Speaker Terrance D. Carroll addressed the members of the House of 2 Representatives. "I, too, sing America." 6 When the Harlem Renaissance author Langston Hughes penned those words in

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In Colorado, myths about fast fortunes made from silver and gold yielded to firmer economic opportunities – opportunities grounded in Colorado's northern oil fields and southern steel mills. In Colorado's fertile wheat fields out east and mineral deposits out west.

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14 Colorado's once-desolate high plains became a critical part of America's breadbasket. The Rocky Mountains – once barely traversable – became the nation's backbone, and with the completion of Moffat Tunnel, a vital part of the state's economy.

19 Yet this state and this nation's exuberance was obscured by harsher realities. 20 America's horizon, in fact, was littered with unseen challenges.

Langston Hughes recognized that challenges awaited – that we were a long way from realizing liberty's full potential. And yet, he saw promise peeking out:

"Tomorrow, I'll be at the table, for I, too, am America."

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Well, tomorrow has become today, and while this nation remains imperfect, the 20<sup>th</sup> Century, and the first decade of the 21<sup>st</sup>, produced undeniable achievements.

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In retrospect, the signposts toward progress appear clearly marked. But it's a mistake to read history as an inevitable march forward. For each signpost precedes a bend in the road. And each bend foretells an immense challenge requiring difficult choices, clear leadership, and the will to act.

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> It's only ten years into this century, and America is already shuddering under the weight of an immense burden.

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Two wars, two recessions – one nearly resulting in economic collapse – disasters both natural and man-made. If anything, history's long march, which rarely presents time to exhale, is speeding up.

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Today, though better than yesterday, again presents this nation and this state with new challenges.

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Challenges that require critical choices, clear leadership, and the will to act.

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The choices we make today – both within this room and without – matter **to Colorado's families.** They matter because tomorrow is not yet written.

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But when tomorrow is written, history's burden will be on us to show that in this building, in this room, in this year, we are standing up for Colorado's families. We are fighting for small businesses and we are working hard to create new jobs. We are steering the state toward recovery.

Developing a sustainable market for clean, traditional sources of energy, like natural gas for use in Colorado will create jobs, drive down energy costs, and 53 help break the vicious boom-and-bust cycles that hurt our local communities. 54

55 That need for **balance** extends well beyond our energy sector. It means 56 fostering an economy we can all participate in. That ambition drives us to create more job opportunities for doctors and nurses that want to deliver critical primary care to our rural and vulnerable populations.

It pushes us to develop our burgeoning creative class by supporting industries like film and media, art and design. And it compels us to develop a workforce suited to our dynamic economy.

Unfortunately, the high cost of higher education and barriers to job training and re-training often make it hard for Coloradans to jumpstart or advance their careers.

That's why we're pushing legislation to help Coloradans develop skills to succeed and ease the way toward good, stable jobs. We're expanding opportunity for Colorado adults who have been laid off or want to change industries to upgrade their skill-sets through job training; we're making it easier for Colorado's students to transition from two-year to four-year colleges; and we're training our job force today for the high-tech, high-paying green-collar jobs of tomorrow.

A strong economy begins in the classroom. And while our education system will be challenged this year, we remain committed to our kids.

We are aggressively positioning our schools for Race to the Top, and moving away from CSAP toward a better, more comprehensive form of assessment.

This downturn has focused our energy on job creation and economic recovery. On building a stronger Colorado with a more diversified and flexible economy.

In that same spirit, the recent downturn has also demonstrated that building a stronger Colorado will require a smarter government.

We've always had a small government. And in the past year we've made it even smaller. During the downturn we've already cut over a billion dollars from government spending, creating a leaner government with a balanced budget.

I've learned in my time here that sometimes there are no perfect options. This year, we have two imperfect choices: We can increase the burden on citizens to pay for our existing level of programs, bureaucracy, and services, **OR** we can make deep budget cuts and live within our means.

My vote, as I'm sure you could have guessed, will be for living within our means.

The bottom line is that the money the state spends is taxpayer money. Those taxpayers are the same people sitting around their kitchen tables at home trying to figure out how to make ends meet for their families.

#### **Family Budgeting**

Those families don't have the first option I mentioned, they have to live within their budgets. It's true that they can often count on the generosity of others, but at the end of the day it comes down to the money coming in and the money going out to pay the bills each month.

