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A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING CREATION OF A COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER FUNDING FOR 102 THE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN THE STATE.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill creates the higher education funding committee (committee) to review and make recommendations concerning funding for the statewide system of higher education. The committee will consist of legislative members; ex officio members from higher education and the elementary and secondary education system; appointed representatives

from the state and private institutions of higher education, including the junior colleges and area vocational schools; and appointed representatives from the business community. The president of the senate and the speaker of the house of representatives will jointly appoint all of the appointed members.

The committee will specifically consider funding sources and mechanisms for the state system of higher education and financial incentives and other strategies for increasing retention and completion rates and decreasing the time to completion. In considering these issues, the committee will take into account existing statutes concerning performance-based funding, maintaining enterprise status for the state institutions of higher education, and the recommendations of the higher education strategic planning steering committee.

The committee will meet at least once in each of the 4 quadrants of the state. The committee will submit its report and legislative recommendations to the legislative council. The legislative council staff, the office of legislative legal services, and the department of higher education will provide staff support to the committee.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

7	AND IN FUELING THE STATE'S ECONOMY;
8	(c) IN ITS FINAL REPORT, THE STEERING COMMITTEE FOUND THE
9	CONDITION OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN COLORADO "ALARMING AND
10	DETERIORATING", DUE IN GREAT PART TO THE DECLINE IN THE STATE'S
11	FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE STATE INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION,
12	THE RESULTING COST-BURDEN SHIFT TO STUDENTS AND THEIR FAMILIES,
13	AND A SUBSEQUENT DECREASE IN STUDENTS' ABILITY TO AFFORD HIGHER
14	EDUCATION AND INCREASE IN THE ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT GAP BETWEEN
15	MAJORITY AND MINORITY SEGMENTS OF SOCIETY. AS STATED BY THE

18	(d) The steering committee also found that, of one

21	A POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTION; AND TWENTY-TWO OF THE ORIGINAL ONE
22	HUNDRED WILL ACTUALLY GRADUATE FROM COLLEGE WITH A CERTIFICATE
23	OR DEGREE WITHIN SIX YEARS AFTER ENTERING;
24	(e) ALTHOUGH TOTAL APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE STATE SYSTEM OF
25	HIGHER EDUCATION HAVE INCREASED SINCE FISCAL YEAR 2007-08, THIS
26	HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED ONLY BY INCREASING THE AMOUNT OF TUITION
27	AND FEES CHARGED TO STUDENTS AND USING ONE-TIME FEDERAL

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1 STIMULUS FUNDS TO SUBSTITUTE FOR STATE GENERAL FUND 2 APPROPRIATIONS:

(f) From fiscal year 2007-08 to fiscal year 2010-11, the General fund appropriation for the institutions of higher education in the state decreased by eighty-eight million seven hundred eighty-two thousand four hundred forty dollars or thirteen and two-tenths percent. The cash fund appropriation, representing tuition and fees, increased during this period by four hundred eighty-eight million eight hundred fifty thousand four hundred sixty-nine dollars or forty-three and nine-tenths percent. The amount of federal funds appropriated for the state institutions of higher education during this period increased by eighty-nine million four thousand thirty-five dollars or four hundred thirty-four and six-tenths percent.

(g) The budget request for fiscal year 2011-12 continues the trend of shifting the burden from general fund appropriations to tuition and fees. The department of higher education has proposed decreasing the general fund appropriation for the institutions of higher education by thirteen million five hundred thousand dollars or two and three-tenths percent. The department has also requested an increase in the cash fund appropriation of seventy-eight million five hundred thousand dollars or four and nine-tenths percent.

(h) IN ITS FINAL REPORT, THE STEERING COMMITTEE IDENTIFIED
THE TWO CRITICAL LEVERS FOR IMPROVING HIGHER EDUCATION IN THE
STATE AS INCREASING THE FUNDING LEVELS AND PLACING GREATER FOCUS
ON INCENTIVES AND OTHER STRATEGIES TO INCREASE THE COMPLETION
