Colorado Religious Freedom Amendment

BALLOT TITLE:

AN AMENDMENT TO THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION EXPRESSING THE PUBLIC POLICY OF THE STATE OF COLORADO THAT GOVERNMENT MAY NOT BURDEN A PERSON'S OR RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATION'S FREEDOM OF RELIGION

TEXT:

Section 1: Article II of the Colorado constitution is amended BY THE ADDITION OF A NEW SECTION to read:

Section 32. A Person's or Religious Organization's Freedom of Religion

- (1) The right to act or refuse to act in a manner motivated by a sincerely held religious belief may not be burdened unless the government proves it has a compelling governmental interest in infringing the specific act or refusal to act and has used the least restrictive means to further that interest.
- (2) A burden includes indirect burdens such a as withholding of one or more benefits, assessing one or more penalties, exclusion from one of more government programs, and/or exclusion from one or more government facility.
- (3) This section shall take effect upon proclamation of the vote by the governor.

Colorado Religious Freedom Amendment

Government may not burden a person's or religious organization's Freedom of Religion. The right to act or refuse to act in a manner motivated by a sincerely held religious belief may not be burdened unless the government proves it has a compelling governmental interest in infringing the specific act or refusal to act and has used the least restrictive means to further that interest. A burden includes indirect burdens such as withholding one or more benefits, assessing or more penalties, an exclusion from one or more government programs and/or exclusion from one or more government facility.
