48
49 Good Morning. Thank you all for joining us today as we begin the First Session
50 of the 68th General Assembly. I'd like to take a moment to recognize our new
51 members, Representatives Mark Barker, Jon Becker, Don Beezley, J. Paul
52 Brown, Kathleen Conti, Don Coram, Crisanta Duran, Rhonda Fields, Deb
53 Gardner, Millie Hamner, Chris Holbert, Matt Jones, Janak Joshi, Pete Lee, Dan
54 Pabon, Robert Ramirez, Ray Scott, Keith Swerdfeger, Libby Szabo, Angela
55 Williams, and alphabetically last, but not least, Roger Wilson.

56

1 It is also appropriate to recognize those who, due to term-limits, will be serving
2 in this Chamber for their last General Assembly.

3
4 Please help me congratulate and thank Representatives Balmer, Kerr, Liston,
5 Massey, McKinley, Riesberg, Solano, Soper and Todd. Thank you for your
6 service to the people of Colorado.

7
8 To all Members, congratulations on serving in the 68th General Assembly and
9 a special thank you to your family and friends whose sacrifices far too often go
10 unrecognized.

11
12 Congratulations to our new Governor, John Hickenlooper and new Lieutenant
13 Governor, Joe Garcia.

14
15 I am blessed to come from a big family and they are here today. My Mom
16 Denise, my Dad Frank, my brothers and sisters and their families; Troy and
17 Dani – Greg, Lorelei & Cole; Kourtney and Lloyd - Shaylynn, Shane and
18 Nicole – Rylie & Brianna, Chadd and Kimi; and Lyndsay and Nick - Cameron.
19 Thank you for all of your support and for making time to join us today.

20
21 Finally, I would like to recognize a man who is intimately familiar with the
22 Chamber, and a man for whom I have the most sincere and utmost respect,
23 former Speaker of the House Russell George.

24
25 Madame Majority Leader, Mr. Minority Leader, Colleagues; Coloradans are
26 struggling. Over the past few years, all of us have tightened our belts and done
27 more with less. Our State's unemployment rate is the highest it's been in
28 decades. Colorado's small businesses continue to fight for survival, and many
29 working families are struggling to put food on the table and to pay their bills.
30 And, while there is no exact formula for what is needed to create an
31 environment that fosters job creation and economic recovery, there are a few
32 simple truths that voters have asked us to reestablish. An education program
33 that is funded, flexible and accountable; a transportation system that moves
34 people, goods, and services, safely and efficiently throughout Colorado; tax
35 rates that are low and fair; and a regulatory system that is stable and sensible
36 with an eye toward compliance and consumer protection, not punishment. For
37 us all, job creation and economic recovery must be our focus with all proposed
38 legislation.

39
40 Undoubtedly, we will have our differences from time to time. We are elected
41 leaders after all. But these philosophical disagreements should not distract us
42 from the important challenges at hand. There is far too much at stake. Now is
43 the time for new solutions to combat our economic recession. This body needs
44 innovative ideas to help Coloradans get back to work.

45
46 The good news is, the Centennial State has confronted many challenges in its
47 135 year history. We have overcome them all. From the 19th century settlers
48 and frontiersmen who endured harsh winters and difficult terrain to head west
49 in search of a better life for themselves, to the countless servicemen and women
50 who served, and continue to serve, in the defense of freedom. For those in the
51 Chamber and the gallery who have served, or who are serving, in our nation's
52 armed forces, please stand and allow us to thank you for your service.

