

Health Insurance for Colorado's Children



- · Serve nearly 20% of Colorado's kids.
- Guarantee quality, affordable healthcare for kids, including screenings, immunizations, eyeglasses and medications.
- · Provide peace of mind for working families.
- · Are a smart investment in prevention.
- · Are popular programs, well-supported by voters.



Health Insurance for Colorado's Children




- · Serve 68% of Colorado's kids.
- Whole family, one provider network.
- · Captures business dollars.
- About 37.5% of Colorado's uninsured work for employers that don't offer employee coverage.
- Average cost of an employer sponsored family plan is \$12,680; employers pay about \$9,325 of that.



Health Insurance for Colorado's Children



- More than 12% of Colorado's kids are uninsured. That's 153,000 children.
- · Uninsurance = cost shifting and lost earnings.
- · Many are young children.
- · They are very low-income.
- · Their families work full-time.
- · They live in a cycle of poverty.





Most uninsured kids are already eligible for Medicaid or CHP+

Eligible but Not Enrolled in Medicald	47,604
Eligible but Not Enrolled in CHP+	30,626
Total Eligible but Not Enrolled	78,230



Barriers to Enrollment


- · Uncoordinated System for Medicaid and CHP+
 - Complicated application process
 - Confusing eligibility determination system
 - Difficult renewal procedures



· Lack of consistent and coordinated communication and training



- Children cycle between programs or on and off the system
 - 211 advisory committee is focusing on reducing chum and promoting retention
 - Recommendations include prioritizing 12 month Medicaid eligibility; administrative renewals (incomes well below Medicaid); aligning renewal dates with other programs; promoting off-cycle renewals.



- - 73% of Coloradans polled believe that every child should be covered by a government supported health care program if private health care proves unaffordable.
 - Colorado state and federal leaders committed to ensuring that all children have health care.



Children's Legislative Victories in 2007

- · Presumptive Eligibility for Children
- · Establishment of the 211 Advisory Committee
- Exemption of pregnant women and children in CHP+ from Colorado law requiring proof of lawful presence
- · Medical Home Initiative
- · Performance Measure Advisory Group



Children's Legislative Victories in 2008

- · Administrative Verification of Income
- Raised eligibility level for CHP+ from 205% FPL to 225% FPL with the authority to raise to 250% with funding
- Improved the CHP+ mental health benefit to be equal to that offered in Medicaid
- 211 to investigate streamlining/combining CHP+ and Medicaid
- Increased funding for medical home and CHP+ outreach
- · Fully funded the immunization registry



Children's Legislative Victories in 2009

- Authorized online application and phone re-enrollment process
- Raised eligibility level for CHP+ from 205% FPL to 250% FPL
- Raised eligibility level for parents in Medicaid from 60% FPL to 100% FPL.
- Funded 12 month continuous eligibility in Medicaid for children



Moving Ahead

Objective I: Reform the System to Work Better for Kids and Families

- · Strategy I: Design a seamless system of health insurance for kids.
- · Strategy II: Reduce red tape so it's easier for kids to get and keep health coverage.
- · Strategy III: Improve outreach to and enrollment of eligible kids.
- · Strategy IV: Fill in the gaps in care and coverage for kids and pregnant women.

comprehensive health care by:

- Enrolling all Colorado children currently eligible for coverage through Medicaid and CHP+ in those programs; and
- Expanding and simplifying coverage for children in families that currently earn too much to qualify for public programs but can't afford the high cost of private health insurance.
- Creating routes to affordable, quality coverage for children in families that purchase insurance privately.
