On motion of Senator Gordon, and with the unanimous consent of those elected to the Senate, the Senate stood in recess to hear the opening day remarks of Senate President Joan Fitz-Gerald and Minority Leader Mark Hillman. The text of their remarks follows.

Senate in recess.

Senator Fitz-Gerald's remarks:

My fellow Senators, guests, staff, friends and family. Welcome to the 65th General Assembly. I would especially like to welcome United States Senator Ken Salazar, his brother U.S. Representative John Salazar, Representative Diana DeGette and my congressman Representative Mark Udall. A very special welcome to the father of our new Senate President Pro-Tem, Senator Regis Groff. It is with great pride that I stand with all of you to open this session.

Indulge me for a moment in a little Colorado history...

In 1876, Colorado entered statehood and within 17 years women's suffrage was passed by referendum. The very next year Colorado saw fit to elect three women to the state legislature—the very first in U.S. history.

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This is another historic day for Colorado. I humbly stand before you as the first woman president of this body in its 129 year history and the only sitting female Senate President in the United States today—here only because of the courageous acts of those women who have gone before me, the settlers who shared the burden of building homes and schools and communities in the west and the suffragettes who were imprisoned and tortured before they gained full citizenship—the right to vote.

I want to congratulate as well, our Senate President Pro-tem, Peter Groff, who is the highest ranking African-American to serve in the Colorado State Senate and the first African American President Pro-Tem of this body.

But for all the history of this day, one word summarizes what is actually before us: opportunity. We in this body share an opportunity to shape the future of this great and majestic state. This is a privilege and an honor.

My personal experiences of the past months have made me realize how little time we have on this earth and particularly here at the statehouse. 120 days—less than 1,000 hours to create a better Colorado. It is a daunting responsibility, but a great opportunity first and foremost.

You will see on your desks a gift from me to you by the photographer, John Fielder—the book Mountain Ranges of Colorado--that is the very best of our great state. It reminds us all of what is so special about the districts we represent. I hope you enjoy this gift and are as overtaken as I am by the God-given beauty, from plains to snow capped peaks, that is Colorado.

In Routt County there is a quiet and imposing mountain called Sleeping Giant that makes me think of where the state is today. Like the wildflowers that will bloom on Sleeping Giant in the summer, our potential lies dormant.

Ladies and gentleman, we have an opportunity to unleash our tremendous potential and to be a better state than we are.

I see an opportunity to provide

A paycheck for every family, A textbook for every child, and A doctor for every patient.

This is our vision for a better Colorado.

The only way to awaken our economic vitality is to allow us to rebound from a devastating recession. We have been meeting with leaders from around the state and have heard that they expect us to fix the state budget problems now, so that once again, Colorado has an attractive climate for job creation and prosperity.

We will bring a sense of urgency to the state's economic problems because we know that education, health care and transportation systems are essential for the Colorado of the future.

This state has added 300,000 residents since 2000 and lost 150,000 jobs during the same time period. Business leaders know the sleeping giant will continue sleeping under the present constraints. Other states will not be so foolish.

For all its physical beauty, the private sector cannot entice business to a state that cannot get its fiscal house in order.

Last week we unveiled an agenda for economic revitalization. It includes a focus on economic development and encouraging projects like developing a deep underground research facility and investments in technology. It also includes keeping tourism healthy and strong.

Part of our mission must be to protect people's pensions and retirement savings through aggressive pursuit of securities fraud.

We know that we must bridge the transportation funding gap. The safety of our citizens demands it. Goods, services and people use our rural roads, state highways and interstates. These veins of commerce must be maintained, plowed and patrolled so that Colorado stays competitive with 49 other states.

