An identifying decal shall expire EXPIRES when the 26 registration of the special mobile machinery to which it is affixed expires pursuant to UNDER section 42-3-114. THE AUTHORIZED AGENT SHALL NOT 27 28 ISSUE an identifying decal shall not be issued to special mobile machinery 29 unless the machinery is registered, but a decal may be issued concurrently 30 with the registration and shall expire EXPIRES pursuant to section 42-3-114.
