More Coloradans earn national teaching distinction

Colorado has about 650 teachers who hold National Board Certification and have earned the distinction of "NBCTs."

This winter, 93 more Colorado teachers achieved their certification. They joined the nation's 97,291 NBCTs, 6,200 of whom earned certification this year.

These accomplished teachers comprise three percent of the entire teaching force in the U.S. More than half of them teach in high-need schools, and 15 percent are certified in areas related to science, math, technology, and engineering.

National Board Certification is not an easy thing to do, but those who earn certification consider it well worth the time and money they invested. Licensed teachers or school counselors with at least three years experience are eligible to become NBCTs. You may want to join with other educators to embark on the steps to certification and talk to NBCTs in your school or district who may be willing to help you understand the process and serve as mentors.

If you are not certain about pursuing national certification, consider starting with Take One, a standards-based approach to improving one's teaching practice. Teachers prepare and submit one video portfolio entry and may count it later toward full certification. Find out more at nbpts.org.
