Summary of Legislation

Senate Bill 11-093 implements the recommendations of the Department of Regulatory Affairs in its 2010 sunset review of the Interagency Task Force on Drunk Driving (ITFDD). The bill continues the functions of the ITFDD effective upon the bill's enactment. The bill removes the repeal of the ITFDD and increases its membership by 4 members. Specifically, the bill requires that the following new members be appointed:

- 2 members appointed by the Department of Revenue (DOR) executive director (in lieu of current requirements for 1 member) — 1 with expertise in driver's licensing and 1 with expertise in state liquor law sales and enforcement;
- 1 member representing a statewide organization that represents persons that sell alcoholic beverages; and
- 1 member representing of a statewide organization that represents alcohol and drug addiction counselors; and
- the Department of Public Health and Environment (DPHE) executive director, or his or her designee.

Background

The ITFDD was established by the General Assembly to increase collaboration for solutions to driving while impaired or under the influence of alcohol. ITFDD members include a combination of state government officials and persons representing various interested organizations and stakeholder groups. ITFDD meetings are held monthly and are open to the public.

State Expenditures

The bill increases DOR and DPHE staff workload and continues staff time devoted by other state departments with personnel on the ITFDD. Staff time expended on the ITFDD is anticipated to be minimal and absorbable within existing resources. Furthermore, the ITFDD has no appropriation from the General Assembly; therefore, continuing its operation has no impact on state expenditures.
