# A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE "UNIFORM MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTERS
102 ACT".

#### **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. **Colorado Commission on Uniform State Laws.** The bill enacts the "Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act", drafted by the national conference of commissioners on uniform state laws. registering to vote and applying for ballots, administer the delivery and receipt of ballots, and administer the delivery of election notices.

19 REASON OF THE ACTIVE DUTY OR SERVICE OF THE COVERED VOTER.

(4) "FEDERAL POSTCARD APPLICATION" MEANS THE APPLICATION
PRESCRIBED UNDER SECTION 101 (b) (2) OF THE FEDERAL "UNIFORMED
AND OVERSEAS CITIZENS ABSENTEE VOTING ACT", 42 U.S.C. SEC. 1973ff
(b) (2).

(5) "FEDERAL WRITE-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT" MEANS THE BALLOT
DESCRIBED IN SECTION 103 OF THE FEDERAL "UNIFORMED AND OVERSEAS
CITIZENS ABSENTEE VOTING ACT", 42 U.S.C. SEC. 1973ff-2.

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(6) "OVERSEAS VOTER" MEANS A UNITED STATES CITIZEN WHO IS
 OUTSIDE THE UNITED STATES.

3 (7) "STATE" MEANS A STATE OF THE UNITED STATES, THE
4 DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, PUERTO RICO, THE UNITED STATES VIRGIN

 OTHER INFORMATION UNDER THIS ARTICLE.

(4) THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL:

11 (5) THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL PRESCRIBE THE FORM AND 12 CONTENT OF A DECLARATION FOR USE BY A COVERED VOTER TO SWEAR OR 13 AFFIRM SPECIFIC REPRESENTATIONS PERTAINING TO THE VOTER'S 14 IDENTITY, ELIGIBILITY TO VOTE, STATUS AS A COVERED VOTER, AND 15 TIMELY AND PROPER COMPLETION OF A BALLOT. THE DECLARATION 16 SHALL BE BASED ON THE DECLARATION PRESCRIBED TO ACCOMPANY A 17 FEDERAL WRITE-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT, AS MODIFIED TO BE CONSISTENT 18 WITH THIS ARTICLE. THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL ENSURE THAT A 19 FORM FOR THE EXECUTION OF THE DECLARATION, INCLUDING AN 20 INDICATION OF THE DATE OF EXECUTION OF THE DECLARATION, IS A 21 PROMINENT PART OF ALL BALLOTING MATERIALS FOR WHICH THE 22 DECLARATION IS REQUIRED.

1-8.3-105. [Formerly 1-8-103] Effect of "Uniformed and
Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act" - emergency authority of
secretary of state. (1) In the event of any conflict between this part 1
ARTICLE and any provisions of the federal "Uniformed and Overseas
Citizens Absentee Voting Act", 42 U.S.C. sec. 1973ff et seq., the

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provisions of the federal act shall control, and all designated election
officials who are charged with the performance of duties under this code
shall perform the duties and discharge the obligations placed upon them
by the federal act.

5 (2) If a national or local emergency arises which THAT makes 6 substantial compliance with the provisions of this part 1 ARTICLE 7 impossible or unreasonable, such as when congress has declared a 8 national emergency or the president has ordered into active military 9 service of the United States any units and members of the National Guard 10 of this state, the secretary of state may prescribe, by emergency orders or 11 rules, such special procedures or requirements as may be necessary to 12 facilitate absentee voting by those members of the military or military 13 support personnel directly affected by the emergency.

 FEDERAL WRITE-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT IF THE DECLARATION IS RECEIVED
 NO LATER THAN TWENTY-NINE DAYS BEFORE THE ELECTION. IF THE
 DECLARATION IS RECEIVED AFTER THAT DATE, IT SHALL BE TREATED AS AN
 APPLICATION TO REGISTER TO VOTE FOR SUBSEQUENT ELECTIONS.

17 THE VOTER'S JURISDICTION UNDER ARTICLE 8 OF THIS TITLE OR THE
18 FEDERAL POSTCARD APPLICATION OR THE APPLICATION'S ELECTRONIC
19 EQUIVALENT.

(2) A COVERED VOTER WHO IS NOT REGISTERED TO VOTE IN THIS
STATE MAY USE A FEDERAL POSTCARD APPLICATION OR THE APPLICATION'S
ELECTRONIC EQUIVALENT TO APPLY SIMULTANEOUSLY TO REGISTER TO
VOTE UNDER SECTION 1-8.3-107 AND FOR A BALLOT.

