CONCERNING JUVENILES WHO ARE TRIED AS ADULTS, AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

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Summary of Amendments Made to the Bill After the 05/04/10 Legislative Council Staff Revised Fiscal Note Was Prepared (Amended by the Judiciary Committee 05/05/10)

The Judiciary Committee Report clarified language related to district court jurisdiction over a juvenile age fourteen of fifteen who has allegedly committed a felony and has previously been subject to proceedings in a district court as a result of a direct filing or transfer.

The amendment does not change the bill's fiscal impact. Legislative Council Staff concurs with this analysis.

Amendments/Appropriation Status

The bill includes an appropriation clause that provides, for FY 2010-11: (1) \$371,880 General Fund to the Department of Human Services, Division of Youth Corrections; and (2) \$135,678 General Fund to the Department of Corrections, Youthful Offender System. These increases are partially offset by a \$266,803 reduction in the General Fund appropriation to the Department of Corrections for the External Capacity Subprogram. The net impact of these adjustments is an increase of \$240,755 in General Fund appropriations for FY 2010-11.

The bill specifies that H.B. 10-1413 will only take effect if H.B. 10-1360 is enacted and provides for a General Fund appropriations decrease for FY 2010-11 that is greater than or equal to the net General Fund increase in H.B. 10-1413. House Bill 10-1360 (Pace/Steadman) modifies parole-related statutes to reduce the number of parolees who return to the Department of Corrections. House Bill 10-1360, as reengrossed, generates General Fund savings of \$240,755 in FY 2010-11.