53
54 Colorado was founded with the pioneer spirit that drives everyone who calls our
55 state home. And as the Dust Bowl ravaged the Eastern Plains of Colorado, our
56 Governor at the time, Edwin "Big Ed" Johnson, a Democrat, struggled with the

1 challenges we face today. He seized the opportunity to lead. Big Ed was
2 critical of Washington, D.C.'s New Deal plan, which he saw as a one-size fits
3 all approach. Rather than keep this one-sized approach, he focused on working
4 with the federal government and state leaders to create Colorado's own
5 reorganization and reform program. Governor Johnson pushed for a balanced
6 state budget, instituted tax reforms, and even managed to draft a robust highway
7 construction program. All during the depths of the Great Depression.
8
9 With this same spirit of commitment and optimism, we will prevail over the
10 difficult economic challenges of today. Perseverance pays off and I'm confident
11 this House will pass the common-sense legislation our state desperately needs
12 to put Coloradans back to work. Our collaborative efforts must recognize the
13 distinct, but important differences in background, philosophy and outlook of
14 Colorado's diverse communities from rural to urban to suburban.
15
16 Last November, Coloradans sent us a message; they want us to work together
17 earnestly to find solutions to our economic ills and to set this state on the right
18 track again. Coloradans want a state government that knows its role – a
19 government that lives within its means and facilitates economic growth.
20
21 We are listening to the voters. They want us to provide for services they care
22 about - that guarantee Colorado will go smartly into the future. Today I am
23 pledging to work with the new administration to begin a serious conversation
24 about reinventing government, reforming procurement, and utilizing technology
25 to effectively and efficiently deliver services wherever possible. There is no
26 better time - no greater need, for us to come together than right now.
27
28 Our state faces an historic budget gap of more than \$1 billion. On this, let me
29 be clear. The days of balancing the state budget on the backs of working
30 families and small businesses are over. We cannot treat the state budget
31 differently than families across Colorado treat their own budgets. We have the
32 next 120 days to learn how to do it.
33
34 The bill for kicking the can down the road has come due. We will not spend
35 what we don't have, and yes, I recognize that this will require the State of
36 Colorado to further tighten its belt. But that same belt tightening has gone on
37 throughout Colorado by working families and small businesses for the past four
38 years. If we refuse to make the tough choices now, these same choices will
39 become more difficult for Colorado to bear down the road. These tough choices
40 will require working in good faith.
41
42 Governor Hickenlooper; and my friends in the Senate: We stand ready to work
43 with you and make the tough choices. But we must—and we will—adhere to
44 our core principles and to the will of the people of Colorado.
45
46 Along with tax relief and regulation reform, we are committed to reinstating
47 a spending limit to protect future generations from government spending
48 excesses. If we have learned anything from the past few years, it's that
49 excessive government spending prolongs economic recessions. It does not
50 shorten them. Changing the culture of spending will not be an easy task. But it
51 is imperative to the long-term fiscal stability and solvency of our state. Our
52 spending limitation must be accompanied by a long-term commitment to fiscal
53 responsibility. The time has come for us to do our part now to avoid in the
54 future the kind of catastrophic budget cliff that Colorado faces today. We must
55 pass a substantive state savings account, protected by the requirement of a super
56 majority vote.

1 On your desk is a copy of our state and nation's Constitutions, along with your
2 oath of office. This is not a simple symbolic action. Rather, I ask each of you
3 to consider all three documents as you take to your work here. With a
4 challenging session ahead of us, recognizing and respecting our founding
5 documents will be key foundations for our decision making. It is the
6 Declaration of Independence that serves as the soul of our Constitution and our
7 nation in the recognition that, "Governments are instituted among Men-deriving
8 their just powers from the consent of the governed..."

9
10 With that admonition in mind, House leadership is also committed to open and
11 transparent government. Coloradans deserve a Legislature that is honest and
12 forthright. Seeing as everyone in this chamber is tasked with spending taxpayer
13 dollars appropriately, we owe it to our constituents to keep them informed of
14 how their money is being spent. We look forward to working with the Senate,
15 the Governor, and our state agencies across our system of government.

16
17 We are committed to quality and efficiency in the delivery of health care by
18 utilizing free markets that allow Coloradans to make their own healthcare
19 decisions.

20
21 We are committed to our colleges and universities that will prepare graduates
22 to compete in a 21st century economy.