(3) THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL ENSURE THAT THE

IS CAPABLE OF ACCEPTING THE SUBMISSION OF BOTH A FEDERAL POSTCARD

1-8.3-109. Timeliness and scope of application for ballot. An
APPLICATION FOR A BALLOT IS TIMELY IF RECEIVED BY THE DESIGNATED
ELECTION OFFICIAL NO LATER THAN THE CLOSE OF BUSINESS ON THE
FRIDAY IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE ELECTION; EXCEPT THAT, IF THE
APPLICANT WISHES TO RECEIVE THE BALLOT BY MAIL, THE APPLICATION

SHALL BE RECEIVED NO LATER THAN THE CLOSE OF BUSINESS ON THE
 SEVENTH DAY BEFORE THE ELECTION. AN APPLICATION FOR A BALLOT
 FOR A PRIMARY ELECTION, WHETHER OR NOT TIMELY, IS EFFECTIVE AS AN
 APPLICATION FOR A BALLOT FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION.

5 **1-8.3-110.** Transmission of unvoted ballots. (1) FOR AN 6 ELECTION DESCRIBED IN SECTION 1-8.3-103 FOR WHICH THIS STATE HAS 7 NOT RECEIVED A WAIVER PURSUANT TO SECTION 579 OF THE FEDERAL 8 "MILITARY AND OVERSEAS VOTER EMPOWERMENT ACT", 42 U.S.C. 9 1973ff-1 (g) (2), NOT LATER THAN FORTY-FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE 10 ELECTION, THE ELECTION OFFICIAL IN EACH JURISDICTION CHARGED WITH 11 DISTRIBUTING A BALLOT AND BALLOTING MATERIALS SHALL TRANSMIT A 12 BALLOT AND BALLOTING MATERIALS TO ALL COVERED VOTERS WHO BY 13 THAT DATE SUBMIT A VALID BALLOT APPLICATION.

14 (2) A COVERED VOTER WHO REQUESTS THAT A BALLOT AND
15 BALLOTING MATERIALS BE SENT TO THE VOTER BY ELECTRONIC
16 TRANSMISSION MAY CHOOSE FACSIMILE TRANSMISSION OR ELECTRONIC
17 MAIL DELIVERY, OR, IF OFFERED BY THE VOTER'S JURISDICTION,

18 ELECTRONIC TRANSMISSION. THE ELECTION OFFICIAL IN EACH
19 JURISDICTION CHARGED WITH DISTRIBUTING A BALLOT AND BALLOTING

THE ADDRESS 20 MAY BE USED ONLY FOR OFFICIAL COMMUNICATION WITH THE VOTER 21 ABOUT THE VOTING PROCESS, INCLUDING TRANSMITTING BALLOTS AND 22 ELECTION MATERIALS IF THE VOTER HAS REQUESTED ELECTRONIC 23 TRANSMISSION, AND VERIFYING THE VOTER'S MAILING ADDRESS AND 24 PHYSICAL LOCATION. THE REQUEST FOR AN ELECTRONIC-MAIL ADDRESS 25 SHALL DESCRIBE THE PURPOSES FOR WHICH THE ELECTRONIC-MAIL 26 ADDRESS MAY BE USED AND INCLUDE A STATEMENT THAT ANY OTHER USE 27 OR DISCLOSURE OF THE ELECTRONIC-MAIL ADDRESS IS PROHIBITED.

AN ELECTION OFFICIAL SHALL PROVIDE A 9 MILITARY-OVERSEAS BALLOT TO A VOTER WHO MAKES A STANDING 10 REQUEST FOR EACH ELECTION TO WHICH THE REQUEST IS APPLICABLE. A 11 COVERED VOTER WHO IS ENTITLED TO RECEIVE A BALLOT FOR A 12 PRIMARY ELECTION UNDER THIS SUBSECTION (2) IS ENTITLED TO RECEIVE 13 A BALLOT FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION.

14 **1-8.3-116.** Publication of election notice. (1) AT LEAST ONE 15 HUNDRED DAYS BEFORE A REGULARLY SCHEDULED ELECTION AND AS 16 SOON AS PRACTICABLE BEFORE AN ELECTION NOT REGULARLY SCHEDULED, 17 THE SECRETARY OF STATE SHALL PREPARE AN ELECTION NOTICE TO BE 18 USED IN CONJUNCTION WITH A FEDERAL WRITE-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT. THE 19 ELECTION NOTICE SHALL CONTAIN A LIST OF ALL OF THE FEDERAL AND 20 STATE OFFICES THAT AS OF THAT DATE THE SECRETARY OF STATE EXPECTS 21 TO BE ON THE BALLOT ON THE DATE OF THE ELECTION. TO ITS SUBJECT MATTER AMONG STATES THAT ENACT IT.

