processed FOOD AND agricultural products by schools in order to provide healthy, local food products to students and benefit the state agricultural industry. A farm-to-school program may include the following components:
- (d) Increasing the size and stability of farmers' AND RANCHERS' direct sales markets;
- (f) Providing outreach and guidance to farmers AND RANCHERS concerning the value of, and procedures for, selling their agricultural products to interested schools;
- (g) Developing and regularly updating an internet database of farmers AND RANCHERS interested in selling their agricultural products to schools, including the types and yields of agricultural products the farmers AND RANCHERS want to sell and the time periods that farmers AND RANCHERS want to sell;
- (j) Conducting workshops and training sessions, and providing professional development and technical advice, to schools' food service directors, school personnel, farmers AND RANCHERS, produce distributors, and produce processors regarding the demand for and availability of



Colorado farm products and helping teachers educate students about nutrition, obesity prevention, coping with allergies, and farm-to-school connections;

- (l) Establishing partnerships with public and nonprofit sources to implement a public engagement campaign and establishing a structure to facilitate communication between farmers AND RANCHERS and school districts SCHOOLS.
- (8) "School" includes institutions of higher education "FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATION" MEANS THIRD-PARTY AUDITS OF ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS AND PRACTICES. THE AUDITS CAN INCLUDE GAP/GHP AUDITS OR OTHER ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATIONS.
- (9) "GAP/GHP AUDITS" MEANS AUDITS THAT FOCUS ON BEST AGRICULTURAL PRACTICES TO VERIFY THAT FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS ARE PRODUCED, PACKED, HANDLED, AND STORED IN THE SAFEST MANNER POSSIBLE TO MINIMIZERISKS OF MICROBIAL FOOD SAFETY HAZARDS. GAP/GHP AUDITS SHOULD ALSO VERIFY ADHERENCE TO THE RECOMMENDATIONS MADE IN THE FEDERAL FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION'S "GUIDANCE FOR INDUSTRY: GUIDE TO MINIMIZE MICROBIAL FOOD SAFETY HAZARDS OF FRESH-CUT FRUITS AND VEGETABLES", OR ANY SUCCESSOR PUBLICATION, AND INDUSTRY RECOGNIZED FOOD SAFETY PRACTICES.
- (10) "INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL COORDINATION TASK FORCE" OR "TASK FORCE" MEANS THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL COORDINATION TASK FORCE CREATED IN SECTION 22-82.6-104.
- (11) "INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM" OR "GRANT PROGRAM" MEANS THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM CREATED IN SECTION 22-82.6-105.
- (12) "On-farm food safety plans" means written plans or procedures that document the methods by which food safety is addressed on a farm. The plans may include general information about the operation, traceability program, recall procedure, corrective action procedure, worker health and hygiene, previous land use and site selection, agricultural water, agricultural chemicals, animal and pest control, soil amendments and manure, field harvesting, transportation plans from the field to a packing house, packing house activities, and final transportation plans for the food and agricultural products.
- (13) "SCHOOL" INCLUDES INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION. SECTION 3. In Colorado Revised Statutes, 22-82.6-104, amend (1), (3) (b), (3) (c), (3) (d), and (3) (e) as follows:



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22-82.6-104. Interagency farm-to-school coordination task force - creation. (1) In order to establish a state farm-to-school program in the future, there is hereby created an interagency farm-to-school coordination task force. referred to in this section as the "task force".

- (3) The task force shall study, develop, and recommend policies and methods to best implement a farm-to-school program, including:
- (b) Offering assistance in identifying funding sources and grants that allow school districts SCHOOLS to recover the cost associated with purchasing locally grown food AND AGRICULTURAL products;
- (c) Identifying, designing, or making available training programs to enable local farmers and ranchers to market their products to school districts SCHOOLS, including programs related to crop production, marketing of crops, post-harvest handling of crops, food safety, business management, liability and risk management, contracting for crops, processing of crops, and any other topics deemed appropriate by the task force;
- (d) Advising school districts SCHOOLS on methods by which a school district may improve facilities to allow for the purchase and use of minimally processed and fresh and locally produced foods FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS in school meals;
- (e) Providing assistance to school food services to establish procedures, recipes, menu rotation, proper handling, preparing, storing, and other internal processes that accommodate the use of locally grown foods AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS in public schools;

SECTION 4. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 22-82.6-105 as follows:

