This letter sets forth my reasons for letting this bill become law 25 without my signature. 26 27 Providing safe routes for our children to travel to and from school is a 28 laudable goal. That is why Congress will likely create a "Safe Routes to 29 School" program to improve sidewalks and pathways near schools in the 30 reauthorization of federal highway legislation. House Bill 04-1309 31 creates an advisory board to review applications for the federal Safe 32 Routes to School program and to make recommendations on those 33 applications to the Colorado Transportation Commission. 34 35 House Bill 04-1309 is likely premature, as it may require the Commission to promulgate rules on the federal Safe Routes to School program even 36 37 before Congress establishes the program. Passage of a comprehensive 38 federal highway reauthorization bill prior to the adjournment of the 108th 39 Congress is growing less likely. Because House Bill 04-1309 40 appropriates funds to study and promulgate the rules in Fiscal Year 2004-41 2005, it can be assumed that the rules must be completed in that time 42 frame, regardless of the status of the federal program. 43 44 Although I support the intent of the Safe Routes to School program, I am concerned that creating an advisory board sets an untenable precedent for 45 46 such boards to oversee the distribution of federal transportation grants. 47 Furthermore, I am concerned that the General Assembly is creating a 48 program to distribute federal funds over which the General Assembly 49 holds no power to allocate or appropriate. The Transportation Commission promulgates rules for the management of dozens, if not 50 hundreds, of federal transportation programs meant to improve public 51 mobility and traffic safety. Managing these programs requires as much 52 53 flexibility as possible to address statewide transportation needs. House 54 Bill 04-1309 creates a nine member advisory board that must include 55 educators, parents, bicyclists, pedestrians and law enforcement personnel. 56 While board members from these fields may provide the Commission

This letter sets forth my reasons for letting this 32 bill become law without my signature. 33 34 This bill provides for a collaborative study of the benefits and 35 disadvantages of relocating the Colorado Geological Survey from the Department of Natural Resources to the Colorado School of Mines. 36 37 Insofar as it may identify areas of potential collaboration between the 38 Geological Survey and the School of Mines in the fields of research and 39 applied geology, this proposed study will benefit the people of Colorado. 40 At the same time, our State stands to gain from a better understanding of 41 comparative administrative structures used in other States for their 42 geological surveys. In our federal framework, each State serves as its 43 own laboratory for public policy, and in the area of geology, as in so 44 many other policy areas, Colorado can only benefit from an awareness of 45 the lessons and experience of neighboring States. 46 47 I remain concerned, however, that certain language in this bill, including 48 its title, contemplates a recommendation that the Geological Survey 49 should be relocated from the Department of Natural Resources to the 50 School of Mines. I have expressed my opposition to such a transfer on multiple occasions in the past. Relocating the Geological Survey out of 51 the Department of Natural Resources not only would introduce 52 53 inefficiency and further cost into our state government, but also would

4 Changes to the Felony Threshold Loss Amount in Certain Crimes." I 5 vetoed this bill as of 10:55 A.M. today. This letter sets forth my reasons 6 for doing so.

7

8 House Bill 04-1165 would raise the felony threshold limits from \$500 to 9 \$675, thus permitting a defendant to steal property or services of 10 increased value before such crime is determined to be a felony. This allows someone to commit a crime with an increased value amount and 11 12 incur a lesser punishment than current law mandates. House Bill 04-1165 13 would give criminals a 25% increase in the amount of goods or services they could steal before being charged with a felony. 14

15

16 House Bill 04-1165 was introduced as a cost savings measure. The 17 amount of money saved does not compensate for the potential increases 18 in losses suffered by victims of these crimes.

19

20 Accordingly, I have vetoed this bill.

37 I am filing with the Secretary of State House Bill 04-1225, "Concerning 38 the Low Income Energy Assistance Act." This bill creates a Low-Income 39 Energy Assistance Program, to be administered by Energy Outreach 40 Colorado, a Colorado non-profit corporation. I vetoed this bill as of 41 10:53 A.M. today. This letter sets forth my reason for doing so.

42

43 House Bill 04-1225 requires Colorado utilities to participate in the 44 Energy Assistance Program and to collect an energy assistance charge 45 from each electric and gas customer beginning on January 1, 2005. That charge will be added to the customer's bill unless he or she affirmatively 46 47 "opts out" of the charge through a process that would be promulgated by 48 the Public Utility Commission. The presence of the "opt out" provision 49 – which forces consumers to retract a financial commitment made on 50 their behalf by elected officials – causes me to veto this bill.

