## **Summary of Legislation**

This bill authorizes the Board of Parks and Outdoor Recreation in the Department of Natural Resources to promulgate rules to allow members of the armed forces wounded warriors programs free entrance to any state park or recreation area. Wounded warriors are individuals who have been severely injured in military operations undertaken since September 11, 2001, and require years of intense, ongoing care or assistance. Wounded warriors who are residents of, or are stationed in Colorado, would be eligible for free entrance. The bill also authorizes the board to promulgate rules to allow all veterans free entrance to any state park on 1 day each year of the board's choosing.

## State Revenue

This bill will result in a small reduction in revenue to the Parks and Outdoor Recreation Cash Fund. The board has already authorized veterans 1 free day of access to state parks by rule and disabled veterans are currently eligible for free access to state parks with a Colorado Disabled

Veterans license plate. These license plates are available to qualified disabled veterans at no cost. Therefore, this bill will only affect wounded warriors without a Colorado Disabled Veterans license plate. The increase in overall park visitation as a result of this bill is estimated to be minimal and will not likely result in a significant loss of revenue.