23
24 We are committed to working with our colleagues across the aisle to better
25 serve the entire state of Colorado. Bipartisanship gets lots of talk time, but is
26 always more difficult in practice. I'm reminded of the humor by P. J. O'Rourke
27 in his comments that, "The Democrats are the party that says government will
28 make you smarter, taller, richer, and remove the crabgrass on your lawn. The
29 Republicans are the party that says government doesn't work and then they get
30 elected and prove it." Our work together will be difficult, but it can be done
31 with good humor, and it must be done with good faith.

32
33 Colleagues, we must challenge ourselves to do what we can to spur innovation
34 and entrepreneurship in our state. We must recognize that Colorado's private
35 sector can, and should, play a remarkable role during the next decade in
36 aerospace, technology, tourism, agriculture, natural resources and perhaps most
37 exciting, bioscience, which is one of the fastest growing industries in Colorado,
38 growing at a rate faster than the national average. Let's recognize that
39 economic development is as important in Craig or Lamar as it is in Denver or
40 Grand Junction.

41
42 There is no question that Colorado is a great place to live. The beautiful scenery
43 from all four corners of our state is second to none. Colorado's economy can
44 thrive off of tourism. The more skiers, hikers, rafters, bikers, and sightseers we
45 can attract to Colorado, the better our economy will perform.

46
47 We must enter into this session knowing that we can truly and sincerely
48 legislate with not just an eye toward the next election, but with a real vision for
49 the future. We have an opportunity to do things differently; understanding that
50 sacrifice now will lead to a better future for generations of Coloradans.

51
52 There are no easy answers, the tough decisions remain, but together, we will
53 meet these challenges head-on. Let's embrace our role, limit what we do, and
54 send a message to the citizens and businesses of this state that we are ready to
55 make the same tough choices as they are being forced to make.

56

1 As the 68th General Assembly begins, each of us shares in the responsibility to
2 govern wisely. We have been called by our friends and neighbors to serve them
3 during these challenging and remarkable times. We are blessed that they have
4 trusted us to guide our great State through these raging waters. Colleagues, we
5 are up to the task. We will govern with consistency and compassion. And
6 when we look back on this General Assembly, an assembly of citizen
7 legislators, we will be proud of what we have accomplished together.

8
9 Thank you all for your willingness to serve these four corners we call home.
10 The real work starts now. May God bless you, may He bless our great state of
11 Colorado, and may He continue to bless the United States of America.

23 Mr. Speaker, I'd like to offer my best wishes, my hope that we can work
24 productively and well together over the coming months.

25
26 In all seriousness, I look forward to working together over the next 120 days to
27 confront the serious issues facing this great state of ours.

28
29 To my new colleagues, let me extend my congratulations and a warning: you're
30 in for quite a ride!

31
32 Thank you, Archbishop Chaput for your moving prayer; to the Colorado
33 National Guard Honor Guard for presenting the colors; to Karen Kataline for
34 your lovely rendition of the national anthem; and to Boy Scout Troop 794 for
35 leading the pledge.

36
37 I'd also like to thank Speaker Carroll, Majority Leader Weissmann, Minority
38 Leader May and the other outgoing Representatives for their service to the state
39 over the past years.

40
41 Finally, I'd like to recognize the Coloradans who have gathered with us on the
42 floor and in the gallery today, especially the kids. Can all of children in the
43 room please stand up? Let's give them all a hand!

44
45 Each of us come to this building every day to ensure that all of you have a
46 bright future, and that we leave things better for you, and I'm thrilled you have
47 joined us to witness a true spectacle of democracy: the peaceful and orderly
48 transfer of power from one party to another.

49
50 Finally, I'd like to single out my wife Marlene, my mother in-law Lena, and
51 sons Wyatt and Carlo. I would not be here today without your love and support.

52
53 Coloradans sent us here to do a job. They elected each individual in this room
54 to make wise choices that respect the values of hardworking Coloradans: fiscal
55 responsibility, tolerance and practicality.

