BILL TOPIC: REPORTING MISSING YOUTH IN STATE'S LEGAL CUSTODY

Summary of Legislation

This bill requires missing youth within the legal custody of the state Department of Human Services or county department of human or social services be reported to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and to law enforcement immediately, but no later than 24 hours after the disappearance is identified. Law enforcement agencies are required to report the disappearance to the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in the Department of Public Safety for transmission to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and entry into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) database. The bill clarifies that the reporting procedures for foster parents and out-of-home placement facilities still apply.

Background

When youth are in the custody of the Division of Youth Corrections (DYC) in the Department of Human Services and walk away or escape placement, a warrant is entered into the NCIC within 24 hours. This bill expands this existing reporting procedure to include all out-of-home placements and to paroled DYC youth that fail to check in with a parole officer.

State Expenditures

Beginning in FY 2015-16, workload for the Department of Human Services will increase by a minimal amount to make reports for any missing, non-incarcerated youth within the custody of the department. The department will also be required to provide outreach and training to county departments of human or social services regarding the change in law. The CBI in the DPS will be required to transmit information to the FBI. These activities can be accomplished without an increase in appropriations to any state agency.

Local Government Impact

Similar to the state, this bill will increase workload for any county departments of human or social services to report missing youth. Workload for units of local law enforcement will also increase to make the required reports to the CBI. Any increases in workload are assumed to be minimal.

Effective Date

The bill was signed into law by the Governor on March 20, 2015, and takes effect on January 1, 2016, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
