1 INSPECTION RECEIVED FROM A BOARD-APPROVED THIRD-PARTY ENTITY  
2 THAT INSPECTS PHARMACY OUTLETS, FOR WHICH THIRD-PARTY  
3 INSPECTION THE NONRESIDENT PHARMACY OUTLET SHALL OBTAIN AND  
4 PAY FOR ON AN ANNUAL BASIS, AND THE BOARD APPROVES THE  
5 INSPECTION REPORTS AS SATISFACTORILY DEMONSTRATING PROOF OF  
6 COMPLIANCE WITH THE BOARD'S OWN INSPECTION PROCEDURE AND  
7 STANDARDS.

8  
9 Page 3 of the bill, strike lines 5 and 6 and substitute "DRUG OUTLET MAY  
10 COMPOUND AND DISTRIBUTE A DRUG TO A".

11  
12 Page 3 of the bill, strike lines 16 and 17 and substitute "THROUGH A  
13 REGISTERED PRESCRIPTION DRUG OUTLET."

19 12-42.5-118 (6) (b) (II) WITHOUT A VALID VETERINARIAN-CLIENT-PATIENT  
20 RELATIONSHIP IN PLACE AT THE TIME OF ADMINISTERING THE  
21 COMPOUNDED DRUG TO AN ANIMAL PATIENT OR DISPENSING THE  
22 COMPOUNDED DRUG TO A CLIENT.

23 (4) TO COMPOUND AND DISTRIBUTE A CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE  
24 PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION OR SECTION 12-42.5-118 (6) (b) (II), A  
25 REGISTERED PRESCRIPTION DRUG OUTLET SHALL POSSESS A VALID  
26 MANUFACTURING REGISTRATION FROM THE FEDERAL DRUG ENFORCEMENT  
27 ADMINISTRATION."
