Summary of Legislation

This bill narrows the scope of the Colorado Regional Tourism Act to exclude the use of tax increment financing for gambling-related projects.

Background. The Colorado Regional Tourism Act was established under SB 09-173. It allows local governments in Colorado to pursue up to 2 tourism-related capital improvement projects using up to \$50 million in state sales tax increment financing. Tax increment financing allows for the cost of public improvements in a region to be repaid from increased taxes generated by new or expanded business activity in the region.

State Revenue

This bill will not affect the overall amount of state sales tax revenue that is allocated for tax increment financing under the regional tourism act, nor will it affect the administrative costs of that act. However, narrowing the scope of regional tourism projects that can be paid for with state sales tax increment financing could result in the selection of lesser projects. This, in turn, could affect future state revenue, although the actual impact is unknown.

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Local Government Impact

Narrowing the scope of projects that can be funded through the regional tourism act may affect the impact of those projects on local government revenue.