All of this makes our sense of urgency all the more essential. With only 120 days, solving the budget gap is our number one priority, because without that, nothing else really

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matters. We will work to see a bipartisan package move through the legislature as soon as possible. Whatever that package looks like, we will keep limits on government spending and any tax increases must be approved by voters. Second, healthcare is going to be a major component of our agenda. Though the state's role is limited and finite, we have a vision to make healthcare more accessible and affordable for everyone. Our plan includes expanding preferred drug lists and drug purchasing pools and making it easier for small businesses to get insurance for employees. Lastly, we need to invest in education. At all levels, from preschool through college, we have a sacred trust with the next generation to exceed the opportunities given to each one of us by the generation that went before. It is selfish and inexcusable to do any less when the challenges of technology and a global workforce put our children and college students into worldwide competition. A gentleman I know, who was in the Peace Corps, brought someone over he had met while stationed in Africa. He brought this young man to Boston and showed him the great 17 buildings of Harvard and MIT. The young man had never left his small African village and had never seen a plane much less ridden on one. My friend was anxious to know his reaction to all the wonders of a big 20 American city. "What do you think?" he asked this young man. The young man replied, "Your ancestors have been very busy." Our ancestors in this nation and in this state have given us much. The legacy cannot end here. But you know, Colorado stills lags behind 39 other states in per pupil funding. Education and a prosperous economy are inextricably linked. Besides the budget, healthcare and education, there are many other issues facing us this session such as, water, rising heating bills for our citizens, childhood immunizations, the environment and homeland security. We must be aware that the safety and security of our citizens is in our hands. Are our first responders adequately equipped? Have we enough regional partnerships in place to move forward if something should happen here? Are we ready and are we prepared? We all bring heartfelt values to this chamber. Judge our moral character and values by whether we are fair in the process, respect our peers, and are good stewards of this state. We would do well to follow the advice of Colorado Senator Henry W. Toll when he remarked in April of 1936: "As we gather together from every point of the compass, we have an opportunity to inspire others—and at the same time to inspire ourselves—with devotion to a just and honest democratic government... That is my charge to all of you, especially our newest members. I want to welcome Bob Bacon, Shawn Mitchell, Brandon Shaffer, Nancy Spence, Lois Tochtrop, Tom Weins and Suzanne Williams to our distinguished body. I wish for you that your days in this chamber 45 be happy and productive. I also want to recognize the three men in my life. I wouldn't be standing here if it wasn't for my valued family who has supported me every step of the way and made the sacrifices that all of our families have had to endure living with an elected official. I would like to recognize my husband of 32 years, John, and my sons Matthew and Patrick, who are products of CU and DU Law School.

We have an incredible opportunity to be a better state than we are. Indeed, it is a new day in Colorado, because we are a sleeping giant that is stirring and is about to wake up.

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Senator Fitz-Gerald recognized Minority Leader Senator Mark Hillman to address the Senate.

Senator Hillman's remarks:

I have occasionally observed that the Legislature's job is a bit like that of a referee -- we weren't elected to determine the outcome of life for our fellow Coloradans, but to make sure everything runs smoothly and otherwise stay out of the way.

Fans don't applaud referees for making the right call; they expect that. But when the referee goofs -- or makes an unpopular decision, even if it's right -- the fans speak out.

Likewise, citizens rarely call their legislators to say "atta boy!" Instead, they expect us to make government operate smoothly and efficiently. When government gets in the way, the citizens let us know about it.

For the next 120 days we must remember that our primary responsibility is to blow the whistle when government gets in the way:

• The foremost issue facing us is clearly our state budget. Every budget has two sides -revenue from taxpayers and spending by government. Working with Governor Owens, we have made tough, sometimes unpopular choices to balance the budget in the past two years, but so have many Colorado families.

Most of our budget is now on "auto pilot" -- dictated by constitutional amendments or by federal mandates.

Although many around this building have complained about the Taxpayers Bill of Rights, the fact is that budget cuts have thus far been driven by a sluggish economy and inflexible spending mandates - not by TABOR.

But beginning this year, the state will, for the first time, be forced into the incredible posture of making budget "cuts" in certain areas while refunding TABOR surplus at the same time.

Over the next two years, current law requires that spending increase by \$696 million, but current law allows spending to increase by just \$274 million.

Ask 100 legislators what to about the budget and you get 100 different answers. However, each of us has a responsibility to offer a constructive solution.

If your solution is to leave in place spending mandates like Amendment 23, then it is incumbent upon you to explain to your fellow legislators why the budget must be balanced 46 entirely on the backs of taxpayers.