51

52 I have been a longtime, and consistent, opponent of opt out provisions. 53 In 2000, for example, I was pleased to sign legislation in 2000 that created an "opt-in" system for students at the University of Colorado 54 55 regarding fees to the Colorado Public Interest Research Group 56 (COPIRG). Students had been assessed the fee but could opt out of the 1 payment. This legislation did the right thing by allowing students to opt 2 in.

3

4 I am not alone in my deep concerns about the fairness and propriety of 5 "opt out" provisions. Colorado was party to a case in 2003 that challenged opt-out marketing practices by H&R Block. Attorney General 6 Ken Salazar said at the conclusion of this case that, "Silence should never 7 8 mean 'yes' in a consumer transaction. Consumers have the right to 9 expect that they will be charged for only those products or services that 10 they expressly request. Consumers should not have to act to prevent 11 unwanted sales from taking place."

12

13 The Consumer Federation of America also strongly supports opt-in, 14 rather than opt out procedures, stating in the context of a national cell-15 phone directory, "Someone needs to ask you face-to-face if you want to 16 be listed before they do it."

17

18 Clearly, the opt-out provision of House Bill 04-1225 clearly would result 19 in consumers unwittingly paying a fee that they would otherwise choose 20 not to pay. The evidence for this is the admission by proponents of this 21 legislation that the opt-out provision would raise up to \$8 million more 22 in fees than the current opt in provision does.

23

24 Let me be clear that my focused concern about the opt-out provision, 25 which is resulting in a veto, does not diminish my support for the Low Income Energy Assistance Program. Throughout my term as governor, I 26 27 have taken significant steps to support this program, putting in an additional \$20 million. Specifically, in 2001, I requested and the 28 29 Legislature enacted a bill to allocate \$10 million from the state severance 30 tax fund. And last year I allocated \$10 million from flexible federal 31 funds for the program. This is a valuable program, worthy of investment. 32

Clearly, "opt out" legislation is controversial, given the close 33-31 vote
in the House of Representatives. In contrast, if this legislation had been
presented with an opt-in provision, I would have signed it. If such a bill
is introduced in the 2005 session, I will support it and sign it into law.

House Bill 04-1283 creates a commission to study issues pertaining to 1 2 high school education in Colorado. This is well intentioned but currently 3 unnecessary legislation. Local school districts understand the importance 4 of improving student achievement in their high schools and are already 5 taking steps to do so. The Mapleton School District, for instance, is completely revamping its high schools under its Choices for Learning 6 7 The Denver Public School District recently formed the initiative. 8 Secondary School Reform Commission to review best practices and apply 9 them to their own district to boost student achievement. With these and 10 other efforts at high school reform already underway in Colorado, a state 11 commission would only distract from their efforts. 12 13 Furthermore, was I to conclude that a high school commission is warranted, the structure in House Bill 04-1283 is not one I support. First, 14 the bill greatly limits the appointing authority of the Executive Branch. 15 16 Rather than allow the Governor to appoint from a wide variety of citizens with a stake in high schools, the bill focuses on representatives from a 17 18 narrow set of trade associations and organizations. Additionally, the bill 19 puts the Department of Education in the awkward position of having to solicit contributions to fund the commission. As I have said in previous 20 veto messages to the General Assembly, I am reluctant to approve 21 22 legislation with a "tin cup" approach to funding a government endeavor. 23 24 I strongly support further reforms of Colorado's high schools to boost 25 student achievement. Clearly, more work must be done to close the learning gap, reduce drop out rates and boost college enrollment. I vetoed this bill as of 11:54 A.M. today. This letter sets forth 53 my reasons for doing so. 54

55 This bill will allow municipalities to withdraw from library districts 56 without a vote of the electors affected by such action. Residents of the

withdrawing municipality would continue to bear the burden of paying 1 their proportional share of any debt incurred by the existing library 2 3 district as well as the burden of financing a new municipal library. It will 4 lead to the fragmentation of library services in communities throughout the state, a possible decrease in the quality of services provided, and the 5 future financial viability of certain library districts. 6 7 8 House Bill 04-1367 was introduced to address a conflict between two 9 local governments over public library services. This letter sets forth my reasons for doing 13 SO. 14 15 House Bill 04-1424 is attempting to exempt from taxation certain, otherwise taxable possessory interests in property when those interests 16 are below certain thresholds. It is my opinion that this legislation violates 17 18 Article X, Section 3 of the Colorado Constitution that requires uniform 19 taxation unless otherwise exempted by the constitution.
