SUMMARY

Colorado State University (CSU) is requesting cash and federal funds spending authority to purchase two conservation easements totaling 2,787 acres at Snow Mountain Ranch. Snow Mountain Ranch is a year-round conference and family center owned and operated by the YMCA of the Rockies that provides lodging, meeting space, dining, programming, and recreation for up to 2,500 people. The ranch occupies about 5,000 acres near Winter Park. Attachment A is a map of the proposed easements. The easements will protect back-country forest land from future subdivision and development.

According to the Colorado State Forest Service (CSFS), Snow Mountain Ranch was designated as the highest priority in Colorado for funding for FY 2008-09 under the federal Forest Legacy Program. The easements are contiguous and border the Arapahoe National Forest to the west and the south. Access to the national forest is through the proposed easements. According to various stakeholders, the purchase of the conservation easements will protect two watersheds, and winter range for elk, mule deer, black bear, moose, mountain lion, and the Canada lynx. Furthermore, CSU says that continued active forest management of the easements will promote forest health and reduce the risk of loss from fire, insects, and disease.

The CSFS is the lead state agency for the federal Forest Legacy Program. The CSU Board of Governors will hold legal title to the easements because the CSFS is part of the CSU system. The Colorado Commission on Higher Education is required to approve all property acquisitions by institutions that require federal funds pursuant to Section 23-1-106 (8), C.R.S.

The CSFS will have access to the property to ensure that the property owner manages the property in accordance with the forest stewardship plan. Operating costs for these monitoring activities are expected to range from \$1,193 in the first year to \$1,343 in the fifth year.

The project is a Senate Bill 92-202 project, meaning the property will be acquired, monitored, and maintained with non-state funds.

FUNDING SOURCE

The U.S. Forest Service has awarded grants totaling \$2.5 million for the Snow Mountain Ranch easements to the Colorado State Forest Service under the federal Forest Legacy Program. According to CSU, another \$2.5 million is anticipated to be awarded in FY 2009-10 under the federal Forest Legacy Program for the easements. These grants, along with a 25 percent match of \$1.0 million from Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO), as awarded to the Conservation Fund, will pay for the conservation easements. The property owners will also donate \$3.7 million in easement value. CSU anticipates completing the acquisition by June 2011.

STAFF QUESTIONS AND ISSUES

1. Will there be public access to the easements for hunting, fishing, and/or wildlife viewing?

No right of access by the general public to any portion of the Property is conveyed by the Easement. However, the conservation easement property is already accessible, physically and legally, from County Road 53 which traverses the entire Snow Mountain Ranch. Visitors do not have to be members or guests of the YMCA to access the Snow Mountain Ranch, and the conservation easement allows for continued accessibility to an extensive network of trails on Snow Mountain Ranch for hiking, world-class cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, horseback riding and biking. The public also crosses Snow Mountain Ranch on County Road 53 to access the adjacent national forest lands for hunting, camping and other recreational activities.

2. Does the property owner currently maintain any structures on the parcels?

Yes. A 220,000 gallon underground water storage tank and a small pump house nearby.

3. Will the YMCA of the Rockies be able to build additional structures if needed in the future at Snow Mountain Ranch?


Yes. YMCA of the Rockies may build "small recreational structures" such as small primitive camp sites and picnic shelters and "temporary/moveable structures" such as tent platforms and yurts. YMCA of the Rockies must construct or place these structures in a manner which does not adversely impact the conservation values of the property. No other structures, permanent or temporary, shall be constructed on the property conveyed in the Conservation Easement. Note that the substantial existing footprint of lodging and guest service structures is excluded from the area to be encumbered by the conservation easement, and it is the YMCA's intent to concentrate future development on the portion of the property that is excluded from the conservation easement.

4. How are these parcels used by the Snow Mountain Ranch guests and staff?

The Property will continue to be available for use by guests of Snow Mountain Ranch and the general public for passive recreational uses such as hiking, horseback riding, snow-shoeing, cross-country skiing, and picnicking. No motorized recreational activities are allowed. Existing roads may be used by guests for automobile touring and scenic/wildlife viewing. The YMCA of the Rockies is a flagship organization within the nation's 20 million-member YMCA movement. Snow Mountain Ranch's unique setting in the Rocky Mountains allows the YMCA to serve some 4,500 children and their families annually with their outdoor education programs.