If your solution is to refund every dollar over today's TABOR limit, then you should accept the responsibility of explaining precisely how to balance the budget entirely with spending cuts.

Many of us, I believe, are looking for a solution somewhere in the middle.

All of us have a responsibility to the people who elected us to be honest and candid about the choices we face -- not to pretend that our favorite constitutional amendments are perfect.

In passing TABOR, voters told us, "Always limit spending." In Amendment 23 they said, "Always *increase* spending." Rather than frustrate the voters by taking shortcuts around either, we now ought to ask what to do when we can't do both.

Remembering that this is the taxpayers' money, we must provide choices -- not just to spend more -- but also to spend less.

• Jobs. Simplistic rhetoric about complex issues like outsourcing and offshoring actually creates more questions than it answers. For example, what about "insourcing" -- the jobs created in Colorado by out-of-state or out-of-country employers? Do we really expect that 68 we can launch our own little "trade war in a teapot" without incurring the wrath of the very people who create jobs in Colorado and around the world?

But this diverts attention from the biggest hindrance to job creation in our state -- business personal property tax. This ill-conceived penalty on production discourages employers from staying or expanding in Colorado, much less moving here.

Although some local governments have grown to depend on BPPT revenue, preserving the tax solely on that account begs the question: "Do taxpayers exist to serve government or does government exist to serve taxpayers?"

• Reining in lawsuit abuse was a quiet success in the past two years. We've made Colorado a state where employers can do business without risking outrageous, unexpected litigation costs.

Excessive litigation imposes a hidden tax on the economy. While it's often assumed that lawsuits target only big corporations with deep pockets, the truth is that lawsuits cost small businesses an average of \$150,000 each year.

That's money that could go toward creating jobs, buying health insurance or improving working conditions.

Lawsuits should insure that people injured through no fault of their own are justly compensated. But, lawsuits should be a matter of last resort.

• Health care. Two years ago, we re-introduced competition into the health care market. That market is beginning to stabilize as those reforms take effect, but further improvements are needed.

Re-invigorating the small group market adds to Colorado's attractive business climate --plus it eases pressure on the state budget by helping citizens remain self- sufficient.

• Education. Job creation depends on an effective education system -- one that doesn't deny choice and opportunity to poor students in struggling schools.

With their futures hanging in the balance, these students don't have time to wait for their school to improve. They need public and private choices in education, and they need them today.

• Water. Job creation is futile without adequate water, and a few snowstorms -- or even one wet season -- won't cure a five-year drought. It's true that agriculture accounts for some 80 percent of the water used in Colorado, but it's also true that 100 percent of Coloradans eat. (They eat products grown by Colorado farmers and ranchers.)

As a farmer, I know how precious water is and how we quickly become desperate without it -- not just agriculture, but our cities and favorite getaways, as well.

As we argue about how to -- or whether to -- increase storage or improve conservation, farms along the South Platte and the Arkansas are drying up. Main street businesses and rural schools are suffering, too. But casinos in Las Vegas, golf courses in Phoenix, and lawns in Los Angeles are benefitting from our inaction.

Now that the long-awaited Statewide Water Supply Initiative study is complete, it is time for people of all political stripes and for responsible leaders from all areas of the state to stop the strategy of divide-and-conquer which has, for so long, made inaction the path of least resistance.

It is time for all of us to come together to formulate a strategy which puts <u>all</u> of Colorado first. A strategy which meets the needs of our cities, our tourism and recreational industries, and, certainly not least, our family farmers and ranchers who put food on our table.

As we have worked together in the past to meet the needs of our great state, we as Republicans extend our hand in cooperation again today. We will compromise when we can, but we will stand our ground when we must.

Thomas Jefferson reminded us that "the God who gave us life gave us liberty." The Founders of the Centennial State acknowledged that providence our motto, "*Nil Sine Numine*," which translates "Nothing without the Diety."

No matter what your particular concept of our Creator may be, we need only step onto the west steps of this Capitol to realize that just as our mountains, rivers and plains did not appear by chance, all of us, as well as our families, friends and neighbors, are here for a purpose.

Each day, let us in this building be humbled as we work together in service to our Creator through service to His Creation.