56

1 Coloradans want a government that is fair, transparent, honest and accountable.
2
3 And they want a government that is effective.
4
5 As we start our work today, we would do well to listen to the people, and to
6 adhere to their values. We should not steer toward extremes. Instead, we
7 should embrace the opportunity before us: to work together and with Governor
8 Hickenlooper toward creating a better tomorrow.
9
10 With careful collaboration, and clear-headed, bi-partisan work, we can confront
11 the biggest challenges head-on, and resolve them thoughtfully, and in a way that
12 respects all Coloradans.
13
14 We heard a great deal over the last few months about the ills of government.
15 And while an honest critique is warranted, too often government is vilified in
16 the public discourse.
17
18 It is simply too easy to make government a scapegoat.
19
20 On this day, when we celebrate the democratic process, let us also remember
21 that our government was envisioned as a tool for people to use to debate and
22 solve problems.
23
24 As a place where people, despite their differences, can work toward the
25 common good.
26
27 As John Adams once said, "Government is instituted for the common good; for
28 the protection, safety, prosperity, and happiness of the people."
29
30 State government is not a solution for all that ails our state. Indeed, Colorado
31 has a government that is necessarily – constitutionally – limited in scope. But
32 it can – and should – be a force for good in people's lives.
33
34 Our job is to take this small government, and make sure it works as well as
35 possible.
36
37 To neglect programs or slash services without method; to penalize hardworking
38 state workers and teachers to score political points; to demonize people because
39 of their skin color or national origins; and to balance our budget on the backs
40 of the poor, the elderly, the sick and the young – these are not acceptable
41 solutions to the people of Colorado. And they should not be acceptable to any
42 of us.
43
44 If cynicism and fear influence the choices we make in this room over the
45 coming months, then we all have fundamentally failed the people who put us
46 here.
47
48 In that spirit, I call on all of us in this room to set aside the partisan differences
49 that divided us during the campaign, and to turn down the rhetoric.
50
51 Let us work together on behalf of all the people of Colorado, to continue
52 building a state that upholds our shared values and honors our western heritage.
53
54 Our priorities are simple: we want Coloradans to have good jobs, we want to
55 provide appropriate and adequate support for those who have fallen on hard
56 times, and we want to balance the budget in a fair way.

1 In just the past three years, we've grappled with a 5.2 billion dollar shortfall.
2 And in the coming legislative session, we face another shortfall of more than
3 one billion dollars that again requires tough choices and difficult cuts.
4
5 However, as we debate how to balance our budget and manage our shortfall, we
6 have to be honest about where the adjustments and cuts come from. Because
7 the cuts we make have real consequences for real people.
8
9 We are committed to working collaboratively to make the tough choices needed
10 to balance the budget. But as we do so, we must also have an eye toward the
11 future.
12
13 We cannot shackle the ambitions of a generation through feckless choices and
14 reckless, shortsighted cuts.
15
16 Every dollar we don't balance, every special interest and corporate tax break we
17 give out has an effect. Those dollars translate into bigger class sizes for our
18 children's schools; into reduced services for the elderly; and into greater
19 hardship for those who are physically and economically disadvantaged.
20
21 If we fail to meet our basic obligations, then the burden will be shifted onto
22 society generally.
23
24 It will result in busier emergency rooms and overcrowded prisons. In higher
25 dropout rates, higher crimes rates, and higher unemployment.
26
27 In short, if we invest a little up front, we will save a lot down the road.
28
29 That's why as we confront this budget cycle, we are looking critically at our
30 government as a whole, and focusing on investing in what works, and changing
31 what doesn't work.
32
33 We have a commitment to being transparent and accountable. And House
34 Democrats are honoring that commitment by bringing legislation to establish
35 a tough new "pay as you go" laws.
36
37 We want to ensure that we always do the responsible thing by identifying
38 specific spending cuts or replacement revenue up front for new programs and
39 tax breaks for corporations.
40
41 As we balance, we also have a commitment to the people of this state to make
42 sure that the programs and services they depend on work well, are accessible,
43 and are dependable.
44
45 So, in the same spirit of accountability and transparency, we will build upon last
46 year's SMART Government Act to make sure our state agencies are delivering
47 services efficiently and effectively.
48
49 In short, we must balance the budget the right way. And that means always
50 putting jobs, the economy and the hardworking and middle class families of
51 Colorado ahead of special interests.
52
53 Although Colorado's budget remains a top concern, of even greater importance
54 is providing a foundation for economic recovery.
55
56 Colorado has a much-deserved reputation for being one of the best places in the