5. How will operating and maintenance expenses be paid for future Colorado State Forest Service monitoring activities?

The easements will be monitored in conjunction with other CSFS forest administration activities. The USFS awards funds to CSFS for such purposes. The additional cost for the Forest Legacy Program monitoring will be minimal and there is very little risk to CSFS that it will be required to find other sources of funds to monitor the easements. Should that occur, CSFS is prepared to support the administrative costs through non-state funds. In addition, CSFS has established an endowment with the CSU Foundation for the purpose of providing a source of funds for monitoring easements.

Please accept this letter of support for your agency's efforts, working with the YMCA of the Rockies and The Conservation Fund, to conserve 2.800 acres of forested back-country on the Snow Mountain Ranch through the Forest Legacy Program. This is an opportunity to protect one of Colorado's most notable properties in an area that is threatened by rapid development.

The Forest Legacy program is crucial to enabling private landowners, such as the YMCA of the Rockies, to actively respond to the challenges brought on by the Mountain Pine Beatle epidemic. Throughout decades of ownership, the YMCA has practiced responsible and collaborative forest management on the Snow Mountain Ranch. More recently, they have modeled "best practices" for managing Colorado's beetle-damaged forests and establishing the next generation of healthy forest:

The proposed perpetual Forest Legacy conservation easement on Snow Mountain Ranch will establish a 2,890acre buffer along 8 miles and thousands of acres of the Arapahos National Forest. Preventing residential development along this lorest boundary is a major step toward mitigating the threat and cost of widdings in this stee, and toward promoting sound forest management on a landscape scale. The easement will also protect the upper watershed of Pole Creek, which provides senior water rights for the Town of Grantly, and supplies water for the YMCA's own facilities on Snow Mountain Ranch.

Snow Mountain Ranch provides wildlife movement corridors, and winter range and wildlife resting areas for elk and mule deer, black bear, moose, and mountain iton, as well as habitat for the Canada lynx, a species of State and federal concern. The exsement allows for continued accessibility to over 50 miles of existing trails on Snow Mountain Ranch for hiking, cross-country skiing, snow shooting, horseback ading and biking, and enhances the YMCA's ability to continue its valuable outdoor educational programs for youth.

We understand that you will be working with the Colorado State Forest Service, the United States Forest Service, the National Forest Legacy Program, and Great Outdoors Colorado, as well as involving our local land trust, the Middle Park Land Trust, on this project.

The YMCA of the Rockies is fortunate to have pristine property with an abundance of natural resources, including forest, wildlife habitat and wetlands. Having a large population of this property (2,750-3,000 acres) protected through a conservation easement would benefit the citizens of Grand County. This easement would restrict development on the property, much of which borders the National Forest, while allowing the continued recreational and educational use of the land

The purpose of this letter is to express the support of the Middle Park Land Trust for the YMCA of the Rockies to place a substantial portion of their Snow Mountain Ranch property under conservation easement with The Conservation Fund. The mission of the Middle Park Land Trust is to preserve Grand County's scenery, agriculture, water, wildlife, and biodiversity for today and the future, and the completion of this project would support many of these core values.

The YMCA's Snow Mountain Ranch property possesses scenery, water, wildlife and biodiversity values that are important to the character and ecological health of Grand County. Because this property borders large tracts of National Forest as well as areas of private property and U5 Highway 40 frontage, it is highly visible to citizens and visitors of Grand County. In addition, Snow Mountain Ranch provides habitat for a range of wildlife species and other forms of biodiversity. Its size and location next to public open space provide continuity of habitat for these species. Another key ecological feature that exists on the Snow Mountain property is the Pole Creek Valley Wetlands.

Therefore, the Middle Park Land Trust recommends that The Conservation Fund works to preserve significant portions of the Snow Mountain Ranch property because it is such an ecologically and aesthetically valuable place. A conservation easement would ensure that the land continues to be used in a sustainable manner, and would safeguard views for National Forest users, adjacent property owners, passers-by on the highway corridor, as well as members of the YMCA who are wisiling the property itself. Undisturbed views are important to the unique character of Grand County, and this project would help ensure that this legacy stays alive. The Middle Park Land Trust also recognizes the ecological importance of wetlands and large tracts of open space to the overall health of our local ecosystem, and we see the preservation of a portion of the Pole Creek watershed and other parts of Snow Mountain Ranch as an important step in preserving this health.