- 22-82.6-105. Interagency farm-to-school grant program application criteria awards repeal. (1) There is hereby created the interagency farm-to-school grant program to provide grants to farmers and ranchers to further encourage a successful statewide farm-to-school program.
- (2) THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT SHALL ADMINISTER THE GRANT PROGRAM IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROCEDURES IN THIS SECTION. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL ANNUALLY APPROPRIATE BY SEPARATE LINE ITEM IN THE ANNUAL GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT AN AMOUNT OF NOT LESS THAN NINE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT TO ALLOW THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL COORDINATION TASK FORCE TO AWARD GRANTS AS SPECIFIED IN THIS SECTION. THE DEPARTMENT MAY EXPEND NOT MORE THAN SEVEN PERCENT OF THE MONEYS ANNUALLY APPROPRIATED FOR THE GRANT



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PROGRAM TO OFFSET THE DIRECT COSTS INCURRED BY THE DEPARTMENT IN ADMINISTERING THE GRANT PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION.

- (3) BOTH THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT AND THE TASK FORCE ARE AUTHORIZED TO SEEK AND ACCEPT GIFTS, GRANTS, AND DONATIONS FROM PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SOURCES FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION, BUT THE RECEIPT OF GIFTS, GRANTS, AND DONATIONS IS NOT A PREREQUISITE TO THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE GRANT PROGRAM.
- (4) TO THE EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW, THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT MAY, AT ITS DISCRETION, DIRECT OTHER MONEYS TO FUND THE GRANT PROGRAM.
 - (5) TWO TYPES OF GRANTS MAY BE AWARDED BY THE TASK FORCE:
- (a) A COST-SHARE GRANT TO A FARMER OR RANCHER TO BE USED FOR INVESTMENTS NECESSARY TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS OF ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS, FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATION, OR GAP/GHP AUDITS TO ENABLE SALES TO SCHOOLS. INVESTMENTS INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO:
- (I) TRAINING FOR MANAGERS, WORKERS, VOLUNTEERS, OR OTHERS INVOLVED IN GROWING AND HANDLING FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS;
- (II) EQUIPMENT FOR THE MONITORING OF THE ENVIRONMENT, WATER, SOIL, OR SOIL AMENDMENTS FOR THE PRESENCE OF HUMAN PATHOGENS OR INDICATOR ORGANISMS, INCLUDING ANY OTHER ASSOCIATED COSTS;
- (III) THE COST OF DISPOSABLE SUPPLIES REQUIRED AS A PART OF ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS IN ORDER TO SELL FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS TO SCHOOLS. SUCH DISPOSABLE SUPPLIES MAY INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO, HAND WASHING SUPPLIES, CLEANING SUPPLIES OR SANITIZERS, CONTAINERS, TOTES, PACKAGING MATERIALS, TEMPERATURE CONTROL SUPPLIES, OR RODENT CONTROL SUPPLIES.
- (IV) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS MADE AS PART OF ON-FARM FOOD SAFETY PLANS. SUCH CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS MAY INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO, IMPROVEMENTS TO OR CONSTRUCTION OF HYGIENE FACILITIES, INSTALLING SIGNAGE, BUILDING FENCES, MAKING NECESSARY CHANGES TO WATER SOURCES OR DELIVERY SYSTEMS, OR PURCHASING HARVESTING EQUIPMENT, PACKING EQUIPMENT, OR STORAGE OR COOLING FACILITIES OR EQUIPMENT.
- (b) A COST-SHARE GRANT TO A FARMER OR RANCHER FOR COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH SALES TO SCHOOLS, SPECIFICALLY COSTS RELATED TO:
- (I) AGGREGATION, TRANSPORTATION, OR DISTRIBUTION OF PRODUCTS TO SCHOOLS, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO LABOR OR



STORAGE OR COOLING EQUIPMENT NEEDED TO DELIVER PRODUCE TO SCHOOLS;

