43 DEPARTMENT SHALL USE ANY MONEY ACCEPTED UNDER THIS SUBSECTION

42 FOR NON-PSYCHIATRIC MEDICAL STABILIZATION. THE TIME PERIODS DO
43 NOT COUNT TOWARD THE SEVENTY-TWO-HOUR TIME LIMIT ALLOWED FOR
44 TREATMENT AND EVALUATION BY A DESIGNATED FACILITY.

18 ASSESSMENT OF THE PERSON IN CUSTODY. THE PETITION MUST STATE
19 FACTS SUFFICIENT TO ESTABLISH BY CLEAR AND CONVINCING EVIDENCE
20 THAT THE PERSON HAS A MENTAL ILLNESS AND, AS A RESULT OF THE
21 MENTAL ILLNESS, IS AN IMMINENT DANGER TO OTHERS OR TO HIMSELF OR
22 HERSELF OR APPEARS TO BE GRAVELY DISABLED. THE EMERGENCY
23 MEDICAL SERVICES FACILITY SHALL FILE THE PETITION FOR EXTENSION OF
24 EMERGENCY CUSTODY WITH THE COURT IN THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE
25 PERSON RESIDED OR WAS PHYSICALLY PRESENT IMMEDIATELY PRIOR TO

28 EXTENSION OF EMERGENCY CUSTODY, THE EMERGENCY MEDICAL

30 (I) PERSONALLY DELIVER A COPY OF THE PETITION TO THE PERSON
31 IN CUSTODY AND KEEP A COPY OF THE PETITION IN THE PERSON'S MEDICAL

33 (II) ASK THE PERSON IN CUSTODY TO DESIGNATE ONE OTHER
