#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A LOCAL BUSINESSES DATABASE 102 BY THE COLORADO OFFICE OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT.

## **Bill Summary**

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill directs the Colorado office of economic development (office) to create, by 2014, an electronic database of local businesses in Colorado. Such businesses are included in the database upon a business submitting certain information about the business, certifying that the business is a local business, and filing a fee with the office. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado: 1 2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly 3 hereby finds, determines, and declares that, according to the Colorado 4 Local First program of the Mile High Business Alliance: 5 There are over five hundred thousand locally owned (a) 6 businesses in Colorado that employ more than one million six hundred 7 thousand people and generate over ninety-eight billion dollars in 8 economic activity every year; 9 (b) With the state's current economic challenges, keeping these 10 locally owned businesses healthy is vital to ensure that the goods and 11 services that Coloradans need are provided; 12 (c) Small and locally owned businesses are more adaptable, more 13 innovative, and more responsible to our community than nonlocally 14 owned businesses: 15 (d) Because money spent at locally owned businesses recirculates 16 at least three times more in a community than money spent at nonlocally 17 owned businesses, actions to strengthen locally owned businesses directly 18 increases community economic activity, helping stabilize employment, 19 create jobs and local tax revenue, and otherwise bolster community 20 infrastructures; 21 (e) A shift of just ten percent of an individual's purchases from 22 nonlocal to local retailers could translate to a three billion dollar boost to 23 Colorado's economy over two months; 24 (f) New programs and strategies like the local businesses database

takes effect at 12:01 a.m. on the day following the expiration of the 1 2 ninety-day period after final adjournment of the general assembly (August 3 8, 2012, if adjournment sine die is on May 9, 2012); except that, if a 4 referendum petition is filed pursuant to section 1 (3) of article V of the state constitution against this act or an item, section, or part of this act 5 6 within such period, then the act, item, section, or part will not take effect 7 unless approved by the people at the general election to be held in 8 November 2012 and, in such case, will take effect on the date of the 9 official declaration of the vote thereon by the governor.