- (II) EXPANDED OR ALTERED PRODUCTION PROCESSES NECESSARY FOR SALES TO SCHOOLS, INCLUDING SEASON EXTENSION INVESTMENTS TO EXTEND AVAILABILITY OF PRODUCE DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR; OR
- (III) PRODUCTION COSTS INCURRED BY FARMERS OR RANCHERS THAT PLACE THEM AT A COMPETITIVE DISADVANTAGE TO OTHER VENDORS WHO SOURCE THEIR FOOD AND AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS FROM OUTSIDE COLORADO OR ARE OTHERWISE SUBSIDIZED.
- (6) THE TASK FORCE HAS THE AUTHORITY TO MAKE DECISIONS REGARDING GRANT AWARDS AS PROVIDED IN THIS SECTION.
- (7) THE TASK FORCE SHALL ISSUE GUIDELINES AS MAY BE NECESSARY FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE GRANT PROGRAM. THE GUIDELINES MUST INCLUDE, BUT NEED NOT BE LIMITED TO, THE TIME FRAMES FOR SUBMITTING GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATIONS, THE FORM OF THE GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION, AND THE TIME FRAMES FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF GRANT MONEYS. THE TASK FORCE SHALL SEEK PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE GUIDELINES IT ISSUES, WHICH PUBLIC COMMENT MAY BE SUBMITTED ELECTRONICALLY, BY MAIL, OR IN PERSON. UPON COMPLETION, ALL GUIDELINES MUST BE POSTED ON THE TASK FORCE'S WEB SITE.
- (8) AN ENTITY THAT SEEKS TO RECEIVE A GRANT PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION MUST SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO THE TASK FORCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE GUIDELINES ISSUED BY THE TASK FORCE AS SPECIFIED IN SUBSECTION (7) OF THIS SECTION. AT A MINIMUM, THE APPLICATION MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION:
 - (a) PROOF THAT THE FARM OR RANCH IS LOCATED IN THE STATE;
- (b) A DESCRIPTION OF THE FOOD SAFETY INVESTMENTS REQUIRED BY THE FARM OR RANCH TO ENABLE SALES TO SCHOOLS;
- (c) RECEIPTS FOR ALL COST-SHARE EXPENSES SOUGHT FOR REIMBURSEMENT THROUGH A GRANT; AND
- (d) DEMONSTRATION OF ACTUAL SALES TO SCHOOLS FOR ANY FARMER OR RANCHER SEEKING A GRANT AWARD OR AS A REQUIRED DELIVERABLE RESULTING FROM A GRANT AWARD.
- (9) THE TASK FORCE SHALL REVIEW THE APPLICATIONS RECEIVED PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION.
- (10) SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE APPROPRIATIONS, THE TASK FORCE SHALL SELECT APPLICANTS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT SHALL AWARD GRANTS TO THE SELECTED APPLICANTS ON OR BEFORE AUGUST 1 OF EACH YEAR OF THE GRANT PROGRAM.
 - (11) (a) FOR THE 2015-16 STATE FISCAL YEAR, AND EACH FISCAL



YEAR THEREAFTER THROUGH THE 2019-20 STATE FISCAL YEAR, THE TASK FORCE SHALL SELECT ONE GRANT RECIPIENT TO:

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- (I) EVALUATE FOR THE TASK FORCE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM TO DETERMINE WHICH COMPONENTS INCENTIVIZE FARMERS OR RANCHERS TO ENTER INTO CONTRACTS WITH SCHOOLS OR INCREASE THE AMOUNT OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS SOLD TO SCHOOLS; AND
- (II) PERFORM CERTAIN RESPONSIBILITIES INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, ESTABLISHING FOR THE TASK FORCE THE GUIDELINES DESCRIBED IN SUBSECTION (7) OF THIS SECTION, SPECIFYING THE FOOD SAFETY REQUIREMENTS FOR A GRANT, THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS ELIGIBLE FOR A GRANT, PROVIDING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE TO SCHOOLS, FARMERS, AND RANCHERS, AND LIAISING BETWEEN THE TASK FORCE AND COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDERS WHO WISH TO PARTICIPATE IN OR BENEFIT FROM THE GRANT PROGRAM.
- (b) On or before February 1, 2016, February 1, 2018, and February 1, 2019, the task force shall submit a report to the joint committee of the general assembly that oversees the department of public health and environment, or any successor joint committee, that summarizes the task force's evaluation of the grant program.
- (12) NOTWITHSTANDING SECTION 24-1-136 (11) (a) (I), C.R.S., THE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS SET FORTH IN THIS SECTION CONTINUE UNTIL THE PROGRAM REPEALS PURSUANT TO SUBSECTION (13) OF THIS SECTION.
 - (13) (a) This section is repealed, effective July 1, 2020.
- (b) PRIOR TO THE REPEAL, THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM MUST BE REVIEWED AS PROVIDED FOR IN SECTION 24-34-104, C.R.S.
- **SECTION 5.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, 24-34-104, add (51) (g) as follows:
- 24-34-104. General assembly review of regulatory agencies and functions for termination, continuation, or reestablishment. (51) The following agencies, functions, or both, shall terminate on July 1, 2020:
- (g) THE INTERAGENCY FARM-TO-SCHOOL GRANT PROGRAM CREATED IN SECTION 22-82.6-105, C.R.S.
- SECTION 6. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds, determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.".

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