Colorado is required to balance its budget. But the state also has a few more tricks up its sleeve that it can use when times get tough. But just because we have those tricks, it doesn't mean we should use them. You don't increase taxes during a recession. You don't delay your obligations and leave others in a bind, such as doctors who treat the state's most needy patients. You don't undertake substantive prison sentence reform solely for the purpose of balancing the budget. You don't hurt the very businesses and consumers who can make the most difference in our economic recovery. At least, you don't do these things without breaking a promise to Colorado.

Families around the state are budgeting and making tough decisions.

Many have lost income in the past year because of layoffs, furloughs, or fewer hours at work. Yet, they still have to pay the mortgage, buy food for their kids, put gas in their cars, heat their home, buy school supplies and pay their health care bills.

While those families are paying their own bills, they are also sending money to the state to pay for public safety, a transportation system, public education, and a safety net for the needy. Because people are making less, state tax revenue has also fallen. Taxpayer dollars were taken for granted in good times, and programs and services were expanded. Now, it is up us to choose what can and can't be funded with those limited dollars. It's a big responsibility, but that is our duty.

The state's budget is directly tied to its economic prosperity, just as the budget of Colorado families is directly tied to their prosperity.

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# A balanced approach

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The Republican approach to the challenges this year will be guided by three goals:

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First, we will support policies that encourage economic recovery and a strong job market. Clearly, jobs and the economy have to remain our key focus this year. Once our economy improves and our job market begins to expand again, conversations around the kitchen table will improve, and so will the state budget. The quickest way to economic recovery is through strong business policies and keeping the tax and fee burden low for families.

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Our second goal is to balance the budget in a responsible way. We cannot with a clear conscience allow tough budget times to bean excuse for weakening the Taxpayers' Bill of Rights and permanently lengthening the reach of government. We must seriously consider the economic harm that will come from increasing taxes on businesses and consumers, without even a vote of the people. Also, we cannot close our eyes to the fact that one-time stimulus money brings only short-term solutions and comes with expensive strings from the federal government.

Our third goal is to avoid the mistakes of the past. It would be foolish to ignore the lessons we have learned from past mistakes. In my first year in the legislature, we made some good decisions, but I can think of quite a few that weren't. But some of greatest lessons can come from mistakes made in just the past few years.

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We would be better off if we had not spent every dime on the brink of this recession, when I stood in this very spot and said we should not write a check the next general assembly could not cash.

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We would be better off if new government positions had not been added to the payroll, only to be followed by multiple-day furloughs for an expanded workforce.

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We would be better off if we had welcomed the jobs and investment that oil and gas development was bringing to Colorado, instead of adding to their economic woes and helping drive those jobs and dollars away.

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We would be better off if problems from the past two years had not been delayed, compounded, and pushed into this year.

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We cannot continue to use payday-loan-like policies to balance our budget. We should do what needs to be done this year, so that next year, we actually are better off.

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There are those who criticize my party when we say "no" to expensive programs and bureaucracy. But just six months ago I read a quote from the governor that perhaps says it best: "Sometimes leadership means having to say 56 no."

How much better off would the state be now if we had just said no to more spending, more programs, more bureaucracy, more taxes and more fees? 3 We cannot change what has already been done, but we can start showing real leadership now. We have an obligation to responsibly address our economy, our budget and our job market this year. 6 8 **Bipartisanship** 9 10 No one wants to see the pain caused by deep budget cuts. But we will be better 11 off in the future if we live within our means. 12 13 I realize that I am standing here today saying this as the leader of the minority 14 party in Colorado. I know that there are those in the majority party who would 15 rather ignore this perspective and dismiss Republican comments, criticisms and 16 alternatives as nothing more than politics. 17 18 What is more difficult is to work with those who disagree with you to find compromise and more balanced policies. I am not saying that I am always right 19 20 - my wife can attest to that - but I am putting in a plug for the fine folks on this 21 side of the aisle. We can bring a valuable perspective to important discussions this year. This year's challenges will take all hands on deck. 23 24 Conclusion 25 Now, I realize that right now I am the only thing standing between you and 27 lunch, so I thought I should at least warn you I'm only half-way through my 28 speech. 29 Actually, I only want to emphasize one important point before I let everyone go: 30 We have challenges ahead, but they are nothing compared to what some 32 families and businesses have experienced during this historic recession. We cannot ever lose sight of the fact that every decision we make has a real-world 34 impact.