Delivery of mail-in ballot and replacement mail-in 3 **ballots.** (1) (a) The mail-in ballot and other materials shall be delivered 4 or mailed to the elector within seventy-two hours after the receipt of the 5 application, if the official ballots are then printed, or, if not then printed, 6 within seventy-two hours after the printed ballots are delivered to the 7 designated election official, but no sooner than twenty-two days before 8 every odd-year, congressional vacancy, primary, and general election. If 9 the mail-in ballot and other materials are mailed, the envelope shall be 10 marked "DO NOT FORWARD" or by any other similar statement that is 11 in accordance with United States postal service regulations. Except as 12 otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection (1), Nothing in this 13 subsection (1) shall affect any provision of this code governing the 14 delivery of mail or mail-in ballots to an absent uniformed services elector, 15 nonresident overseas elector, or resident overseas elector covered by the 16 federal "Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act", 42 17 U.S.C. sec. 1973ff et seq.

(b) A mail-in ballot shall be delivered or mailed to an absent
uniformed services elector serving outside the United States not later than
thirty days before the election if the elector has applied for a mail-in
ballot or has been placed on the permanent mail-in voter list pursuant to
section 1-8-104.5 (2) not later than thirty-five days before such election.
SECTION 3. 1-8-113 (1) (a), Colorado Revised Statutes, is
amended to read:

1-8-113. Manner of mail-in voting - first-time voters casting
a mail-in ballot after having registered by mail to vote.
(1) (a) (1) Any eligible elector applying for and receiving a mail-in ballot,

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1 in casting the ballot, shall make and subscribe to the self-affirmation on 2 the return envelope. The elector shall then mark the ballot, fold the ballot 3 or insert the ballot card in the special envelope provided for the purpose 4 so as to conceal the marking, deposit it in the return envelope, enclose 5 identification if required by subsection (3) of this section, and seal the 6 envelope securely. The envelope may be delivered personally or mailed 7 by the elector to the designated election official issuing the ballot or 8 delivered personally by the elector to an early voters' polling place during 9 the time early voting is made available pursuant to section 1-8-202 or on 10 election day to any polling place in the county in which the elector is 11 registered to vote. Alternatively, an elector may deliver the ballot to any 12 person of the elector's own choice or to any duly authorized agent of the 13 designated election official for mailing or personal delivery to the 14 designated election official; except that no one person other than a duly 15 authorized agent of the designated election official may receive more than 16 ten mail-in ballots in any election for mailing or delivery to the designated 17 election official. Except as provided in subparagraph (II) of this 18 paragraph (a), All envelopes containing mail-in ballots shall be in the 19 hands of the designated election official no later than 7 p.m. on the day 20 of the election. Mail-in envelopes received after 7 p.m. on the day of the 21 election but postmarked on or before the day of the election will remain 22 sealed and uncounted, but the elector's registration record will not be 23 canceled for failure to vote in a general election.

(II) All envelopes containing mail-in ballots cast by 7 p.m.
 mountain standard time on the day of the election by absent uniformed
 services electors serving outside the United States shall be in the hands
 of the designated election official no later than the close of business on

1 the eighth day following the day of the election.

SECTION 4. Repeal of provisions being relocated in this act.
Sections 1-8-103 and 1-8-117 (4) (b), Colorado Revised Statutes, are
repealed.

5 SECTION 5. Repeal of provisions not being relocated in this
act. Sections 1-2-208, 1-2-209, 1-2-209.5, 1-8-103.3, 1-8-103.5, 1-8-116,
and 1-8-117 (1), (2), (3), (4) (a), (5), (6), and (7), Colorado Revised
Statutes, are repealed.

9 **SECTION 6.** Inclusion of official comments. There shall be 10 included in the publication of the "Uniform Military and Overseas Voters 11 Act", as nonstatutory matter, following each section of the act, the full 12 text of the official comments to that section contained in the official 13 volume containing the 2010 official text of the "Uniform Military and 14 Overseas Voters Act" issued by the national conference of commissioners 15 on uniform state laws, with any changes in the official comments or 16 Colorado comments to correspond to Colorado changes in the uniform 17 act. The revisor of statutes shall prepare the comments for approval by 18 the committee on legal services for publication.

SECTION 7. Applicability. This act shall apply to elections held
on or after November 1, 2011.

SECTION 8. Safety clause. The general assembly hereby finds,
 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate
 preservation of the public peace, health, and safety.
