Colorado Consumer Health Initiative SB 228 Testimony House Transportation & Energy Committee April 23, 2009

Thank you Madam Chair, members of the Committee and Representative Marostica.

My name is Kelly Shanahan and I am the Policy Director for the Colorado Consumer Health Initiative. I am here today to testify in support of Senate Bill 228.

CCHI is a nonprofit, nonpartisan advocacy organization who's mission is barrier-free access to quality, affordable health care for all Coloradans. We act as a unified, statewide voice for consumers here at the Capitol and in other state-level policy making arenas. We have over 50 organizational members and many individual members. Some examples of our membership are the American Diabetes Association, the Rocky Mountain Farmers Union, 9 to 5 National Association of Working Women, Family Voices, Autism Society of Colorado, Mental Health America of Colorado, the American Cancer Society, the MS Society, the Colorado Children's Campaign, and many more.

Today I'd like to talk very briefly about the health care debate in our state and why removing the 6% budget formula is potentially a good thing for addressing the healthcare crisis.

And it is a crisis...

- Health care premiums are increasing at five times the rate of inflation and wages.
- This is certainly due to a number of factors, but not the least of which is the costshift. The cost shift is caused by the uninsured, the underinsured, and the underfunding of public safety net programs such as Medicaid and SCHIP, which gets shifted to private payers.
- In Colorado, we have a higher than average rate of uninsured compared to the nation.
- We have the fastest growing child poverty rate in the nation, which means more and more Colorado families are struggling.
- We have one of the leanest Medicaid programs in the nation, due in large measure to our inability to make necessary public investments.

However, a bright light is that we are the home of good conversation and robust debate on healthcare reform.

This legislative body created the 208 Blue Ribbon Commission for Healthcare Reform to discuss how we can pull our state out of this healthcare crisis and become an example of best practice to the rest of the nation.

The recommendations from that Commission were things like...

- Health information technology (universally supported but it requires significant upfront investments to get off the ground).
- Fill in the holes in the safety net create a public program for the most vulnerable in the state that truly meets their needs and maximize federal dollars.
- Improving our high risk pool CoverColorado so that it is truly a pool that cares for those in the most need and is adquately funded to do so, taking pressure off the private market.

However, these ideas and many more of their recommendations require some long term investments.

Because of the 6% budget formula, during good economic times, we are severly limited by this formula in the ability of our state (and this legislative body) to prioritize and make these investments.

And during rotten economic times, we are forced to make cuts to the bone. And these cuts are made permanent.

Whether it's severe economic pain that will be caused by the \$30.8 million in medical provider rate cuts approved in the Budget, OR the \$15 million taken from the Primary Care Fund for safety net community health centers, OR if the Legislature had chosen to take \$300 million from higher education, getting rid of the 6% will help ease that pain by helping those vital priorities to recover more quickly when the economy recovers. The alternative is artificially extending the recession by making permanent cuts to economic drivers such as health care and education.

For this reason, members of the health care community support removing this rigid formula and giving our legislature, you, the ability to put all public investments on a level playing field and prioritize funding based on our state's current needs as YOU see fit.

I urge your support of Senate Bill 228.