1 United States to live, work and raise a family. Thanks to hard work inside and
2 outside this building, Colorado has been rated consistently among the top states
3 for business.
4
5 But that didn't happen by accident. It took careful planning, a commitment to
6 creating livable and affordable communities, and a dedication to developing an
7 environment suitable for attracting companies and jobs, and starting and
8 growing promising new businesses.
9
10 From our world-class ski resorts, to the burgeoning clean tech companies
11 hatched in cutting-edge Colorado labs, to traditional industries such as mining
12 and Pueblo steel production, to the fast-growing New Energy sector, our state
13 fosters innovation and values entrepreneurship.
14
15 And small business is the beating heart of our economy: some 82 percent of
16 Colorado's businesses have fewer than 50 employees.
17
18 That is why it is critical that we continue to spur innovation and foster free
19 markets, so that great ideas are transformed into great companies and
20 ultimately, into great jobs for Colorado's workers.
21
22 So in the coming weeks we will be rolling out the Colorado Joint Opportunity
23 for Business Support Program. The Colorado JOBS Act will provide
24 entrepreneurs with the resources, counseling, and access to credit they need to
25 see their small businesses succeed, and to help midsize companies grow across
26 Colorado.
27
28 That's also why we are supporting legislation to attract new private investments
29 and capital to Colorado in support of our most promising companies.
30
31 Because as those small businesses grow, we want to make sure they do so right
32 here in Colorado, instead of relocating to Cambridge, Massachusetts, Silicon
33 Valley, or overseas.
34
35 As we fight to put our economy back on solid footing in the short-term, we
36 must also not lose sight of our longer term goals: preparing our children to
37 succeed.
38
39 Good schools – good public schools – are critical to this state's success.
40 Providing a free public education –from kindergarten through high school – is
41 the single most important function of government.
42
43 Thomas Jefferson believed that we needed quality public education so we could
44 have an informed population of people prepared to make wise decisions for our
45 republic.
46
47 Our schools are already stretched. Because of the revenue shortfall caused by
48 our troubled economy 66 of 178 school districts in Colorado – or 37 percent –
49 are on four-day school weeks.
50
51 Recent gains in early childhood education – a key to academic success – are
52 threatened. And our dropout rate remains way too high.
53
54 We cannot compromise when it comes to our children. Reforms are needed,
55 and we will not shy away from making necessary changes so that our schools
56 – whether traditional or charter – are effective places for students to grow and

1 learn.

2

3 But adequate funding is needed too. So we will fight for every district in the
4 state to get the dollars they need to teach and prepare our kids for the coming
5 decades.

6

7 We will push to ensure our kids are ready for the next step after graduation, be
8 it a job, vocational training, or post-secondary education.

9

10 We will work to ensure that our community colleges train Coloradans for good,
11 high-skilled jobs.

12

13 And we will fight to maintain the standards of excellence and affordability that
14 Coloradans have come to expect – and deserve from our institutions of higher
15 learning.

16

17 Times are tough; how we respond is a test of who we are as Coloradans, and as
18 leaders.

19

20 Colorado has a rich western heritage. It's always been a frontier for the future;
21 a place where folks came not to expect handouts, but to build their own fortunes
22 and dreams.

23

24 In this Colorado, government should not be a barrier, but a partnership that
25 fosters prosperity.

26

27 We respect those values of the people of Colorado, and want to ensure that
28 every action we take under this dome is intended to leave things better for the
29 next generation, and for those children in this gallery today.

30

31 Thank you. Let's get to work.
