(VII) The average class size for each public elementary school, middle school or junior high school, and senior high school in the state calculated as the total number of students enrolled in the school divided by the number of full-time teachers in the school. For purposes of this

subparagraph (VII), "full-time teacher" means a person who is licensed pursuant to article 60.5 of this title or IS authorized by a letter of authorization issued pursuant to section 22-60.5-111 to teach, and is primarily engaged in teaching during a substantial majority of the 5 instructional minutes per school day. 6 7 **SECTION 20.** 22-32-109.6 (2) (f), Colorado Revised Statutes, is 8 amended to read: 9 10 22-32-109.6.
