
ABSTRACT PROPOSAL FOR THE METRICS SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT

Snapshot of Colorado today—According to the most recent Federal Poverty Report, Colorado's current poverty rate is 41.9%. 11.49


- Poverty in Colorado has increased since 2001. The total poverty rate in Colorado increased from 9.6% in 2001 to 11.4% in 2008.
- Colorado's child poverty rate increased from 12.2% in 2001 to 15.1% in 2008, and the family poverty rate increased from 6.8% in 2001 to 7.8% in 2008.
- All of the above changes are statistically significant, and place Colorado 33nd among states in overall poverty and 32nd in child poverty.
- The metrics committee is creating a baseline model much like the following example to illustrate the scope of poverty in Colorado. This baseline is the foundation for the evaluation of the success of the task force over the next ten years.

The model on the second page illustrates the complexities of poverty as well as the mechanics of how we will achieve the objectives set forth in H.B. 1064. This model is reflective of the overall economic health of Colorado families and includes other measures such as a family's ability to become economically self-sufficient.
