Summary of Amendments Made to the Bill After the 02/25/10 Legislative Council Staff Conditional Revised Fiscal Note Was Prepared (Amended by the Senate State, Veterans & Military Affairs Committee 03/01/10)

The Senate State, Veterans & Military Committee Report:

- Clarifies that the notice of proposal consideration by an agency must be made by any reasonable method, including but not limited to agency website or newspapers;
- Makes technical clarifications concerning who is notified and in what form the proposal must be submitted;
- Clarifies that only criteria from Section 24-38-203, C.R.S., shall be used for making the determination that a comparable proposal is more advantageous to the State than an unsolicited proposal;
- Requires the Agency's Procurement Officer to be responsible for the negotiation of an agreement if the Agency accepts an unsolicited proposal, not the Department of Personnel and Administration, Division of Finance and Procurement; and,
- Exempts a contract awarded as part of a public-private initiative from the competitive sealed bidding process.

Legislative Council Staff and JBC Staff are in agreement the Senate State, Veterans & Military Affairs Committee Report does not change the conditional fiscal impact of this bill.
